-The first samples of this season's Californian orange crop are on the market. It is said the yield will exceed that of any former year, and that the fruit is ripening well.

-The offer of Messrs. Imrie & Graham, printers, of Toronto, has been refused by their creditors. Their statement shows liabilities, direct, of \$11,817, indirect \$2,-238. Assets are placed at \$11,620.

-The herring have not struck in as usual on the Newtoundland coast this winter. A fleet of 25 sail are at the Bay of Islands waiting for them, but as yet there are no signs of their coming.

-Joseph G. Owens, who defrauded a number of people out of upwards of \$20,-000 at Streetsville, Ont., is dying of Bright's disease at Portland, Oregon. He is agent there for one of the largest lumber firms on the Pacific Coast.

—It is reported in Victoria, B. C., that the site selected for the proposed Canada Western Hotel has been sold for \$80,000 to the Government for a new post office, custom house, and inland revenue building.

—The first lady insurance agent in the Maritime Provinces is Mrs. Whittier, of Shelburne, who has just been appointed special agent for Nova Scotia of the Provident Savings Life Assurance Society of New York

-Late English advices say that the demand for hay has fallen off owing to large arrivals and open weather. Sellers are offering Canadian hay, December-January shipment, at from \$25.57 to \$26.18 without finding buyers.

-Ontario is waking up to the fact that Australia may prove a valuable customer. Five car-loads of agricultural implements went through from Toronto to Vancou-

ver this week over the C.P.R. for shipments by the S.S. Arawa to Melbourne.

-Mr. Duncan McArthur, formerly president of the now defunct Commercial Bank,, stated at a dinner given in his honor at Winnipeg that another bank might shortly be established there by himself and his friends.

-Counterfeit silver, more especially 25 cent pieces, are unusually common in the Maritime Provinces just now. It would be well if the Government took some steps to ascertain where the gang of coiners that are engaged in "shoving the queer" are located.



-An acre of land on the farm of Henry Hamilton, near Petrolia, has risen about four feet during the past year and it is alleged that oil is oozing out of it in large quantities. A company has been organized with a capital of \$25,000 to bore for oil and gas on it, and \$10,000 has already been paid in. They expect a bonanza.

-Mr. E. F. Ames, senior partner in the wholesale boot and shoe house of Ames, Holden & Co., has sold out his interest in the firm to his partner, Mr. J. C. Holden, who in turn is organizing the business into a joint stock company with Mr. Ames as one of the qualified directors. Mr. Holden's many friends warmly wish him and his efficient young scions a continued meaure of high prosperity .- Mr. J. S. Bannister, for some 14 years connected with the staunch old firm as superintendent of sales and shipping, has bought out the retail boot and shoe stock and business of A. M. Featherston, St. Catherine stret, which he will conduct personally, with, we hope, deserved financial success.

-Somewhat to the surprise of the trade the city wholesale dry goods firm of Isidore Thibandeau & Co. called its creditors together a few days ago and proposed to settle its indebtness at 40c on the dollar, cash. The business was started by the late Isidore Thibeaudeau in the spring of '88, and, on his death in July '90, it was taken over by his brother Olivier, who had an interest in it, and continued it under the old style. It appears the firm did not do so well as anticipated in the purchase of the Hudon stock, and it has lost money lately by bad debts. No serious difficulties have yet been thrown in the way of a settlement. The liabilities are about \$32,000.

James T. Hurley, manufacturer of boots and shoes, St. John, N.B., has suspended, and the liabilities are about \$30,000. He did a large trade, but his finances have not been in an easy position for some time. He was unfortunate some years ago in making a succession of losses, but has not been a teonspicuous loser of late. The Bank of British North America is the chief holder of his paper. Before suspending he gave a biff of sale to Chas. H. Peters, tanner, St. John.

—It has been evident for some time past that large holders of suburban real estate near this city would have a hard row to hoe before long. The first indication of this was the making of a demand of assignment by the Banque Nationale on Mr. Fred R. Alley, the energetic promoter of Amherst Park, on a claim for \$10,000. Mr. Alley contests the demand, and, it is believed, will be able to square matters if he can secure the necessary time.

-The chief creditors of Louis N. Dagenais, tailor, city, whose assignment is reported, are MacDougall, Barret & Co., \$1,374; M. Fisher, Sons & Co., \$1,279; Jas. McDougall & Co., \$1,173; Gault Bros. & Co., \$1,161; R. Kommaier & Co., \$1,030; De M. L. Dusault \$3,000. The total will reach \$18,000.

A Crepeau, general store, Wotton, Que, has failed for \$4.180. He began some 12 years ago, and got into trouble in '88, when he is understood to have obtained an extension. He did fairly for a time, but of late has not been too attentive and, in one way and another, has gone behind.

