# THE BOERS HAVE UP 21 MILES OF RAILWAY

## Interruption of Lord Roberts' Communications Was a Bold Stroke on the Part of the Raiders, and Is Vexatious.

### Kelly-Kenny is Expected to Restore Things, But There Will Necessarily Be Delay in Resuming Forward Movement—Buller Chasing the Enemy in His Own Territory.

London, June 11.—(3.30 a.m.)—The Boers have torn up 21 miles of Lord Roberts' line of railway between Amersfoort and Rooderiv. It is a bold raid, and does not disquiet the military authorities as yet, for they expect Gen. Kelly-Kenny to drive off the marauders and to reopen the line.

### The War Not Yet Over.

Nothing has been heard from Lord Roberts for three days. This raid on the railway, the strenuous opposition to Gen. Buller, and the nimble escape of Commandant-Gen. Botha's division, forces the War Office observers to the reluctant conclusion that the war is not yet over, and that the Boers are still in a position to do anything to change the result.

### Buller on a Chase Now.

Gen. Buller is in a hot chase. Despatches of correspondents from his front at sunset, describe the corps as camping at Ganselod, close to the point where the frontiers of the Free State, the Transvaal and Natal meet.

### Fought All Day.

The fighting on June 6, in which there were fewer than 20 casualties, was kept up all day long by musketry and artillery. The British attacking line, which was 1000 yards long, made its way, and the Boers, who had one gun, withdrew under heavy enfilade fire to a ridge just ahead of the camp.

### Boers Have Retired.

Gen. Buller says that the federals are understood to have 23 guns in position, but it is doubtful if they can remove them. Their only line of retreat is in the direction of Lydenburg. The report of yesterday's fighting was that the Boers ultimately decided not to surrender.

### Boers in Three Columns.

Gen. Sir Forester Walker says that the railway has been destroyed between Amersfoort and Rooderiv. The Boers are in three columns, one in the north, one in the middle, and one in the south. The British are sending detachments right and left to accept the surrenders of commandos, horses, cattle and forage, and so on.

# CHINESE PUZZLE HAS WET BEANS IN THE ST. LOUIS STORE

## Foreign Admirals, However, Have Begun Reconstruction of the Railway Between Tien Tsin and Pekin.

### Gangs of Workmen Are Protected by Foreign Marines, and 1500 Foreign Troops Have Started for Pekin—Japan is Very Restless and the General Situation is Growing Worse.

London, June 11.—(2.40 a.m.)—The Admiralty at Taku, acting in concert, are fortifying the railway from Tien Tsin to Pekin. Gangs of workmen are repairing the damaged line, which is guarded by 1500 men, composed of detachments from the foreign fleet. One hundred Americans, under Captain McCleary, are among them. They have guns and armored trains for use when the line is repaired, which can be effected by about all nationalities. Ten thousand troops of all nationalities, according to Shanghai, will be sent to Pekin to back up the demands of the Ministers upon the Government, or if necessary to suppress the Boers themselves.

### RUSSIA NOW HAS AN EXCUSE TO LAND MORE TROOPS, AND THIS SITUATION HAS BECOME DISTASTEFUL TO GRAVE.

London, June 9.—The situation in China to-night appears distinctly graver. The destruction of a Russian garrison at Tung Ting has provided Russia with the desired pretext to land more troops. The despatch from St. Petersburg this afternoon that the Government is moved, if the dangerous situation in China continues, to take immediate military action, at the same time declaring that it has no intention of disassociating itself from the joint action of the powers, may be regarded as a semi-official utterance, meaning that if there is any action on the part of the powers, Russia will act alone.

### Boers Movement Spreading.

All reports agree that the Boer movement is spreading. The report is confirmed that the French agents at Moug Tsou and Yon Man Fu have been compelled to retire and that the British consul at Shanghai has been ordered to leave the city. The Boers are spreading their operations to the north and west.

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# WIFE PERSONS KILLED IN THE ST. LOUIS STORE

## Four Men Were Shot by a Sheriff's Posse on Sunday and Two Men Are Dead—Twenty-One Prisoners Captured.

### Amazing Condition of Affairs in the Anarchy-Stricken City—Crowning Injury by the Mob Was the Stripping of Women Naked in the Streets—Shame to Civilization.

St. Louis, June 10.—Four in a party of 100 or more striking employees of the Transit Company, who were returning from a labor parade, were shot shortly after 6 o'clock this evening by a sheriff's posse in front of the temporary barracks on Washington-street. One is dead, two others wounded in the head and abdomen, will die, and the fourth will lose a hand.

### Twenty-One Prisoners Captured.

Just in front of the barracks occupied by the posse, a mob of strikers attempted to assault the crew of a passing street car. A brick was thrown and several shots were fired by the posse and several men were shot. The posse captured 21 prisoners.

### Another Man Killed.

One other shooting by a deputy sheriff is reported at the sheds of the Bellefontaine line. Fred Beel, 65 years old, was killed.

### EVENTFUL AND BLOODY SUNDAY

Numerous Encounters in Which the Strikers Suffered at the Hands of Officers.

St. Louis, June 10.—The day just ended has been one of the most eventful and bloody since the great strike on the St. Louis lines began, more than one month ago. There were numerous encounters between strikers and other individuals and the constituted authorities, resulting in three deaths and the wounding of five or more persons, mostly strikers.

### ST. LOUIS STRIKE ANARCHY.

Seven People Killed—Human Being Who Has Become Fiend—Women Stripped Naked in the Streets.

St. Louis, June 10.—The great strike on the St. Louis lines, which began on May 8, has taken the city in a loss of business. It is estimated that the loss of business is \$2,000,000. There is no immediate prospect of a settlement of the trouble despite the efforts of business men to bring about arbitration.

### THE RECENT EDICT

Had a Concealed Meaning and Was Favorable to the Boers—Missionsary Work Crushed.

Shanghai, June 10.—The edict recently issued had a concealed meaning, which expert scholars declare was favorable to the Boers. The American missionaries at Tung Chow urgently requested Minister Conger to send them a guard to escort his women and children to Pekin, the general in command having informed them that his soldiers refused to protect them.
