LABOR MINISTER TO VISIT CAPE BRETON

MURDOCH TO LEAVE ON PEACE MISSION TO N. S.

Asks Activities to Cease Pending His Arrival

MORE OUTRAGES CORPORATION AND OTHER STORES IN NORTH AND SOUTH ARES LOOTED

SYDNEY June 15—The announcement that Hon. James Murdoch, Minister of Labor was leaving for Cape Breton in an endeavor to mediate the differences between the British Empire Steel Corporation and the United Mine Workers of America; the movement early this morning of a detachment of troops to New Aberdeen to guard the power station, believed to have been menaced by striking miners, and the further looting and burning of corporation stores, in both the northern and southern areas, were among the more important developments in Nova Scotia's industrial struggle over the weekend.

The Minister of Labor had previously declined the invitation of the men to come to Cape Breton and arbitrate the dispute on the ground that the corporation had declined to be a party to such an arrangement. Following the attack and wrecking of the power plant at New Waterford, it is believed the minister was again urged to extend his good offices and yesterday's telegram of acceptance, coupled with the request that all improper activities cease pending his arrival, was received with undisputed satisfaction.

MORE LOOTING.

SYDNEY, N. S., June 15—An attempt early this morning to loot the warehouse of the British Empire Steel Corporation at Glace Bay was frustrated by the town police assisted by the special constables recruited from the ranks of the United Mine Workers of America. An entrance had been effected and approximately 30 were engaged in the work of looting when the police appeared, according to Chief of Police George Costey. The raiders were ordered out, and went, without a show of resistance.

The night's activities also included the ransacking of three privately owned stores in the Caledonia district. A small coal rack, near No. 2 bankhead, was on fire early this morning, but the blaze was extinguished before much damage had been occasioned. In the northern area, a mob of upward of 1,000, raided Campbell Brothers dry goods store, and cleaned it out. An attempt to raid the warehouse of the Mutual Warehouses Company, was frustrated by the police.

INQUEST HELD

SYDNEY, N. S., June 15—Inquiry into the death of William Davis, who was shot in Thursday's riots, was concluded at New Waterford before Coroner D. J. Hartigan, M. D., Saturday, with Arthur Burke, foreman. Dr. J. C. Morrison said that death was due to a bullet which entered at the right side, passed through the heart and came out at the left side. George Derride, minea, said he was standing behind Davis when the latter was shot. A policeman was standing to the left of them, some six to eight feet distant. Derride said the officer pointed the gun at him, but he dropped to escape fire, and Davis fell on top of him. Witness crawled into the bush.

Neil McKinnon, minea, said: "Davis was lying down when I noticed him. I did not see him fall. I saw three policemen galloping down the road, shooting as they came. The crowd was standing in the road, and the officers went through them, shooting as they went."

THREE POLICEMEN

Witness could identify three policemen; one of them was Joe McLeod. "We found McLeod under a wind-fall that turned over. Someone pulled No. 11 badge off him." Witness said that he did not see the badge. He stated that Murray Andrews was one of the policemen. "I thought that as Andrews knew me quite well he wouldn't shoot me, but when he was passing he shot right at me. He wasn't firing into the air, either."

The following verdict was rendered: "The deceased came to his death by a bullet wound fired from a gun in the hands of a policeman of the British Empire Steel Corp. force."

AMERICAN SOCIETY DENIES CANCER INCURABLE

N. B. Native, Holding Deeds To Valuable Property In Province, Fined As Vagrant

TORONTO, June 15—Alexander Firmingham, middle aged, who says he was born at Bathurst, N. B., was fined \$5 and costs on a charge of vagrancy by Magistrate Brunton in the county police court Saturday. According to the story related by Firmingham, he left a college in Montreal, where he had been studying, to return home and see about his property. He then decided to visit his sisters, who live in Philadelphia and Boston. He said he was going to walk to the Pacific coast first, but after he got to Toronto he found it too hot. He was just returning to Montreal to resume his studies when he was arrested 14 miles outside this city. He was very shabbily dressed when he was arrested.

HOPE FOR WHITE STAR SAILINGS FROM HERE

Port Committee to Send Word to Sir Henry Thornton Telling of Accommodation Here and Asking for C. N. R. Freight Shipments.

THROUGH negotiations now being carried on by a sub-committee of the Port Committee it is hoped to have the White Star-Dominion Line ships sailing from Saint John next winter, it was said this morning by Commissioner Bullock. A letter has been drafted and will be sent to Sir Henry Thornton pointing out that this port can accommodate these vessels and that if the C. N. R. can find freight for them at Portland, Me., it can do so at this port.