-Mrs. J. Hamilton, general storekeeper of Clifford, Ont., has assigned. She has run a small business since the commencement of the year, but could hardly expect to succeed in face of the competition she had to encounter.

-Jos. Yetman, restaurant-keeper of Halifax, N.S., has assigned. He was formerly a steamship steward and started an eating house on shore about five years ago with very little capital and meagre prospects of success.

-M. G. Connor, furniture, Edmonton, N. W.T., has assigned after an experience of four years. He was supposed to be doing fairly until quite lately, when he showed signs of being pressed, and began to go behind.

-J. W. Silverthoin, general store, Olds, Man., a farmer prior to '91 with little business experience or capital, has assigned. -Thos. E. Nevisoa, harness, Regina, has assigned.

reverse, of inviting to a man tired with a hard day's work in his store or office. And yet, did he have the leisure to peruse and compare them, those plain build tables have a story to tell that would interest him deeply. They would disabuse his mind of many a preconceived idea, and might unfold to him commercial possibilities that he otherwise would never have thought of.

Most especially are they interesting as a chart of the ever-shifting, ever widening, channels of Canadian trade. They show its trend and its scope as no other medium can, and in particular they emphasize the gradual transference of the Canadian market from Great Britain to the United States. Tem years ago the mother country was still our principal supplier. To day her place has been taken by our neighbors across the line, and the total imports from Great Britain during the last fiscal year fell 28 per cent below. those from the United States. This change is true not only of the Dominion as a whole, but of each individual province except Prince Edward Island as the following table of imports for the fiscal year of 1892 will prove:-

These figures show that during the last liscal year we imported from the United States dufiable goods to the extent of \$29,505, 550, on which the Canadian government received duties to the amount of \$7,814,559, and free goods to the extent of \$23,632,022, of a grand total of \$53,137,52 against only \$41,848,435 from Great Britain. This leaves a balance of \$11,789,137,

or more than 28 per cent in favor of the United States, while ten years ago Great Britain was still the leader by over two millions of dollars.

If, we take the figures in detail they are still more significant. Take the province of Ontario for instance. In 1882 Ontario imported goods to the value of \$21, 291, 032 from the United States and \$17,304,91.2 from Great Britain. In 1892 the figures from the United States had grown to \$26,682,. 867 while those from the Mother, country had fallen to \$12,551,599. In other words five millions of dollars of English import trade has been transferred to our American cousins in the banner province of the Dominion, and the same process of transfer is visible in each of the others.

It is a pity that no statistics are available to show what particular section of the United States is making these gains in Canadian trade. If they were, we believe it would be shown, that the increased share of Canadian commerce would have to be credited to Chicago. The western metroplis has long 'devoted a marked share of attention to Canada, her requiremetus, tastes, and commercial advantages. It only needs to glance at our advertisingt columns to note the number of advertisements therein from Chicago firms and to see from these silent salesmen how eager they are to draw the attention of our merchants to their wares and how thoroughly they appreclate the advantages offered to them in this market. Whoever else undervalues Canada, they certainly do not. Day by day they are securing a firmer foothold. With the advantages of propinquity, excellent traffic facilities, and a more intimate knowledge of Canadian requirements to belo them, they are naturally gaining ground while the more distant and conservative British are slowly losing it. Every loyal citizen could wish it were otherwise. But there is no sentiment in business. The cheapest, best, and most attractive article is the one that sells, whether lits maker dwell beneath the folds. of England's meteor flag or the starry, banner. In the stern hard battle of daily life no man can afford to lose the slightest advantage for the sake of sentimental considerations. He must buy in the cheapest and most advantageous market if he is to succeed in these days of keen competition and merciless rivairy, and if he finds that market among our enterprising and energetic cousins across the line, instead of across: the ocean; he will naturally carry his trade thither.

THE DEPRESSION IN THE UNITED STATES.

There seem to be no indications as yet that the wave of commercial depression under which the United States is now suffering, is passing away. Trade with our neighbors continues dull and languid, and even the usual demand for holiday specialties seems to be under the average this year. Money it is true, is pouring into the large commercial centres, until it is estimated that the New York banks alone hold. \$75,000,000 in unemployed funds. But this friethorn of money in the large. cities is at the expense of and means a scarcity of currency in, the agriculnural districts, and the enforced lale ness of large numbers of skilled and muskilled workingmen adds to a general stagnation which is still further emphasized by a decrease of 10 pen cent in the November gross earnings of the railroads.

