To Keep Butter Firm Without Ice. A correspondent of Howard's Dairyman gives the following method of keeping butter without ice: "Take a tight box (ten or twelve inches high twelve to fourteen inches wide, and eighteen to twenty-four inches long), that can be got at any grocery store, put inside about five inches from the bottom, on which to place the butter. Set a dish containing water in the bottom of the box, and place the butter on the shelf. Take a piece of cloth large enough to well cover the butter and drop over the edge of the shelf into the dish of water. Moisten the cloth, spread it over the butter, and let the ends drop into the dish of water, and it will take up the water so as to keep the butter cool and hard and free from salt crystals and fine sand for table use. Tallowing crabs is the best cloth to use for the purpose. The box should have a cover."

Reminders. The following suggestions are found in the English Farmer's Gazette: Always carefully look over your flock once a day, and if you see any birds mope or drooping their wings, remove them and tend them, as one ill bird may affect all the rest.

For a Healthy Skin. Cold or tepid baths, softened with oatmeal and a lump of borax must be rigorously indulged in if you would have a clear and healthy skin, especially in the hot weather, but never when the skin is overheated plunge into a cold bath, as this will often produce congestion and a rash.

To Clean Mattresses. To clean your mattress, which is so badly stained, take starch, make it into a paste with cold water. Spread this on the stains, first putting the mattress in the sun. In an hour or two brush this off, and if not clean repeat the process. Every mattress should be examined during the spring and all the stains removed at once.

Care of a Cut. If a child cuts his finger with glass, the place should be bathed immediately with warm water, and the sore covered with a piece of the cut skin as at all dirty. When a knee is cut through a fall the part must be carefully cleaned to remove all gravel or earth before it is tied up.

Lemon for the Hands. When the hands are stained there is nothing that will clean them better than a lemon or lemon and salt. After the juice has been squeezed from the fruit it can be used for this purpose.

To Clean Straining Cloths. Jelly bags and straining cloths should not be washed with soap, but soaked in very hot water and squeezed dry before finally rinsing in tepid water.

How many women ever consider the effect of fashion upon trades and industries? The deplorable fashion of wearing wings and feathers on women's hats during the past four years called hundreds of men into the bird-catching and bird-killing business, and in many districts the country almost obliterated the feathered population. There are great districts in Pennsylvania which were once vivacious in their music which are now as silent as the grave. As the birds were killed or the fishermen became more and more fearful of human beings. In the four years it is estimated that 100,000,000 birds' skins were put on the market, and that to secure these 400,000,000 were killed or mortally wounded, and another countless army of fledglings died of starvation in their nests.

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How to Kill Burdock. If a burdock at any stage of growth is cut below the surface of the ground and a handful of salt thrown on the cut surface, it completely dries up. The moisture from the cut dries at once the salt, and this in turn helps to rot the root below the surface. A sharp spade is best to do this. Very little salt is needed, as when rotting begins below the ground it is apt to combine with the entire root in a mass of pulp. The burdock is biennial, and not so hard to get rid of as many persons who have horizontal roots remaining under ground, which no application of salt can reach. The solid trouble with burdock is its innumerable seeds, one plant seeding enough to plant an acre, and the seed remaining in the ground for years waiting for an opportunity to grow.
