## WHEAT PRICES **AGAIN DECLINE**

Disturbing Industrial and Financial Conditions Are Responsible for Slump.

Chicago, Feb. 1.—Untoward industrial and financial conditions, together with a big new break in Argentine prices, led to a sharp setback today in the wheat market here. The close was week at 4 to 5% cents net lower, with March \$1.55 to \$1.55½ and May \$1.42½ to \$1.44. Corn finished unchanged to %c down; oats off %c to %c and provisions at 15 to 40 cents decline.

Notwithstanding efforts of some buils to show that the U. S. wheat trade is at present a virtually domestic basis, a big discount on Argentine wheat, as compared with domestic, proved to be a heavy weight on the market. Explanations that the acute depression of values in Argentina was due to financial difficulties screed only to emphasize bearish sentiment. Downturns in European exchange counted also a depressing factor, and so, too, did the railroad wages controversy and the apparent unlikelihood of favorable action on the emergency tariff bill. On the resulting breaks, expert business totaling 600,000 busitels was noted. Nevertheless the close was at the bottom prices of the session, with May at the lowest level yet for the crop. All deliveries of corn and oats touched new low record prices, but profit taking brought about ralies. The declines were ascribed to sympathy with wheat and to liberal receipts of corn.

Provisions went lower, reflecting the course of hogs and grain.