No doubt the Union is suffering from the effects of some years of inflation and over-production, and must pass disrough a period of severe and prolonged liquidation before business can resume its ordinary course. But the

primal cause of the existing depression is undoubtedly that piece of extraordinary and injudicious legislation called the McKinley Bill. The iden of its promoter, or rather of the political party whose spokesman he was, was to prohibit by its drastle provisions the importation of many articles of foreign manufacture, which can from their nature, be produced of better quality and more cheaply in foreign countries, than they can possibly be in the United States. In fact, it is a measure which attempts to divert trade from its natural into a fictitious channel by leg-Islative interference-a thing which has never succeeded ultimately in the history of commercial enterprises. The immediate result, however, was to increase the importations of articles legislated against in immense quantities before the Act came into force, and in the following year, to cause them to fall off equally heavily. It also stimulated the establishment of factories for the production of these articles within the boundaries of the United States; but unfortunately, owing to the high rates of wages rating, and the taxation of the raw material, they were unable to do so except at a cost for which even the high protective tariff did not compensate; so that one by one they were forced to withdraw from the unequal contest. It followed then, that in the second year after the passage of the Mckinley Act, the importation of European products recommenced on a scale unprecedented in the history of the United States until the total volume of imports exceeded that of the previous year by the sum of \$220,000,-

Another cause was at work at the same time. Owing to the manipulation of speculators, trading upon the "boom," the prices of breadstuffs and pork products were forced up to such a figure that prices in New York and Chicago rose above those in Liverpool, and the produce could no longer be exported to Great Britain. As that country is practically their only market, they were compelled to carry the stuff themselves; thus locking up the funds usually available from that source An increase in the imports and a decrease in the exports consequently occurred synchronously, until the two together made a difference in the foreign trade against the United States of \$320,000,000 and a drain of gold to make up the balance set in. Between the shipment of gold to meet payments, and the locking up of funds in carrying

produce, money became scarce, and legitimate enterprises soon found it difficult to borrow. The tariff-fostered manufacturers found themselves unable to compete with imported goods. They could not sell their wares except at a loss, and so they either had to fall or close, down temporarily-in either case throwing thousands of working men out of employment. These men are still out of work, and likely to remain so for some time to come. The result is an amount of starvation and destitution in the larger industrial centres unparalleled in the history of the United States.

The obstructions caused by the impending change in the tariff have brought the depression to a climax. Manufacturers do not know what the new duties will be, nor (within six months) when they are to go into effect. Consequently they dont know what they can afford to pay for the raw material, or what changes in wages, or in methods of manufacture they may involve. The result is a period of suspense in every branch of industry and in some a total suspension of operations. All are waiting to see in what shape the Wilson Bill will reach the President before they venture to resume operations on a large scale. In the meantime, the enforced fidleness is rendering the working classes more tractable. It is weakening the power of the trades unions, and doing away with the walking delegate. With cheaper and freer labor, and a more reasonable tariff, the marvellous elasticity and vast natural resources cousins across the line our will gradually enable them to throw off the present incubus of depression and once more restore their trades and industries to their normal condition of prosperity. But it will take time to do it.

USURIOUS INTEREST.

The fact that a judge of the Superior Court has felt called upon to order the Prothonotary to bring under the notice of the Minister of Justice, at Ottawa the fact that under the existing laws the most usurious interest can be charged and collected upon promissory notes, providing the rate of usury be stipulated upon their face, forms a striking confirmation of the firm stand taken in these columns against the slackness of the laws permitting so disgraceful a condition of affairs.

The first case which aroused the indignation of Mr. Justice Pagnuelo was

that of R. J. Demers vs. John Humpbries, one of the small money lending cases to which we referred in a previous issue. In this case the sum of \$133 was claimed for interest at eight per cent per month after maturity of the note. The learned judge remarked that these cases of usurious interest had become of very frequent occurrence of late, and that unfortunately, under the existing law, there was nothing left for him to do but to render judgment against the defendants, who, as a rule, were compelled to permit the judgment to go by default. Considering the number of the cases now occurring, and the inability of the courts to act in the matter, he felt justified in warning the proper authorities and adding the following rider to his judgment: The prothonotary of this Court is belieby ordered to transmit to the Minister of Justice at Ottawa a copy of this judgment, and to call his attention to the usurious interest claimed and obtained in the present case.

The second case was as striking in its exhibition of usurious interest as the first. It was that of Drapeau vs. Thibaudeau, in which a claim for interest at the rate of \$14.32 per month on a promissory note for \$179 was made; the total sum asked for being \$529. In this case the learned Judgesaid that he was glad to be able to refuse the exorbitant interest, as no rate had been mentioned on the face of the mote. Judgment would therefor go for the amount of the note with the regular, rate of interest only..

