Reports Covering Wide Area Tell Story of Material Improvement in Condition of Winter Wheat - Corn and; Oats Also Weaken in Sympathy.

CHICAGO, May 15.—Comprehensive reports indicating a material improvement in winter wheat since May and predicting that the June statement from the federal government would show a high condition for the spring crop, caused a sharp break in the wheat market to-day. Latest trading left prices heavy, ½c to 1½c under last night. Corn finished ½c lower to ¾c up; oats, off ½c to ½c to ½c, and provisions varying from 10c down to 5c up.

A hard fight took place between important forces in the wheat pit. One of the most widely known speculators on the board was credited with unloading a big line, while the owner of much of the cash wheat here was believed to be buying in a sweeping manner. There was also lively covering by shorts when the market gave way at last under the weight of orders from the longs.

Corn and Oats Sagged.

Altho for the most part corn showed

Aitho for the most part corn showed stubborn strength prices finally sagged when the wheat market dropped in earnest. Shortage in the May option was thought to be responsible for most of the firmness displayed by the coarser grain. Uniformly good crop reports had a bearish effect on oats; especially near the end fo the day. Opposite tendencies of wheat and corn made the feeling carlier nervous and unsettled.

Support from packers appeared to be the reason for an advance of 2½c to 5c for lard and ribs. The effect of larger receipts of hogs than expected was shown in pork by a setback of 7½c to 10c.
