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The Disasters of the Storm.

The snow-storm which broke early Sunday morning along the coast caused a large number of shipping disasters...

The Disasters of the Storm.

The list of known shipping disasters is as follows:—

Totally wrecked—Schooner Richard S. Learning, of Dominville, N. J., on Long Shoal, Nantucket Sound; George B. Ferguson, of Belfast, Me., ashore on Nantucket Island; Barge Albertus, of New York, ashore on Fisher's Island.

Ashore and damaged—Schooners Lo-duckie, Franconia, Faraway and Robbery (Br.) all ashore at Vineyard Haven; John J. Perry, D. J. Melanson, Eva May, Rhoda Holmes, Hortensia, Lagano, Avon, Frank and Ira, (Br.) Edna, Ella M. Mitchell, all damaged at Vineyard Haven by collision; Otis Miller, Mary Lee, Newton, Kolon and Frank Barnett, with lost anchors on Nantucket Shoals. The tug Laskovana disabled at Vineyard Haven.

The schooners Franconia and Faraway were floated late to-day. The revenue cutter Mackinaw, stationed here, made a careful search of Vineyard and Nantucket Sounds to-day, going out as far as the Handkerchief Lightship, but returned tonight with no additions to the already long list.

WRECK OF THE STORM. The wreck of the Learning was the worst of the storm. The schooner was bound from Windsor, N. S., for Philadelphia, with passengers and cargo. The schooner was seen on Saturday anchored near Cross Rip Lightship. Yesterday noon, after the storm cleared, the Learning was discovered on Long Shoal apparently in distress.

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THE NUMEROUS DISASTERS AT VINEYARD HAVEN might have been more serious had not those vessels which were away from their anchors been skillfully steered through the storm tossed sea to an easy resting mudflat at the head of the harbor.