WAS MANY YEARS IN EMPLOY OF C. N. R.

Andrew McCabe, Newcastle, Dies Today—Joined Service in 1875.

Special to The Times-Star. NEWCASTLE, June 15—The death of Andrew McCabe, well known locomotive engineer, occurred at his home here this morning. Mr. McCabe, who has been retired on pension since 1915, was one of the oldest engineers on the north division of the C. N. R., entering the service in the year 1875. On becoming an engineer he ran for years on passenger and freight service between Newcastle and Campbellton and later piloted the branch train between Newcastle and Indiantown. He retired about 15 years ago after a serious heart ailment at Derby Junction. Mr. McCabe served the aldermanic board of Newcastle for two years. He was also a member of the Provincial Board of Health.

STATEMENTS AT MEDICAL MEET ARE PROTESTED

The Public Is Asked to Co-operate in Fight

VALUE OF RADIUM Claims Surgery and X-Ray of Stages of Disease

United Press. NEW YORK, June 15—Cancer can be cured and thousands of lives sacrificed to the disease could have been saved had the public co-operated with the medical profession in making use of information now available, according to a statement prepared by the American Society for the Control of Cancer. The statement was prompted by stories emanating from the meetings of the American Medical Association in Atlantic City recently to the effect that cancer was inheritable, infectious, incurable and inevitably fatal.

CAN BE CURED

"Cancer can often be cured," the statement said. "Thousands of persons in the United States can bear testimony to this fact. No medicine, serum or diet has been produced which will cure cancer.

CANADIAN S FATALY SHOT AT U. S. BORDER

Montreal Man and Six Chinese Are Held In Jail

WERE IN MOTOR Charges of Smuggling Aliens is Laid Against Those Arrested

NEWPORT, Vt., June 15—Eugene Lamotte of Montreal was shot by United States immigration patrolmen last night, at Westfield, near the Canadian border, and died in a hospital here a few hours later. Timothy M. Baker of Montreal and six Chinese whom the authorities say the men were smuggling across the border were lodged in jail here.

ONTARIO TOWN IS NEARLY WIPED OUT

\$200,000 Loss in Hagersville Results From Fire in Chinese Laundry.

Hamilton, Ont., June 15—Fire early this morning, razed almost the entire business section of Hagersville, Ont., causing loss estimated at \$200,000. The blaze broke out shortly after midnight in a Chinese laundry, rapidly spreading to the important building of the town. The local brigade vainly sought to halt the flames, but equipment was limited to a single chemical engine. There was no loss of life.

79 EARTH SHOCKS FELT IN FORMOSA

TOKYO, June 15—Despatches from Kanton, Formosa, report severe earthquake shocks beginning Sunday morning, at 2:30 o'clock, and continuing into the afternoon. Extensive damage to houses and buildings was reported. Seventy-nine shocks were noted. No casualties were reported.

LOUCHER OPTIMISTIC

Former French Minister Says Country Well Off and Flourishing.

ROUBAIX, France, June 15—Louis Louchet, former Minister of Commerce, and one of France's foremost financial authorities, in a speech here yesterday, said he found solid reasons for optimism in France's financial situation, in that the country was well off and flourishing as a whole. He thought, however, that the government ought to assure the public that the coming effort would be final.

EXPIRES IN PULPIT

SHERBROOKE, Que., June 15—A. Z. Couture, chief of the Sherbrooke fire and police departments, passed away yesterday from diabetes. He was 60 years old on the day of his death, entered the services of the local department at the age of 21 years. The funeral will be held on Wednesday.

Woman Is Sentenced as Head of Anti-Soviet Bandit Gang

KIEV, June 15—Mme. Marusa Tretyko, wife of a Russian colonel, has been sentenced to death for her activities as head of a notorious group of anti-Soviet bandits who terrorized the whole of the Ukraine for more than two years. Seven of her band were also condemned to be shot and thirteen others were given long prison terms. The indictment against Mme. Tretyko said she personally led assaults against Soviet factories and other institutions, killing and robbing the communist employees and also murdering agents of the Cheka or political police.