No doubt, as Mr. Justice Pagnuelo remarked, the Legislature could never have intended to countenance such a condition of things. But the fact remains that their attention has been eailed to the present laws over and over again in the columns of every reputable commercial journal in the country, and that not the least attempt has ever been made by them to fix a limit of usury. The small moneylenders who fleece so unmercifully their unhappy victims, do so with the perfect cognisance and under the aegis of the Minister of Justice. In this city cases occur almost daily in which usury is charged that would have made Shylock blush for envy. Not a single judge but could instance scores of suits in which he has been compelled to give judgments opposed to all the rules of equity, simply owing to the fact that undimited interest is possible under the law. At last, however, one has been found courageous enough to bring

two glaring instances under the notice of the authorities at Ottawa. It remains to be seen whether Sir John Thompson will pay any more attention to them than he has to the protests of the commercial press, and whether, now that it has been brought officially under his cognizance, he will take the necessary steps to wipe the stigma of permitting usury off our statute books.

Somewhat in this connection, the following from far Arkansas, the 12th inst. may be of import: "Sam J. Hurchilk gave his note to ex-Gov. Rector for \$1000, with interest at the rate of:10 per cent until paid, and McCarty and Joyce indorsed upon the note that they guaranteed the payment of the interest. As, the note can not be collected from the maker, this would make the defendants in this case pay interest forever. Judge Hill decided that McCarthy and Joyce should only be held for the interest that had accrued on the note up to the time of maturity."

AN INTERESTING PARALLEL.

The maxim that "history repeats itself" was never more clearly illustrated than in the curious similarity between the currency famine, as it is termed, which seaused so much financial disturbance in the United States prior to the repeal of the Sherman Act, and that which becured in England during the reign of William III.

Just about two hundred years ago, in 1696, Great Britain passed through such a similar crisis. Currency was hoarded, merchants were unable to secure money to pay their hands, financial stringency became accentuated, and the infant Bank of England, (them only two years old), almost succumbed to the strain. Then, as now, legislative action in the direction of honest money gave the required relief. The hearded currency once more came out into circulation, the foreign exchanges improved, the public credit revived, and by March 1697 the crisis was completely passed and the bank officials breathed freely once more.

In those days there was no trouble over a bi-metallic standard or about the relative values of gold and silver. Nor was there any paper currency to complicate the question. Silver coin formed the business circulation almost exclusively. But silver had its evils even then, and the principal one was

the depreciation of its coin by ellpping at the hands of dishonest traders. This led to anything like full weight coin being hoarded by those lucky enough to get it, until only the depreciated coins were left in circulation. As fast as the mint turned out new coln it was melted down or hoarded, and the clipped coia, which daily grew lighter and lighter, was the only medium of currency left. Finally when the Government felt the shoe pinching them because they had to issue fullweight coin from the mints and receive clipped coin in payment of the taxes. it was resolved to do something to abate the evil, and finally, in January 1696, an Act was passed stating that the last day on which clipped coin would be accepted by the Government in payment of taxes would be the fourth of the following May.

This brought on a currency famine at once. A flood of the old debased coin poured into the exchequer to be meited down and the mint could not get sufficient new coin out to take its place. Great distress ensued. Employers could not pay their clerks or workmen. Wealthy men were forced to discharge their debts with promissory notes, and a general distrust prevailed. Fortunately the Government possessed authority to issue interest bearing motes of £5 and upwards, and this, with the notes of the new Bank of England and the tokens of the moneychangers, lightened the stringency a tittle. In fact the crisis would have been soon over, had it not been that the silver agitators, the Blands and Shermans of the seventeenth century; endeavored to stave off the difficulty by trying to pass a measure whereby the weight of the new coin should be no greater than that of the old clipped coin. This cry of "cheaper money" caused all full-weight coin to be hoarded more closely than ever, and the crisis continued until October 1696 when the House of Commons, after a fierce contest, decided finally that standard British money should not be altered in fineness, weight or denomination, and the advocates of cheaper money were relegated to the cold shades of obscurity.

This turned the tide at once. There was no longer any need to hoard full-weights coin. The currency poured out from its hiding places and inside of five month all the clipped coin had practically gone into the melting pot and its place had been taken by honest money. But had the Peffers and Sockless Simp.

sons!" of that day had their way, and reduced the value of the coinage as they wished the temporary currency famine might have been the means of dealing a permanent blow at the integrity of British finance, instead of placing it on a sounder basis than ever.

OUR CHRISTMAS STORY.

The stars were sparkling in the deep blue vault of heaven, and the leafless trees snapped sharply in the biting frost, as Deacon Ebenezer McCorkle opened the door of his store and faced the warm gush of air from the big white stove laden with the mingled aroma of codfish, calico, coal oil, and cockroaches.

The deacon looked more solemn than usua!—and he was always solemn. He found it paid. When his shears went a little inside of the yard, or he absent minded; y removed some of the tea from the scale, people looked at his long gaunt face and thought his mind was straying to Afric's sunny fountains and India's coral strand, and were afraid to say anything. Besides was he not a pillar of the squat little chapel down the road?

