It is Because Women Become Adults So Soon and Men Always Retain a "Little Boy" Side That the Two Sexes Can Never Really Understand Each Other

A VERY clever man once said to me that the reason why no woman can ever understand a man is because men are perfectly simple creatures and this simplicity completely baffles the complex feminine mind.

A MAN, for instance, eats because he is hungry. He laughs because he is amused. He does a thing because he wants to do it. He buys what he wants because he wants it. He says what he thinks. He has no motive beyond gratifying the impulse of the moment. But a woman never can be like this, because whatever she does is the result of a thousand desires, plans, schemes and purposes.

THEREFORE, she is always seeking the hidden, secret meaning which doesn't exist in the actions of men and attributing to them motives of which they are as guileless as babes unborn.

FOR the woman herself would never eat just because she is hungry. She would be counting her calories and considering the taste, suitability, thrift and what other people will say and think about it enter into her smallest purchases.

ALL of this may be true, but I think that the real reason why women cannot understand men is because men never grow up and women get so terribly mature. A little boy lives to the end of his life in the heart of every man, but the little girl that is in a woman's soul dies by the time she is 15 years old.

NO matter how old men get or how successful they become or how much money they make, they can still take pleasure in childish things. They are fascinated by mechanical toys. There are a thousand men radio fans to one woman who enjoys it.

MEN can spend hours fussing over fishing lines and planning hunting and fishing trips that they know in the backs of their heads they will never go on. And their idea of having a perfectly good time is to go off to some place where they can wear their oldest and shabbiest clothes and go wild about shooting. Nearly every man would die on having a collection of some sort of his wife would only let him.

EVEN a man's pockets, with their unnecessary load of junk—old letters and stubs of pencils and keys to forgotten locks and lucky coins—are the survival of the small boy's pocketful of fishing worms and string and tops and marbles and all-day suckers.

BUT when a woman is grown up she is done with childish things forever. Her husband may pine to go back to the old swimming hole of his boyhood, but she doesn't want to go back and play dolls in a corner of the living room again. She has real babies and how to get old-fashioned mahogany and period furniture for her house. No do simple things allure her. Her taste has become sophisticated and calls for caviar, not bread and butter.

IT is because women are so much more mature than their husbands—they are so much older, in reality—that much of the conflict between them occurs. The responsibilities of life press heavily upon the wife. She looks anxiously forward toward the future. She thinks of the time when the children will have to be educated, when old age will come upon her, and she feels that they should work and save. So she nags her husband about getting on and about laying up something for the rainy day.

THE little boy in her husband resents this. He wants to enjoy the moment, and he refuses, with the irresponsibility of childhood, to look any further than the present moment. He comes to look upon his wife as a wet blanket who takes all of the pleasure out of everything by her objections and her admonitions.

AND so he treats her just as he did his mother when she kept reminding him of his chores. He ducks out of sight and hearing as often as he can. Many a woman loses her husband because she cannot realize that virtually all men are Peter Pans who never grow up and who must have playmates, and if their wives won't play with them they will find some Wendy who will.

PERHAPS the real reason that middle-aged men almost invariably pick out girls young enough to be their daughters for playmates is because nothing but a flapper is really as young as are the boys who are their other wives.

IT is because women grow up and men stay little boys that it is so hard for wives to realize that even when their husbands stray a little off the straight and narrow path they are really not as wicked as they seem to be and do not mean the offense against their wives that they think they do.

THE wife who sins against her husband is unfaithful to him in every fibre of her body and heart. She has ceased to love him. Here is the crime of premeditation and deliberation. But ninety-nine times out of a hundred the man still loves his wife, still admires her more than any other woman in the world.

BUT he had the little boy's irresistible impulse to play hooky and run away from home, and when it is all over with he is sorry and ready to take his spanking and be good. He wants to come back and be forgiven.

AND for the life of him he cannot see why his wife doesn't do as his mother did—turn him over her knee and take the hair-brush to him, and then kiss him and forget it. It is because men are simple and women are complicated; because wives have the viewpoints of adults and husbands that of kids that men and women can never understand each other.

AND perhaps that is why they are perpetually fascinating to each other. But they make a cross-word puzzle all right!

HEALTH SERVICE. Hair and Skin Denote Health of Children. By DR. MORRIS FISHBURN. The hair of the healthy child normally is plentiful and should have a lustre, which is due to the presence of sufficient oil.

MENUS For the Family

\$140,000,000 IS BID IN BIG FORECLOSURE SALE OF RAILWAY

Offer For Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul Will Be Put to Federal Court

BUTTE, Mont., Nov. 22.—The greatest foreclosure proceeding in history was carried through here today when the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad was offered at public sale and drew one bid of \$140,000,000.

The bid was made by representatives of the reorganization committee headed by Kuhn, Loeb & Company, and the National City Bank, New York City, and will be submitted to the Federal Court in Chicago on December 13 for approval.

OFFERED IN FIVE LOTS

The road was offered in five lots, \$28,000,000 being bid for the lines west of Moberg, South Dakota; \$67,500,000 for the lines east, or \$110,000,000 for the entire physical property, twelve million five hundred thousand was offered for the road's investments and securities, but instead of limiting the bid to the upset price of \$128,000,000, the bidders offered \$140,000,000. The offer was made by Robert T. Swaine and Donald C. Swainland, representing the reorganization committee to whom they will assign their interests in the bid.

The road is the first line of such magnitude to go up on the auction block. The difficulties which forced it into the courts arise from its inability to meet indebtedness which on January 1, 1925, totalled more than \$66,000,000, and which included two groups of bonds, one covering the entire line and another, called the Puget Sound bonds, covering the latter construction between Moberg and the Pacific Coast.

Allan, in a dance, and Jack Holland, imitating Beatrice Lillie, close the opener. While Newman has several good songs on this program, including "The Red, Red Robin," "I'd Find You," in addition to one of those classic duets with Ross Hamilton, who also has several fine offerings, including "Over a Garden Wall" which had very clever setting, and "Let Me Call You Sweetheart." Although the famous "Marjorie" got out of a sick bed half an hour before the performance opened, he displayed his abilities as a female impersonator in splendid style and was warmly welcomed.

Pat Rafferty and Morley Plunkett had side-splitting songs, the former's including "Egyptian Mummy," and "I don't like to do 'Marjorie'." Mr. Allan made a remarkable effort in this number.
