In 1918 the legislature passed a total prohibition measure to come into effect on May 1, 1919, for "the duration of the war." The war ending before the act could be applied, the government compromised on the demands made from the liquor faction who demanded a continuance of complete "wet" privileges and those calling for the enforcement of the act, by submitting the question of the sale of beer and wine alone to the electors.

Calls for Appropriation of Three Hundred and Fifty Million Dollars.

TRADE CREDITS

White Vigorously Defends Government Policy-Opposition Doubts Security.

Special to The Toronto World. Ottawa, April 10.—Sir Thomas White in the house of commons this afternoon explained and defended the policy of the government in respect to establishing dollar credits in Canada for Great Britain, France, Belgium, Greece and Rumania. He said the times were abnormal and that we could not expect to sell our agricultural products and our manufactures in Europe unless we were pregared to finance our customers. Credits are, therefore, being extended to the governments of the countries already named. This would assure our far-mers, dairymen, lumbermen and manufacturers a good market abroad and prevent unemployment and stag-nation. During the war we had es-tablished credits in Canada for the imperial government which brought to this country a record-breaking era of prosperity. Mutiny of American Troops On Northern Russia Front

Washington, April 10.-The war department issued tonight an official statement confirming Associated Press advices from Archangel that what amounted to a mutiny occurred among the American troops there on March 30. A company of infantry, the message stated, refused to entrain for the front until personally urged to do so by Colonel George E. Stewart, commanding the American contingent. Open threats were made of general mutiny unless a definite statement from Washington insuring early withdrawal was forthcoming. The department has cabled for more information. From the message

received today officials were unable to ascertain whether a condition of mutiny has in fact developed in the past ten days. Pending fuller advices, no comment was forthcoming as to the course to be pursued. The official report makes the incident even more serious than the original press accounts. Intimations that a general feeling of unrest pervaded the entire force have come previously from General Ironsides, the British commander-in-chief. Both British and French troops have been involved, according to a rumor of similar incidents.

GENERAL MAURICE **ARRIVES IN CITY**

Refuses to Comment on the Charges Made Against Fifth Army.

UPHOLDS ARMISTICE

Says Foch Would Have Had to Call a Halt Anyhow.

General Sir Frederick B. Maurice, formerly director of military opera-tions of the British army, arrived in Toronto from Pittsburg just before noon yesterday, and was met at the Union Station by Brigadier-General Gunn, D.S.O.; Brigadier-General W. L. Shannon, G.O.C. M.D. No. 1; Sir Henry Pellatt, Mayor Church and Col. John B. MacLean. He was driven to the York Club, where he lunched and afterward met a number of news-paper men at headquarters on College street. He delivered a short address at the banquet in the armories last

The general discussed many phases of the war and the issues which were raised when the armistice was signed and what the aspect of the European situation is at the present time. Dressed in civilian clothes he has a soldierly bearing but not the aggressiveness of a military officer. Rather he has the face of a scholar and a civilian.

He refused to make any comment on the charges which he made against the government last year after the retreat of the fifth army, adding that the country had sufficient on its hands dealing with the European situation. He, however, maintained that he did not desire to retract anything which he said then

he said then.

General Maurice remarked that he had been in Toronto 40 years ago when his father was in charge of the when his father was in charge of the garrison at Halifax, but he had not yet found any spot in the city which he could remember.

Could Not Resume.

Several reasons were advanced by the distinguished visitor why he did not believe the war would be resumed in Europe between Germany and the allies. The allies have absolute con-trol of the air, having all the German planes, and they also have possession of two-thirds of the heavy artillery in all the world. "There may be up-risings which you may call Bolshevism, but as for fighting no."

Asked whether he thought a mis-take was made when the armistice was

signed and the Germans were not de feated on the field of battle he replied that the allied armies had pushed for-



From the last report of the La Rose company, it will be gleaned that unless the Violet proves up satisfactory the life of La Rose will not be long. The dispute regarding the boundary line between the O'Brien and the La Rose should come up in court here shortly. The future of La Rose operations on the Violet depends to a great extent on the result of the dispute.

Gold mining in South Africa last year showed a decrease, the total production being 174,668,320 ounces, compared with 186 503,360 in 1917, and 192,153,431 in 1916. It was a year of anxiety to the industry, for the shortage of labor was acute, and the influenza epidemic helped to make matters worse. The downward tendency continued during December; in 45 fact in every month of the year the value of gold produced was lower than in the corresponding month of 1917.






