Close of Budget Debate Finds Government in Possession of Usual Majority.

RUSSIAN ATTACK REPELLED
BIT TO MAKE ANOTHER
Intellectual Bombardment on Thursday Reported Thru Russian Sources.
ISLANDERS FEROCIOUSLY DETERMINED TO BOTTLE UP RUSSIAN FLEET

St. Petersburg, Feb. 25.—(6 p.m.)—Rumors are in circulation here this afternoon to the effect that a bombardment of Port Arthur is now going on.
St. Petersburg, Feb. 25.—(4:32 p.m.)—Major-General Fufin (the chief of staff) telegraphed to the Emperor as follows under today's date: "The enemy again attacked Port Arthur from 1 to 3 a.m. and was everywhere repulsed. Details follow."

Following the despatch of Major-General Fufin, a correspondent of the Echo de Paris says the last, or second, Japanese attack at Port Arthur was repulsed brilliantly. He says the Japanese were again obliged to quit the peninsula. It is presumed that the entire squadron joined in the second attack, hoping to avenge the repulse of the preceding day. The Japanese are supposed to have incurred further losses during this long fight. Admiral Rozhanski has telegraphed to the Emperor that he has taken leave of his mother before going to the east, and he quotes the Emperor as having said: "THIS WAR MAY LAST EIGHTEEN MONTHS, BUT EVERY ARRANGEMENT HAS BEEN MADE THAT NO JAPANESE SOLDIER SHALL RETURN TO HIS COUNTRY."

These reports may safely be taken with much latitude, as they came wholly thru Russian sources, and Russian reports of victories and Russian boasting of starting off big but being whittled down fine as the days go by.

NO NEWS IN LONDON.
London, Feb. 25.—War correspondents and Europeans in Japan, continuing an emphasis upon the success of the Japanese, and their serving secrecy regarding all the operations of war, declare this conspiracy of silence is not only confined to government and service circles, but that it extends to every section of the community. All classes of people are submitting to a nervous and morbidly depressed state of mind, and are deprived of news, which they prize as imperative to the success of the Japanese cause. It is undoubtedly in pursuance of this policy that no Japanese account of the Port Arthur attacks has yet been published, and none is expected until Admiral Togo has completed his designs there.

Most Important Development.
In the meantime if the report from Tinkov of a Japanese landing near Vladivostok, which at present is based on missionary and native statements, should prove correct, the consequences would be of the most important and new development in the Japanese operations. It would mean that the Japanese had been able to land on the coast of the Japanese sea, and that they were seeking safety and defence. This reported advance has produced considerable interest among the civilians residing in the line of march. It is reported also the Russian government bureau at Vladivostok has withdrawn to Khavarsk.

Possett Bay is in Russian Manchuria, about 70 miles southwest of Vladivostok. Hunchun is on the bank of the Tumen River, and about 40 miles to the west of Possett Bay. Kirin is a big Manchurian town, and lies about 220 miles inland and to the west of Possett Bay. Kwangchengzi is about eighty miles west of Kirin. Khavarsk is about 400 miles to the north of Vladivostok, with which town it is connected by a railroad.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 25.—It is now said that the Russian Baltic squadron, comprising eight battleships, two armored cruisers, three protectors, and three torpedo boats, will leave for the far east at the end of June. It is added that the command is now held by Rear-Admiral Rojdestvensky.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—Replying to Earl Spencer, the leader of the Liberal party in the house of lords this afternoon, the first lord of admiralty, Lord Selborne, categorically denied the numerous stories recently printed of British partiality to Japan in the Russo-Japanese war. He said he feared there was some influence at work endeavoring to misrepresent the attitude of this country and to show that the British navy was not preserving strict neutrality in regard to the war.

JAPS NEAR VLADIVOSTOK
NOW OCCUPY HUNCHUN
MUKDEN AIMED AT
Strong Force Has Landed at Possett Bay and Will Operate With Main Army.