This Christmas Eve the deacon looked not only solemn but worried. He had presided at a meeting of the sisters where he had clanked error's chain to an unprecedented extent, and so he sank into a chair by the big stove with a sigh of content and looked dismally at the crowded shelves around him.

Things, were not going well with the deacon. Even the inhabitants of Chumpville felt that he was behind the times, and when a smart young fellow came on from Toronto with a bankrupt stock and a pretty wife, they were sure of it. The deacon's old fashioned staples were nothing beside the newcomer's novelties. It was in vain that he slid down Greenland's icy mountains more vigorously than before. It was in vain that he became so solemn that "Hark from the Tomb" stuck out all over him. They admired his fervor; but they traded with his rival.

Only one gleam of sunshine lit up the vista of the deacon's retrospect. He had saved money on his insurance. For years he had paid premiums into a company; as solid and substantial as a rock. But a month before Mr. Nicholas Q. Sharper, special travelling agent of the Grand Hebraic Conwolldated Stormy Jordan Fire Insurance Company of Kansas, had come to Chumpville, and had laughed at the rates he was paying. The Grand Hebraic would not only furnish him with gilt edge Insurance for half the cost but, so anxious was he personally to secure the risk of so prominent a citizen as the deacon, that he would divide up his commission with him.

That settled it. The policy in the old company was allowed to lapse, and the special travelling agent of the Grand Hebraic gave the deacon a gor-

geously lithographed interim receipt and departed with a curious smlie on his face and the first year's premium in his pocket.

"Deacon!" said a small persuasive voice at his side.

The deacon woke with a start. There before him was the big white stove, now dull crimson with heat, and beside him was a queer smug-faced little man, accurately dressed in full black, looking at him out of the corner of his eyes with an olly smile on his pert face.

"Who are you?" gasped the astonished deacon.

"Polite insurance men call me Moral Hazard," responded the little man. "though some say I am simply a straight fraud. Many a good turn I have done to respectable merchants like you! Many the worthless ill-assorted stock I have sold at top prices to the insurance companies! Many the Adjuster's pockets I've lined! Oh! I'm a cuckoo!"

"You must be!" responded the deacon "See, here," said the little man with a cunning smile, "You're in a pretty tight fix. The holiday trade has been a failure, the fourth of the month is coming on, and you're in about as deep with your suppliers and the bank as you are likely to get. That's a beautiful stove of yours, loaded with red-hot cont to the muzzle. There's an iron bar in that corner, and the well's dry. Supposing, the stove was to burst?"

The inhabitants of Chumpville certainly could not say that that Christmas morning was lacking in excitement. The crackle of flames and the red glare in the sky, as well as the clanging of the chapel bell, drew every one of them to the blazing store in front of which Ebenezer McCorkle was afternately wringing his hands and feeling in his breast pocket to see if his policy was safe.

Notitill the last crackling einder had smouldered out did the deacon leave the scene. Then he walked with slow, resigned, dejected steps over to the village tavern, the type of a good man bearing up against a load of misfortune. His face changed, however, in the privacy of his little room, when he reflected that he had not been one of the foolish virgins, but had laid up his shekels where thieves could not corrunt and moths could not break in and gnaw the edges off. He wrote two letters. One to his principal creditors. and the other to the Grand Hebrahe Consolidated Stormy Jordan Fire Insurance Co., of Sharpville, Kansas. Then he went forth and posted them with the chastened air of a good man stricken by an undersorved calamity, and sat down to await results.

Three or four days later came a letter from his wholesalers. They condoled with him over his loss, but there was am air of relief and hardly concould congratulation about the mis-

sive. The deacon was too shrewd not to carry insurance, and the prospect of getting their account settled at last shone (through every sentence.

No reply came from Mr. Nicholas Q. Sharper of Sharpsville, Kansas; but from the State Superintendent of Insurance came a curt official letter to the effect that a wild-cat concern, calling itself the Grand Hebraic Consolidated Stormy Jordan Fire Insurance Co, had been driven out of the State and had died a natural death.

The deacon is now in Chicago peddling chewing gum. They say he has become an Anarchist.

CHRISTMAS SHOPPING.

There may be a falling off in the monctary value of the Christmas shopping this year; but there is certainly no lessening of its volume. During the past three days the streets have been crowded with people out for the purpose of purchasing Christmas presents and although most of them started out with the intention of being ultra-economical this year, the abundance of pretty and attractive things shown them resulted in their spending, in many cases, just as much this Christmas as they ever did before.

