SUPREME COURT STAMPS OF CANADA.

BY "KANUCK."
These stamps I believe are the least known of all the revenue stamps of Canada.
In 1876 the inspection of Weights and Measures and Gas Meters as well as the regular duties of the above Court were placed under its control and during the same year three sets of stamps were issued for the purpose of collecting the revenues under its control. These stamps are divided into three classes viz: Supreme Court Stamps proper, Gas Inspection and Weights and Measures Stamps. The Supreme Court Stamps proper may be described as follows: length three inches, breadth one and one quarter inches perforated 15 , color, blue shaded, from very dark to light ; across the top and bottom in an oblong frame is the value in figures; in the centre, but much nearer the top than bottom in a circle about an inch in diameter, is the queen's head, crowned; at the top of the circle the word "Canada" and at the bottom "Law Stamp"; between the head and the value at the bottom, on a scroll is the registered number in red and just below this on a curved scroll, the value in words.

These stamps are finely engraved and I consider them the most beautiful stamps ever issued by the Canadian Government.
There are six values, so cent, 20 cent, 25 cent, 50 cent, $\$ 1.00$ and $\$ 5.00$. They are all of similar design.

Gas Inspection Stamps are two inches long and three-quarters of an inch wide and perforated 15 . They may be described as follows: color bright blue; across the centre is a blank space in which the registered number is printed in red. I may here add that in each value'the registered number seems to be printed with different type of various sizes: Above the registered number we have the word "Gas". and below "Inspection"; the upper part of the stamp is occupied by a crown surmounted by an irregular frame; in the centre of the
lower part is an pblong frame in which is the value in figures surrounded by engraving similar to that seen on bank notes around the values. There are nine values, 5 cent, 25 cent, 50 cent, $\$ 1.00$, $\$ 1.50, \$ 2.00, \$ 3: 00, \$ 4.00$ and $\$ 10.00$.

They are all of same design and color. The Weights and Measures stamps are the same size, perforation, and design as the Gas Inspection with the following changes, viz: "Weights \&" above the blank space in the centre and "Measures" below. The registered number is sometimes printed in blue and sometimes in red; it is also sometimes printed across the top of the starnp instead of in the centre; also various sized type is used in printing these numbers.

There are eleven values and thirteen varieties made up as follows:-1 cent, 2 cent, 5 cent, io cent, 15 cent, 20 cent, 30 cent, 50 cent, $\$ 1.00, \$ 1.50$ and $\$ 2.00$ all in black, and 1 cent and 2 cent in blue.

The Supreme Court stamps proper are used on writs, summonses, \&c, issued by the Supreme Court.

Gas Inspection stamps are used on certificates issued by the inspector certifying to the correctness of the metres.

Weights and Measures stamps are used on certificates given by the inspector certifying that the scales and measures he has tested are correct.

And thus the postage increases progressively, one penny for a single letter, of every like excess of distance of 100 miles.
N.B.-All double, treble, and other letters and packets, whatever, (except by the twopenny post) pay in proportion to the respective rates of a single letter, unless such letter weighs an ounce; in such case it is rated as four single letters, and so in proportion for every quarter of an ounce.

## ERRORS IN PERFORATION.

A great deal has been said through the Philatelic press of the United States, about errors in perforation of the stamps, of that country ; and so much interest has been aroused that the leader of Philatelic journalism, "The Ameri-
can Philatelist," has deemed the subject worthy its attention.

We wish to call the attention of the philatelic world to the fact that the United States is not the only country that that has errors in the perforation of their stamps. We have recently discovered a number of Canadian stamps with double perforations, some at top only, and others at top and bottom. We have in our possession a pair of Canada three cent stamps having two rows of perforations at top and bottom. We have also a two cent register perforated all around and then diagonally across the upper half of it.

## A COLLECTION STOLEN.

The house of Nathaniel Thayer Kidder, of Milton, Mass., was entered by burglars the night of November 4th, and his valuable collection of stanips stolen, together with silverware and other articles.

Through a circula-; ssued by the Supt. of Boston Police h offers a reward of $\$ 500$ for the conviction of the thief and the recovery of the property.

The collection will probably be offered to some stamp dealer for sale. The following is an extract from a circular recently sent out:-
Should it come to your notice, I hope that you will notify me at once, or Mr. Trifet, 408 Washingtcis Street, Boston. Mr. Trifet knows almost every stamp that is in the collection.

This allam has been advertised as the Improved Stamp Album, but as that name has leeen used by other publishers, and as unscrupalous parties are imitating this work with a similar nane, the change has luen made.

This allsum is blank, except for a neatly printed border around each page and a label at the top of each page to receive the name of the country. The names of all comntrics printed on adhesite paper gu with each book, and when mounted in the label prepared looks like a printed page.

The paper used in the allums i.s of a fine cream tint, and the weight waries with the price of the book, even the cheapest being heavier than that used in any other album.

Advaiced collectors have whully abanduned alloums with printed spaces fur stamps. They wish to arrange their stamps to suit themselves and to collect such varieties as they desire, so that a blank album is necessary.

An impurtant feature of this album is the lithographed stamp mounts that are furnished with it and may be used or not as the collector may fancy.

These mounts are the same as those used in the celebrated Tiffany collection and were the invention of its owner, Mr. Juhn K. Tiffany, President of the Americ.an Philatelic Assuciation. The effect of a page of stamps on their mounts neatly arranged is beyond description.

The stamps lay on a perfectly flat surface, as the linge is cut from the mount the lack can be readily examined, and there is room for memoranda on the mount beneath the stamp.

The mounts come in all shapes and sizes to fit any stamp.