NEWCHWANG, Feb. 25.—A strong Japanese force is reported to have landed near Possett Bay, about seventy miles south of Vladivostok and to have occupied Hunchun, a town twenty miles inland. The Japanese are now marching on Kirin, 100 miles south of Harbin, and the terminus of a branch railway from the Manchurian main line. Should the movement be carried out effectually it will result in the cutting of the Russian line of communication thru Manchuria, but it is considered here that the real objective is Mukden, and that the movement will develop into a flank attack on that city in co-operation with the advance of the main army now approaching the Yalu River. In view of the risk attending the advance of a flanking force at such a distance from the main field of operations it is believed that the Japanese intelligence department is dispatching a detachment of troops to Possett Bay and to Hunchun, and that they are now being made and the result of which may have an important influence on the land campaign.

PEKIN, Feb. 25.—The director-general of Chinese railways reports that 100 Russian infantrymen, an officer, a gun and a large supply of ammunition are at Liao-yung, that 200 Russian cavalrymen and two guns have arrived at Lialichang. These towns are both on the west side of the Liao River. The director-general reports also the Manchurian railroad is guarded by detachments of Cossacks of 30 men each, who occupy high watch towers at intervals of a mile.

TO MEMORIALIZE GOVERNMENT.

To Amend Act re Bridge Inspection
—Western Ontario Good Roads Ass'n Concludes Session.

Many matters for reaching in their influence as affects the welfare of the Province of Ontario were under discussion at yesterday's annual gathering of the Western Ontario Good Roads Association. While every latitude was afforded the members for the discussion of matters more directly in touch with the rural districts, the under field of legislation and national affairs came well within the scope of the gathering. It would be difficult to select from any gathering a more representative and influential body of men than the members composed of men from the member counties. And not alone are a careful analysis of their viewpoints by County Clerk Rampton elicited information that their average weight is fully 200 lbs.

A most interesting discussion was the proposal to introduce into the present Act re Bridge Inspection, Mr. Macdonald's amendments which would be the use of the wide tire, and also a standard width in the matter of weight, making them, instead of 3 ft. 2 in., the present width, uniform with the wagon, or 4 ft. 8 in. He gave many good reasons why the change should be made, citing numerous fatal accidents due in part to the fact that the tracks were not of equal width. Mr. Shaver of Waterloo, endorsed the doctrine of wide tires, while his fellow committee member, Mr. Channing of Victoria, was opposed to the move. Mr. Wentworth questioned the right of the council to introduce legislation in regard to wide tires.

Major Bruce of Simcoe questioned the right of the association to memorialize the government on the subject of bridge inspection. Street Commissioner Jones briefly addressed the convention.

It was finally moved by R. F. Miller and C. E. Landy that the Western Ontario Good Roads Association be authorized to petition the provincial government to amend Section 132 of the Municipal Act of 1902, giving power to the council of a municipality or to a government engineer, to examine bridges affected by said section from time to time as they may be required, or repaired, and to determine what should be the proper length, and that the engineer's report should be laid upon the township and county aldermen. The motion was unanimously adopted.

The sum of \$50 was donated by Mr. Farwell for his valuable services in the office of the association. The legislative committee chosen for the year were elected. They are R. R. Brett (Essex), Daniel Quillan (Simcoe), Norval Hays (Welland), J. D. Leck (London), Roy Wood (Victoria), Peter Christie (York), Luther W. Turner, J. A. Macdonald (Waterloo), and the president and secretary.

Toronto was chosen as the next place of meeting.

ABOLISH COMPARATIVE LITERATURE.

It is expected that before long the practice adopted by a number of the Canadian companies to publish comparative literature of any description, will be made general, which would undoubtedly result in a higher standard.

The association secured an amendment to the Nova Scotia Insurance Act of 1903, by which the undesirable clause was repealed, which held "that the case of the insured shall in all cases be determined within three years from the time the policy of insurance is effected, otherwise the case shall be determined in such policy shall be conclusive proof of such age."