It looks almost as if people had got it into their heads to be more economical than usual and did not exactly know how to do it. There has been more running round from one store to another to find out where the cheapest prices ruled than in former years, and consequently the storekeepers and their staffs have had to work much harder to make sales. They have shown goods and quoted prices ten times for once that they have sold them. But the stores really quoting low figures have done a very respectable volume of business; while those whose ideas of the the margin of profit are more expansive have been the ones to suffer. There is a general tendency towards the purchase of cheaper goods, and manifest desire to do without articles looked upon as luxuries and, above all, there is an evident leaning towards the selection of what may be termed useful goods as presents.

This, of course, has militated against the more expensive jewellers and the dealers in artistic brig-a-brac and articles of vertu. These classes of stores have certainly experienced a falling off in the volume of their trade. But in compensation for this, branches of staple trade, hitherto but little affected by Christmas shopping, have this year been surprised by the stimulus given to their sales during the past week by persons buying "useful" presents. Thus the volume of goods moved this year will be fully up to the ordinary standards; but it is directed into different channels, and hence many of those lines who practically monopolised the Christmas trade in by-gone years are this year complaining bitterly of its falling off.

In fact this is a Christmas of surprises. The greatest falling off is in the expensive trade done with the wealthy classes whose spending powers are practically unaffected by the depression of trade, and who have not the slightest necessity to curtait their expenditure. They seem to have taken up economy as a "fad," simply because they read about it in the papers. The middle classes, who set the greatest store by Christmas, are buying just as much as ever. But they are not paying quite so much for their presents, and they are taking longer to make up their minds what to buy and where to buy it. The wage working classes are also buying as much as ever, and the stores catering to this class of trade are well satisfied with their week's sales.

Expensive toys and knick-knacks for children are not much called for this year; but this fact had already been fully discounted, and the large retail houses purchased dess than usual of this range of goods and hence will lose but little by thom. The reports from the jewellery. departments are conflicting. Some houses report a falling off; while others speak of this branch as unusually successful. It looks as if, while expensive jewellery is certainly not so much wanted as in former years, there is the same demand for showy, pretty articles, and what may be termed the "lovers" trade, consisting in gifts to present and prospective fiances, bids as much defiance to depression here as it proverbially does to locksmiths.

Judging from the streets, in what may be termed the shopping district, there certainly is no falling off in the number of shoppers. Possibly there are more; for much of the bustle is due to people going from one store to another to see where they can get what they want the cheapest. But where so many people crowd desirable stores the volume of trade is sure to receive an impetus, and doubtless when the merchants come to reckon up after the holidays they will find that the Christmas trade of 1898 is not very far behind that of its predecessors. It is the fashion to grumble nowadays. The ery of "hard times" has grown familiar in the mouths of men whom the world knows to be prosperous, and it is little wonder that it is re-echoed by their less wealthy confreres. But that the mass of the people in this city are no worse off than they were last year is certain. Work has been plentiful, and bids fair to be good all through the winter. The working classes are prosperous and as contented as the average workingman considers it right to permit himself to be. Those who look to him for trade have not been klisappointed, and, altogether, Montreal presents a gratifying contrast of solid progress and prosperity to the condition of many much more pretentious cities across the line.

GOOD REASONS GIVEN.

With reference to the action of the insurance companies in refusing to pay in full the loss on a woollen mill, burned near St. Catharines, which was referred to in our issue of the 24th November, the manager of one of the companies interested writes that the grounds upon which they based their refusal were: first, that the property was incorrectly de-

cribed and that there was more insurance upon it than would otherwise have been the wease. sour Secondly, without in the property had been sold without notification-to the companies: Thirdly, that although the assured refused to give any particulars it was discovered that a lot of machinery was stored in a barn, and fourthly because all the policies were assigned to a bank which simply demanded the amount of the total insurances and refused to state what amount there was on the property or to go into the usual appraisement of the damages. These four reasons the companies hold amply sustain them in the action they took.

THE LATE MR. WM. MACDOUGALL.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Wm. Macdougall who for many years has been a prominent figure in commercial circles in this city. Mr. Macdougall was born in Inverness, Scotland, 79 years ago and was first in the forwarding business here as a partner in the firm of Macpherson, Crane & Co. He next became a partner in the wholesale dry goods house of George Winks & C., which was wound up 13 years ago. He was guardian and manager of the affairs of the younger children of the late John Macdougall, whose youngest daughter is now the wife of Mr. M. S. Foley, the editor and proprietor of this paper. In his. business relations Mr. Macdougall won the esteem of all with whom he came in contact by his sterling and upright qualities. He was emphatically an honest man, and, as such, was universally respected.

THE QUEEN'S HOTEL.

