DARING TRIP OF LITTLE YAWL

The Typhoon Arrived Safely At Cowes Monday Morning.

Although some time has passed since they hopped off from Baddeck in an attempt to cross the Atlantic in a corkie shell, not a word has been heard from or about William Washburn Nutting, Frederick Casey Baldwin, and James Dorset, the intrepid crew of the yacht Typhoon. They planned to call at St. Pierre, Miquelon, and cable their friends in Cape Breton, but no cable has been received. They expected to be reported from time by steamers encountered en route, but so far not a single ship has wireless about a meeting, and the vessel arriving in port has mentioned passing the yacht. In spite of these things, their friends at Baddeck are not particularly uneasy apart from the natural anxiety attendant upon such a risky voyage.

At the Bell laboratories in Baddeck this afternoon it was stated that absolutely no word has been received from the little vessel since it cleared from Baddeck at midnight July 17.

A few hours later off point Aconi, Walter Pinault, builder of the yawl, came ashore after bidding farewell to the friends he had accompanied them that far on their journey in order to see how the new craft behaved. On Sunday morning from the coast he caught a last glimpse of the yacht as she crowded on sail and headed away for St. Pierre.

Thus the Typhoon disappeared upon a sea smooth and smiling, but a sea that has before now swallowed many a stouter bark that has essayed the passage from Cape Breton to the French Island, and has never reached her destination.

But no such idea is entertained by friends of Baldwin and Nutting. They admit it is a little incomprehensible that the men should have neglected to report progress from St. Pierre, but explain it by the very favorable weather, their belief being that the yachtsmen wanted to make the most of the favoring breezes without any unnecessary stops. At any rate they did not plan to reach Cowes until August 7 or 8, in order to be in time for the regatta on August 10 so that they still have several days in which to make their destination.

It is the belief of the friends of the men that they are now well across the ocean and nearing their goal. Although a racing yacht, the Typhoon is designed on staunch sea worthy lines, and in addition to her sails, carries an auxiliary engine developing about 15 horse power and assuring continued progress whether the wind holds favorable or not.

Baldwin and Nutting planned to follow the northern route taken by Harry Hawker when he made his famous ocean airplane flight in 1919. As ice has been reported heavy over this district, it may account for the lack of news from steamers which have been obliged to take a more southerly course by the danger from the big bergs. The party plans to petting for the British international trophy. They intend then to cruise down the shores of France and Spain and into the Mediterranean, returning to America in the fall via the southern or Azores route.

Yesterday's despatches say that the Typhoon arrived safely Monday morning at Cowes, Isle of Wight.

CRICKET LEAGUE FOR THE VALLEY

Bridgetown Defeated Wolfville Last Wednesday at Wolfville

A match was played on Wednesday at Wolfville between Bridgetown and Wolfville, which after a most enjoyable game resulted in a victory for the visiting team by one run and three wickets. For Bridgetown, Messrs Donat and Gill did some remarkably successful bowling, Messrs Spittal, Sowett and White rendering the service for the home team.

In the first innings the play of the Wolfville eleven was rather weak and they were disposed of for 35 runs, but in the second innings they made the very creditable score of 75. The bowling of Mr. Geo Gill for the Bridgetown team contributed largely to our success, Mr. G.I. being an all round cricketer of exceptional merit. Mr. Koppel distinguished himself by a number of difficult catches and by hitting the wickets at a great distance which resulted in the retirement of Mr. Gill in the 2nd innings. Messrs Pierce, Ford and Donat acted as umpires.

The Bridgetown team was entertained by the Wolfville men at lunch at the Royal Hotel. A few short speeches were made by the President and Captains Gill and Herbin. A return match for Aug 18th at Bridgetown was provisionally arranged. Bridgetown plays Windsor tomorrow (Thursday) at Bridgetown at 11 a. m. and another match between Wolfville and Windsor will likely be played soon. A cricket league for the Valley is now being planned and steps are being taken to organize a club at Annapolis Royal.

IMPORTANT SCHOOL NOTICE

The Provincial Educational Association opens at Wolfville Tuesday, Aug 24th. By notifying trustees a week in advance teachers may attend without loss of provincial aid and without loss Municipal Grant to section.
To the many changes in the Education Act of 1918 already referred to please note that Section 80 exempting ordained ministers and unmarried women from school taxes is repealed. Section 48 of the Public Health Act remains in force and before any pupil is admitted to school privileges he must present proper vaccination certificates. Conscientious objectors' Declarations, and Certificates of having had smallpox of any date must be accepted. Certificates of successful vaccination must be accepted if dated within five years. Medical Certificate of temporary unfitness must be accepted if dated after 31 July, 1920. Will trustees take such steps as they deem necessary to have pupils

THE ANNAPOLIS VALLEY LEAGUE

Last Game of the Regular Series Played Last Wednesday.

Last Wednesday's games closed the regular series of the Annapolis Valley League, the championship of which was won by Middleton with Annapolis second.

We regret that Bridgetown had poor luck this season, the causes we will not attempt to enumerate. We simply accept the situation, as all good sportsmen should, and hope for better results next season.

Wednesday's game in Middleton, Middleton vs Bridgetown, was won by Middleton with a score of 11-0. Our boys did very well at first, and for a time the score was 4-0 and up until the last few innings 5-0. Then the Bridgetown boys began to display some careless fielding and the score soon went to 11. With the Bridgetown seniors was James Fay, of the juniors, the only one of our boys on Wednesday to reach 3rd base. Young Fay played a good game as first baseman and, judging from the good work put up by himself, and the junior team to which he belongs, Bridgetown's future teams will be better than the past ones.