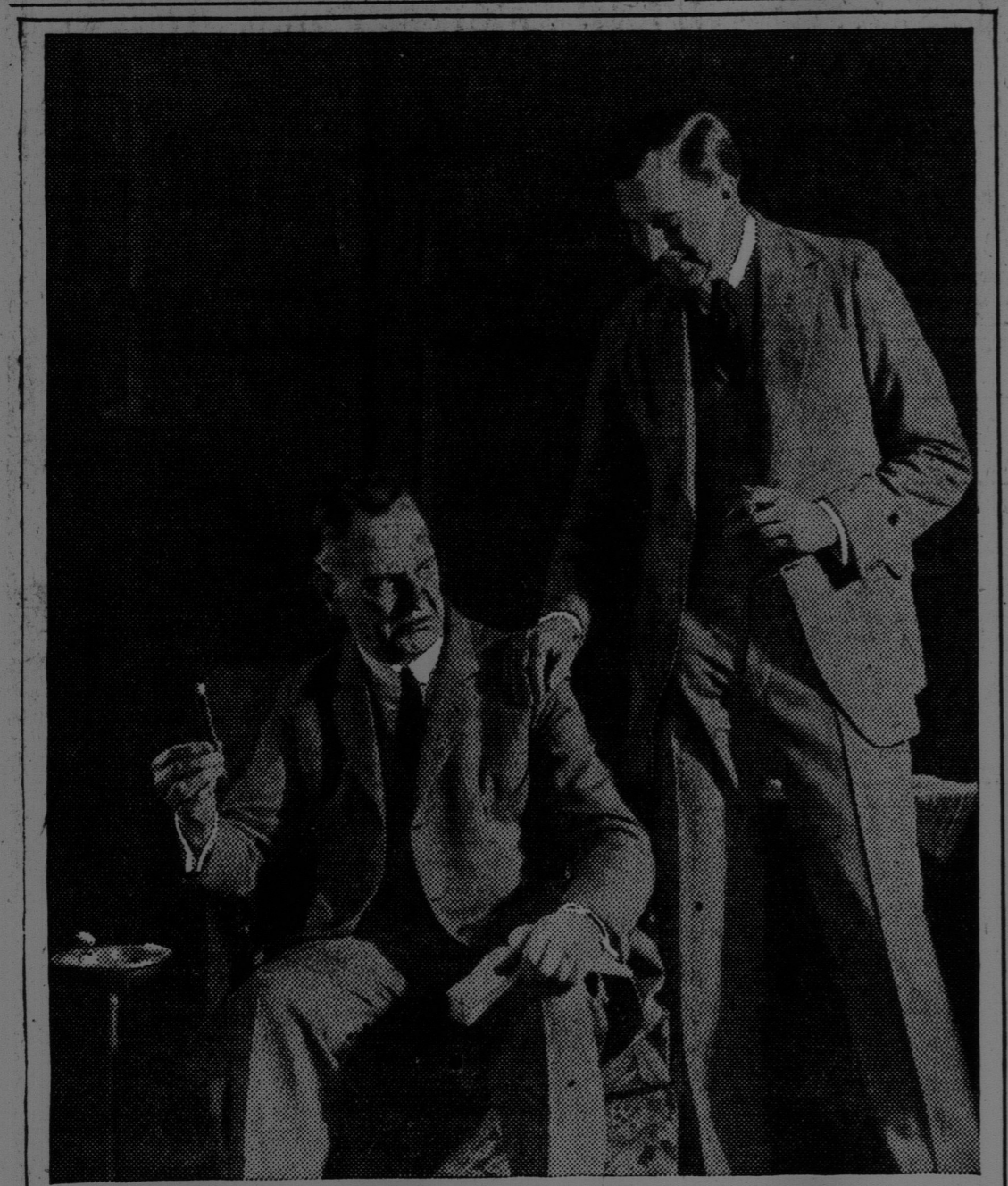

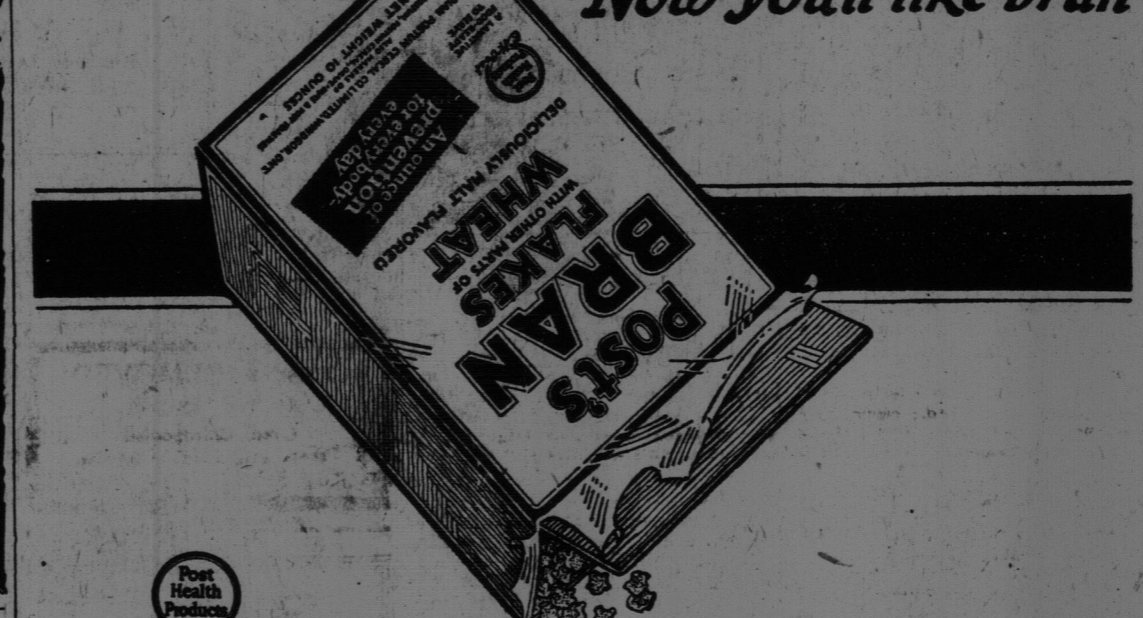

THE CAPE BRETON TROUBLE

Violence in the Cape Breton coal mining region, creating the necessity for sending troops to the scene, materially changes the whole situation, for now the merits of the dispute are overshadowed by the greater issue of law and order.

It is announced from Ottawa that important steps looking to the restoration of order, and apparently also to the settlement of the dispute, are to be taken by the federal government, though the nature of the contemplated action is not yet disclosed.

The long sustained idleness has done Nova Scotia great economic harm. Business conditions throughout the province have been seriously depressed. The dispute is one of great bitterness, and it has become clear that guidance and pressure on the part of the higher authorities will be necessary in order to bring about peace and the resumption of work.

The maintenance work necessary to prevent the flooding of the mines should never have been interfered with. Aside altogether from other features of the dispute, there could be no excuse for any action leading to the injury or destruction of the mines or of mining property.

SIR WILLIAM PETERSENS' DEATH

The tragic death of Sir William Petersen appears to have been directly due to excitement and disappointment in connection with his contract for an ocean steamship service which has been the subject of extended controversy at Ottawa.

NO FREEDOM TO TALK ANARCHY

Some of those who would like to have it understood that freedom of speech includes the individual right to advocate the destruction of constituted authority by force recently challenged the constitutionality of the New York Criminal Anarchy Act, a measure widely designed to provide for the suppression of incendiary talk.

That law has just been upheld by a decision of the United States Supreme Court, which once more makes it clear that free speech and criminal license are not the same, and that the state's right to forbid and punish sedition cannot be questioned.

That conviction has now been upheld by the highest court of the country. A dissenting member of the court, Mr. Justice Holmes, in a minority report, said of some of the incendiary language quoted in support of the contention that the law under review was necessary, and that the accused was guilty, "had no chance of starting a present conflagration."

Not only New York but California, Michigan and several other states have laws of the character of that which the court has sustained. These are well devised to reach and to restrain incendiaries who desire to incite others to sedition and to revolution, while at the same time seeking to shelter themselves behind the privilege of free speech.

LIVING COSTS

Figures compiled by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and the Labor Department of Canada indicate that while the cost of living has changed little in Canada since the end of 1921, the Canadian dollar to-day has more purchasing power at home than the American dollar has in the United States.

The cost of living in the United States has not receded more rapidly than in Canada. Here costs are but slightly lower than in 1922, and there is not much prospect that food prices will fall in the near future or that there will be much change in the cost of living.