A meeting of the shareholders and creditors of the Queen's Hotel was held in the offices of Messrs. Radford and Walford on Monday last. Only a sparse attendance was present, and these were chiefly the smaller creditors. Several of the more important ones did not attend, and consequently the meeting was adjourned until the 5th of next month. The idea of those present was to make an effort to obtain an extension of six and twelve months in order to give the liquidators a chance to sell the hotel without being forced to sacrifice it. This, it is felt, would be best for the interest of all concerned.

It is feared, however, that this will not be possible. The larger creditors, and especially the banks, are opposed to the granting of any extension, and the liquidators may be forced to sell the hotel at once.

THE BANK OF ENGLAND.

Every effort has naturally been made to hush up the details of the errors of Mr. Frank May, the practically summarily dismissed chief cashier of the Bank of England. But it is known that, so soon as his foolishness had been discovered, he was given one hour in which to send in his resignation, and that he did so: After forty years of service in the bank, he is natired peremptorily; but not entirely

without pension, for although the directors refused to allow him anything they have settled an allowance on his wife. The actual losses to the bank are estimated at \$650,000; but; owing to the character of the securities the poor old man was led tto accept, the ultimate losses, must mount up into the millions. No charges of fraud or misappropriation are made against him. He has simply been led into error by others who profited by his weak and easy nature. But the fact remains that a staid and solid institution like the Bank of England has been seriously involved in a series of dubious transactions extending over months without apparently the slightest knowledge on the part of the governor and directors. This it is that has given such a shock to the commercial world; for, up to this, the Bank of England has been, like Caesar's wife, above suspicion.

A PERTINENT SUGGESTION.

There is no better reading for a young man who is anxious to rise in the store in which he is employed than a good trade journal. In it are gathered brisk business items, discussions on commercial issues, and pointers gathered from the experience of the oldest and most tried merchants, that are of inestimable value to him. No matter how thoroughly he is posted as to his own trade and locality he will always always find something in it that he can read with interest as well as profit. The clerk who does so soon gets on. He becomes, half unconsciously, better posted than his fellows employes. He knows the latest commercial news, and soon is appealed to by the others for this or that bit of information. Customers like to buy from him because he is so well-posted, and byand-by it comes that no matter what changes may be made in the personnel of the staff he is always a fixture until he getts a store of his own or an interest in the firm. And this is all due to his patient and intelligent perusal of the trade paper ; for he who reads will learn, and knowledge is always power.

CIVIC REFORM.

The continued efforts made in these columus to arouse the municipal voters of Montreal from their apathy in regard to civic affairs, and induce them to perform their duties as citizens proud of the Canadian metropolis in other respects, and solicitous for its good name, are at lengthi showing signs of fruit-hearing. The first meeting of the newly-formed Citizens' Municipal Association, held Wednesday evening, was attended by a large number of prominent citizens. Among those present were Messrs. Joseph Duhamel, Q. C., F. X. Bissette, J. Cradock Simpson, D. L. Lockerby, H. B. Ames, Edgar Judge, F. Bayard, G. H. Mathews, J. A. St. Amour, and A. G. McBean. The present City Council, as a body with too little health in it, was vigorously denounced, and ward committees were formed to arouse the electorate and to check the ward "heelersill who now fancy they carry the various districts in their breeches' pockets. THE INFLUENZA.

Many citizens are confined to their houses more or less affected with laffuenza, the outcome doubtless of the rather sudden change from mild to wintry weather a few weeks ago. The press room and other departments of the "Journal of Commerce" have felt the influence also. Our readers have probably noticed what was only too apparent in the mechanical work on our pages. As all hands are again in their places we hope the improvement will be quite as evident.

Financial.

The wholesale traders who have been or are still, at work on their books of account are not likely to go into ecstacies over heavy balances on the right side, but generally speaking they have been careful to keep their sails well trimmed, and enn look the future confidently in the face. Reports indicate that sleighing is good in country parts, and an old fashioned winter with plenty of snow is hoped for, in the interests of the lumber industry.

Cheese and Butter.—Holders are not pressing cheese for sale and it would probably take 11c to 111-4c to get hold of fall makes. Butter firm and sales are of moderate volume. A good car of Kamouraska was sold here for 201-2c. Greamery is wanted for the Pacific but there is no quantity offering. Finest fall creamery 23c to 28 1-2c, finest Townships dairy 21c to 22c, finest western and finest Kamouraska 19.1-2c to 20c. The New York cheese market has been quiet but the market seems to be gaining a firmer position and supplies are not large. Cheaper stock is being looked after more closely than hitherto. New York exported to Britain last week 18,701 boxes. Retail market prices in Montreal: Print butter, choice, 25c to 28c, creamery 25c, good dairy 22c to 25c. Cheese, mild, 12c to 14c, strong 17c to 20:

Dressed Hogs.—Sales of a few car lots at \$6.50 to \$6.60 and of single hogs at \$7. Demand fair and prices steady.