Friday's Middleton Outlook says: The game on Wednesday against Bridgetown ended the schedule of the Annapolis Valley League for the season of 1920. As in 1919, the home team won the league decisively against all comers. This is a very creditable showing particularly as our team was composed wholly of local men.

As winners of the league the boys receive a handsome cup donated by the Draper and Maynard Co and also watch fobs donated by Magee and Charleton of Bridgetown. They also are entitled to compete for the championship of the province.

The championship will be fought for by six teams viz. Liverpool and Yarmouth of the South Shore League; Middleton of the Valley League; Halifax "Crescents" and Amherst of the Central League and Stellarton of the Eastern League. To win the championship our boys must first trim Yarmouth two out of three and then win two out of three from the best team of the last three mentioned above. This means a hard struggle, but our boys have the ability and with hard practise and good coaching they can do the trick.

May Declare War On Russia

Great Britain Will Probably Demand Immediate Cessation of Advance into Poland.

LONDON, Aug 5—According to the Herald, Premier Lloyd George during his conversation with M. Krassin and Kamenoff yesterday presented an ultimatum to the Bolshevik representative demanding an immediate and unconditional cessation of the Russian advance into Poland, even before signing an armistice, or otherwise Great Britain would declare war. The newspaper says also that the British note sent to Russia is of a threatening character. The Daily Mail also reports that the note is in the nature of an ultimatum. "It says plainly," asserts the newspaper, "that Poland is being over run and if, instead of hastening an armistice, the Bolshevik armies continue to advance the situation foreseen in the note of July 29 will have arisen and Great Britain and her allies will be obliged to assist in the support of the Poles." The Daily Mail also declares that the Ministers indulged in frank talk about the Red advance to Kamenoff and Krassin.





CANADA TO BE IMPORTANT FUR MARKET



Canada is now exporting to other countries according to Dominion Government figures, \$14,000,000 worth of furs and skins in the course of a year, and a number are brought back into the country, purchased by Canadian dealers at foreign sales and resold to Canadians. The value of furs and skins exported during the fiscal year 1918-1919 was \$13,737,521. Of these \$9,743,464 worth went to the United States, \$3,753,955 to Great Britain, and \$299,202 to other countries. Some extent of the values to which these exports have risen can be obtained from the fact that the value of the export of furs and skins in 1917 was \$5,827,323. During the month of March 1919, the value of these exports was \$2,680,794 as compared with \$1,420,168 in the corresponding month in 1918. It has been estimated that eighty per cent of the silver foxes of the world come from Canada.

For nearly four centuries Canada has been one of the largest and most productive fields of the fur trade, and it is impossible to estimate the number or the value of the costly pelts taken from the traps of the Dominion in this period. Yet, until quite recently, the fur trade was hardly organized on a business basis, and the trapping and skinning of the furs the various phases of the industry passed out of Canadian hands. Traders bought from the trappers and then the raw materials went to the large foreign markets. There has gradually dawned a realization of the money lost in this way, however, and in future Canada will market her own furs and Montreal become one of the most important fur markets of the globe. For years London, St. Louis and New York have been the selling centres to which Canadian furs have travelled and St. Louis had the world's premier fur mart. The auction at Montreal will be conducted by a large company capitalized at \$5,000,000 and will be largely co-operative in nature. It is the intention to hold three auctions a year, the first about next March. The opening of a Canadian fur market is a natural development of artificial breeding and fur ranching. This industry is fairly general throughout Canada, and in Prince Edward Island the industry which has been in operation for more than thirty years, has assumed very important proportions. In 1914 there were in the island no less than 250 fox ranches with nearly 4,600 acres.

EXPORTS OF PURE-BRED STOCK



The breeding of purebred stock in the West may be considered a comparatively new industry, for it is not long since the days when quantity was the idea uppermost in a rancher's mind, and quality in his animals received very little consideration. This was in the epoch of the huge ranches, but with settlement and the introduction of other and more intensive methods of agricultural stock raising, much attention has been paid to the quality of the animal raised with the result that the stock of the western provinces is becoming known wherever interest is taken in the maintenance of herds of prime quality. In the western provinces breeders have always had the active co-operation of the various governments who by an aggressive campaign of propaganda, the institution and work of experimental farms and intelligent distribution of high-grade animals in the stock raising districts have striven to elevate the quality of the animal bred and eliminate those of low grade.

The results of this intelligent co-operation are becoming more evident every day. Purebred stock farms are now as common throughout the West as were the ranches of the old days, and the demand for their product is increasing and covering a large area. Each year many animals are purchased by American farmers at the annual sales throughout the west and huge prices realized. Australians are enthusiastic over Canadian purebred cattle. Recently a herd of Holsteins were shipped to the Antipodes as an experiment, and so great was the demand that they could have been sold set-

eral times over. The outlook for export in this direction is so bright that a further herd of twenty-four head has been shipped from Vancouver, and it is confidently expected a regular export business in Canadian purebred stock will be maintained with Australia. Holstein stock was first introduced into Canada from England, and new it is found necessary to introduce fresh blood for the revival of British stock. Canada, where the breed has arrived at such a high state of perfection, has been chosen for this important re-supply, and a special dispensation will be granted to permit the introduction, as the government does not permit the entry of live cattle into the country. British Columbia has also supplied the Hawaiian Islands with its first purebred stock when, a short while ago, a consignment of Holsteins and Jerseys went to the stockmen of Kahaui, Island of Maui. A clear realization of the importance of high quality, have in fact, with intelligent breeding and the active co-operation of the Dominion and Provincial Governments, raised the Canadian purebred standard, until it has through its own excellence created the general demand which exists at present.




