# British, French, Russians and Belgians All Win Successes Over The Enemy; London Rejoices Over Glorious Victory

Greater Progress on West Front InTwo DaysThan Had Been Made In Whole Preceding Year

KAISER MUST CHOOSE ONE OF TWO ALTERNATIVES

Smashing Offensive Continuing Today Along the Teutonic hordes, or will they enlist and strike while there is Entire Front in Champagine and More German Positions Have Been Occupied--Advance Along More Than 25 Miles

London, Sept. 27.—In two days the French and British have gained greater results than in the preceding twelve months of fighting. Since the battle of the Marne, with upwards of 20,000 German prisoners in their hands and something like thirty guns without counting machine guns, and with a formidable breach in the German line, the allies apparently have their long expected offensive movement well under way. The advance has been general and its effect is emphasized by the fact that on the eastern front a substantial gain for the Russians is recorded.

Petrograd states that the army of Gen Ivanoff has won a striking victory over the Gers outheastern theatre, where 1,000 prisoners are said to have been taken.

"Along the entire front, from the sea to the Vosges, the enemy fire has increased. It has especially been violent east of Ypres, between the canal of La Bassee and Arras and also in Champagne from Prosnes to Argonne. After severe artillery preparations which at some points lasted fifty hours, the expected attack began.

"Between the railways of Ypres, Roulers and Commines, the British attacked early in the morning. The attacks on the northern wings have already been repulsed after hand-to-hand fighting before and in our positions. They are further attacking to the northeast and the southeast of Armentieres and north of La Bassee Canal.

"In Carnia, on the 23rd, after an intense artillery action along our whole front, the enemy attempted two successive attacks, but was repulsed on each occasion."

### Hard Nut To Crack, Says Expert But Looks With Confidence On Allies' Future On Western Front

London, Sept. 27—Colonel Repington, a noted military expert, discussing the Franco-British advance in this morning's Times, says to "We have a hard nut to crack now that we have passed to the offensive. The ground in front of us is honeycombed with trenches, and the Germans have all the best of the ground. We have no natural line of defence to lighten our task. All the ridges to the east are occupied by the enemy and the Scheldt and the Meuse, in our front, have been fortified by them.

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### RAFTS BREAK UP IN RIVER UNDER STRESS OF STORM

### CLOSELY LINKED IN GREAT BLOW IN ALLIES' CAUSE

Success on All Fronts Well Planned Movements--Paris View of Victory Days

(Special cable to Halifax Evening Mail)
Paris, Sept. 27.—Not since the battle of the Marne have General Joffre's forces attained such a pronounced and clear cut success as the one tersely described in yesterday's communication. The advance along the seventeen miles to a depth of sometimes nearly three miles across strongly fortified entrenchments disproves the generally held theory of a deadlock on the western front and is clear proof of the contention that General Joffre can get the Germans into the lopen when he wishes.

Of the highest significance is the fact that the Champagne victory comes at a homement when good news for the allies is made known from all the fronts. During the last two days the Germans, who for almost three weeks had been harbassed by a perfect avalanche of shells is long the western front, have, with the Austrians, been fighting the bloodiest bottles in the eastern region while Taly, has advanced to within ten miles east of Treets, each one of them a separate success; they are all closely linked in one well planned blow for the allies' cause.



# **BULGARIA TO GET** AT TURKISH FORCES

With Italy, Greece and Servia, they possess every means of erecting a barrier to the Austro-German entrance of Bulgaria, and of holding a new enemy in check on the Hungarian plains. A certified copy of the claim of appeal was requested by the appealant. Mrs. Dewolf is the only child of the late Mr. Flerreshoff, who died last August. The trusteeship is limited to a period of fairty-five years.

London, Sept. 27—The Franco-British
forces have undoubtedly proved their
superiority. It is impossible to estimate the amount of booty captured by the allies, but a conservative estimate place it at hundreds of machine guns and many thousands of rifles taken from the enemy, who could not withstand the terrific assaults of the magnificent troops commanded by Sir John French.



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

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### Allies Begin Offensive With Glorious Victory

German Line Broken in the West-20,000 Germans, Field Guns and Much Other Material Captured in British and French Advances

London, Sept. 26—More than 20,000 German prisoners, of whom 200 are officers, a vast quantity of guns and war material, what sum is not yet known, but which include at least twenty-four field guns and the whole of the German first line of fortifications at one point over a width of five miles to a depth of two and one-half miles and at another over a width of fifteen miles to a similar depth have in two days of desperate fighting fallen into the hands of the French and

These two gains, the greatest by far for the Allies in the west since the victory of the Marne, came as a result of two tremendous and simultaneous assaults delivered at points 100 miles apart on the opposite sides of the large salient which forms the German position

in Northern France.

The French struck north at the German lines in eastern Champagne on the verge of the forest of Argonne, between Auberive and Ville-Sur-Tourbe. From this point the line runs nearly due west to a point near Compiegne, where it turns north to Arras and Ypres. It is north of Arras and just south of LaBassee that the British attacked with the French supporting them on the flank. In point of actual ground gained and of the number of prisoners, taken the French assault was the more successful but as far as the immediate tactical results are concerned the British victory is likely to prove more fruitful, because it gave them Hil 70, north of Lens, and only a mile from the outskirts of that city which must now be regarded as in imminent danger of capture.

in imminent danger of capture.

On the other hand the French by their victory in Champagne have nullified at a blow all the results gained by the German Crown Prince in the Argonne in the course of months of desperate attacks on the flank of the great French stronghold of Verdun.

FIRST LINE CARRIED IN RUSH.

In both assaults, however, the actual amount of ground gained is overshadowed by the fact that as admitted by the Germans themselves the Allies carried almost in one rush the whole depth of the German first line of fortifications, consisting of three, four or even five concrete lined trenches each 100 or 200 yards behind the one in front of it bristling with machine guns, trench mortars and howitzers and strengthened by labyrinths of underground burrows and bomb proofs, the work of months of labor and planned by the most skilled military engineers in Germany.

These fortifications have been in existence for nearly a year and have been constantly strengthened in every way that German ingenuity could suggest until their holders themselves believed them virtually impregnable to any assault the Allies could make against them, and in fact hitherto neither French nor English have ever, in their most furious assaults, been able to do more than gnaw away the outer lines one by one at no faster than the Germans were able to

In the fighting of the last two days, however, the Allies practically in one rush broke clear through this elaborate network of fortifications into the open country behind and thereby compelled the Germans to fall back over a considerable front to their reserve




