WILL NOT TELL WHEREABOUTS

Speculation Regarding Movements of Vladivostok Squadron --- Russians Repulsed in Small Land Engagement --- Japan Says France Must Make Explanation.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 12.—The admiralty declines to divulge any information which is not the property of the Vladivostok division which are reported to be off the coast of Japan, but the impression prevails in naval circles that setting under the instructions of Vice-Admiral Rojstvenky, they have passed through the Tsuruga Straits into the Pacific on a reconnaissance to ascertain if the passage is free of mines and feasible for Rojstvenky's squadron, and also to threaten Japanese commerce.

Japs on the Move. Godeyadana, May 11.—A movement of the Japanese has been observed on both flanks to the westward, mainly small bodies of cavalry and Chinese bands, evidently endeavoring to ascertain the Russian dispositions. But to the eastward Japanese in considerable force appear to be concentrating on the line held by the Russian advance troops and gradually occupying the roads and passes.

France Must Explain. TORONTO, May 12, 10 a. m.—France's latest assurance of neutrality causes the situation somewhat, but does not remove the popular resentment against her. The press urges the government to maintain a strong attitude toward France and demand explanations, saying that it is necessary that France explain events between May 3 and May 9.

Russians Beaten Back. TOKYO, May 11.—The following telegram from Army headquarters in Manchuria was officially published today: On the morning of May 9, the enemy, consisting of two regiments of infantry, five squadrons of cavalry and one battery of artillery made an attack in the vicinity of Yungcheng from the direction of Nanchangchun which is 15 miles east of Yungcheng.

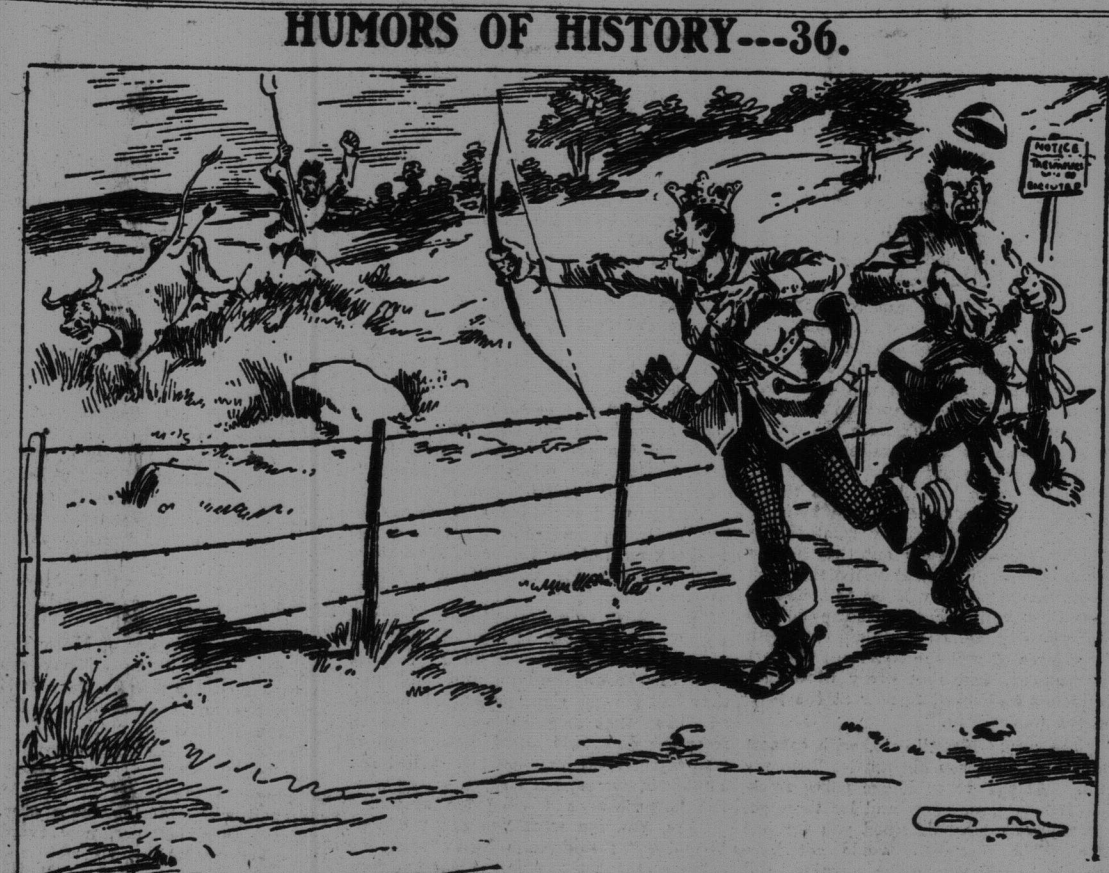

LIST OF DEAD STILL GROWS. Twenty Bodies Already Taken From Harrisburg Railway Wreck—Many Others Have Undoubtedly Perished as Well.

HARRISBURG, Pa., May 12.—The exact number of lives lost in South Harrisburg yesterday morning, caused by the crash of the second section of the Cleveland and Cincinnati express into a car of dynamite in a wrecked freight train, is not yet known. Eleven bodies have been identified and nine charred corpses await recognition at the temporary morgue. The railroad company has heard reports of missing people and received many telegrams enquiring about passengers on the ill-fated express.

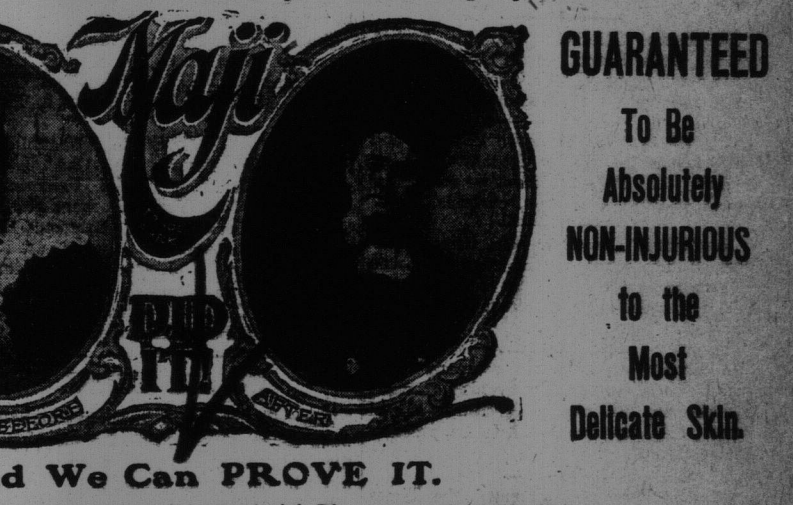