Dressed Poultry.—Stock in prime condition sold quickly, weather being cold and favorable. Turkeys 10c to 11c, geese 71-2c to 8c, chickens 71-2c to 81-2c and ducks 10c.

Dry Goods.—The prevalence of extremely fine winter weather, coming, as it did this year, at least a fortnight before the Christmas festivities, has had a most beneficial influence on the general trade of the country, but dry goods, in particular, have reaped the benefit. Some wholesalers tell us that their letter orders for repeats are more numrous than usual, indicating a demand for all classes

ol goods. Travellers are looking forward to a good trade being done on their first trip out in January. Money re-receipts continue a subject of complaint but are also expected to improve in the early part of '94. Some European buyers are already home and others are on the way. Their views on European trade are fac from satisfactory, so far as immediate participants are concerned. reported that some domestic manufacturers have orders enough to keep looms going until the cold weather is over. Latterly there has been talk of large stocks in some lines and a probable reduction in staffs or working hours. This talk is doubtless due to uncertainties about the tariff which manufacturers would not tarili which manufacturers would not like to see reduced. A deputation to as-certain the views of the Government has been mooted. Retailers report large sales for the holidays and excellent display of staple, holiday and fancy goods are to be seen on all sides. Groceries.—The wholesale jobbers were found to be well employed and the volume of business appears to be fully equal to any former season. The question of payments is not uppermost at the moment, the great object being to get goods

booked and off to their destination. Several large dealers declared that their collections were fair, but it cannot be denied that most of them are carrying a good deal on their books. We have been shown recent advices from Yokohama. At tea report says: There has been a very small business done since the 8th inst., only 600 piculs having changed hands. Stocks have slightly increased, but the selection on offer confined chiefly to the lower grades. Prices are firm at a range of \$12 to \$35 per picul. Total settlements of the season to date amount to 220,200 piculs, against 225,200 last year. Late shipments were Empress of China 239,310 lbs-19,250 for Chicago and 220,060 Canada. S.S. Peru 70,418 lbs.-20,482 for Chicago and 49,936 San Francisco. S.S. Hankow 147,874 lbs.-20,620 for New York; 16,720 Chicago and 68,553 Canada. S.S. Victoria 23,163 lbs. for Pacific Coast. Export of tea to Canada from 1st May to recent date: Current season 6,438,773 lbs., 1892-93 6,585,489,1891-92 10,269 635, 1890-91 7,651,055,1889-90 6,031,423, 1888-89 4,630,653,1887-88 3,913,610. A growth of nearly 100 per cent. The total exports to all points, including United States. Canada, Europe, etc., rose from 23,531,537 lbs. in 1887-88 to 27,049,651 lbs. for the current season. Canada has increased her trade in Japan tens more than any other point of distribution. The speculation in coffee at New York diverted prices upward but the market failed to show a thoroughly strong and promising tone. Foreign markets were quiet and uninteresting. Receipts at Brazilian ports were 26,000 bags (two days) including 19,000 at Rio and 7,000 at Santos. Rio and Santos markets both steady. Rate of exchange at Rio was quoted at 10 1-4d. The stock of Brazil coffee in New York is 63,165 bags and in the United States 205,523 bags. Quantity allont is 286,000 bags, making the American visible supply 491,523, against 585.595 last year. Hops.—There is not much doing and the nominal range is 17c to 21c. New York State growers have been selling at 20c to 201-2c for choice and at 15c to 20c for seconds.

Iron and Hardware.-The annual drudgery of stock taking, and balancing up, has been going on and we hear of little new business. In season hardware there has been a fair turnover. At Philadelphia, the struggle for the small amount of iron and steel business has developed a surprising and unexpected decline in prices for January delivery. This decline af-fects plate and structural iron, and would extend to bars and sheets if winter buyers cared to purchase at this time. iron production is increasing, but only to meet actual needs. Southern makers have withdrawn extremely low quotations and are holding for firmer prices. A strong feature is the known depleted condition of stocks in hands of all consumers. Settled conditions, and a lit-tle more confidence will develop a sharp improvement in demand for everything from pig iron to steel rails. The south works of the Lackawanna iron and steel company, which employ 1,500 men, are resuming, and will go on double turn for an indefinite period. They have been almost continuously idle since last August. The Pennsylvania R.R. Co, has given an order for 48,000 tons of steel rails. This is to complete the double track on the Pittsburg, Fort Wayne and Chicago, between Crestline and Chicago.

Leather and Shoes.—The demand is light. Traders have been looking into their books and are not disposed to rush things, this being between essues. There


TORONTO WHOLESALE TRADE. (Revised by Telegraph.)
