Story of English Battleship of Amazing Proportions to be Most Powerful War Vessel Afloat

New York, April 12—According to a report from London received by the Tribune, England has laid down a new battleship of amazing proportions, which wil be by far the most powerful craft afloat. It will mark a change in battleship construction, exceeding that which came when the first dreadnought kind of a naval engager was built. LONDON PAPER SAYS