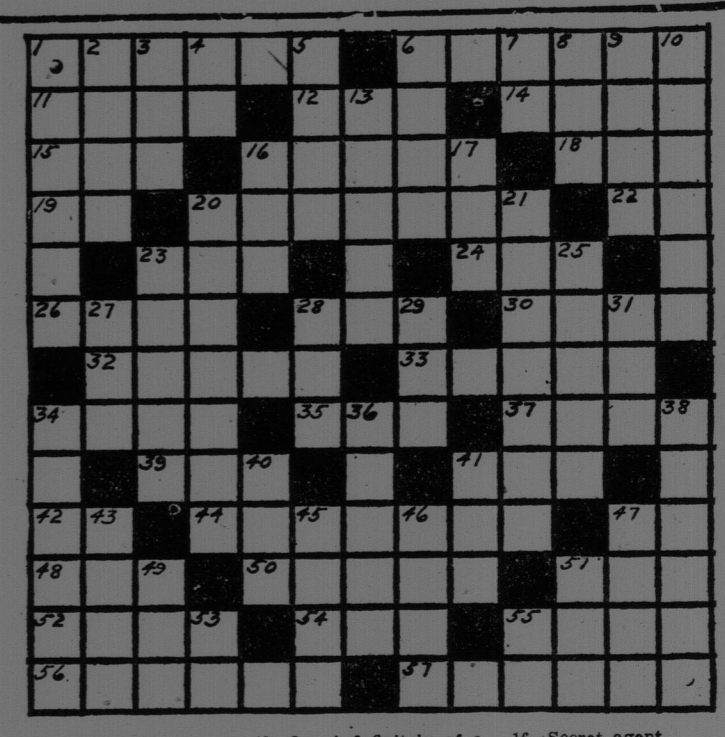

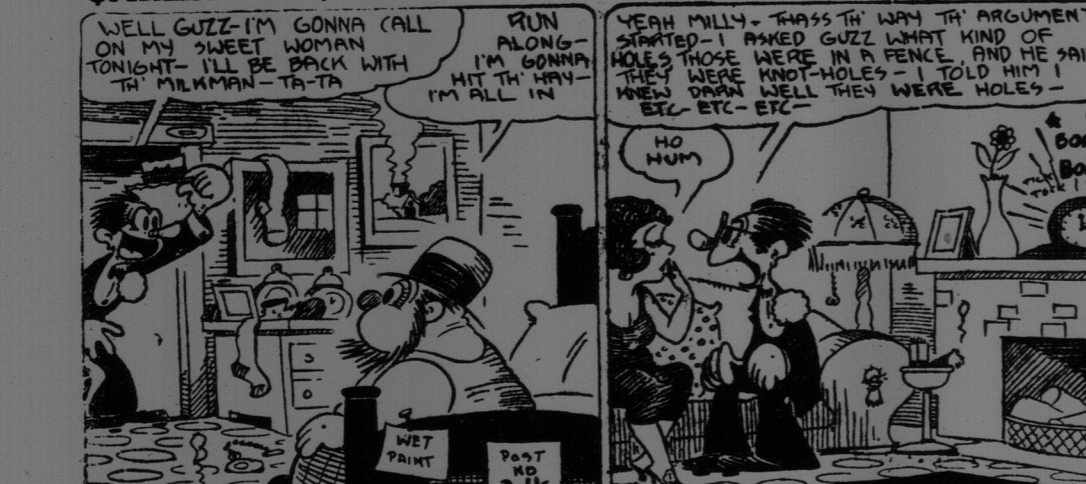

Asbestos common was the least inactive issue, but sold at 74, as did also National Breweries at 42 1/8. Sugar of Canada in a single board lot transaction was up a point to 87. Consolidated Smelters, the only other issue to appear in a board lot, was stronger by 1/4 at 85 1/4. Union Bank sold the same at 115 3/4. Canada Cement and Laurentide in small lots, appeared at 104 3/4 and 79 1/2 up 1/4 and unchanged respectively. The only other leaders to receive attention were Howard Smith preferred, Southern Canada Power and Detroit Railway off 1/2 at 104 1/8 and 11-8 at 77 7/8; and off 1-8 at 67-8. Trading in these issues was very light.

UNEVEN IN WALL ST. NEW YORK, June 15.—Uneven price movements characterized the opening of the new week in the stock market. General Railway signal opened 3 points higher and Cuba Cane Sugar preferred, 1, but initial losses of 1 to 2 1/4 points were recorded by American Can and the Pan American issues. Banks reported the usual heavy demand for funds in connection with income tax, interest and dividend payments.

MONSTER TUNA IS TAKEN FROM WATER OFF CAPE BRETON COAST

Zane Grey Establishes Record by Landing 758-Pound Fish.

As a writer of stirring tales of the Border and the mid-western states in the early days, Zane Grey has made an enviable record for himself, but now along he comes with another—a fish story—and better still, presents the proof in photographs, so that his yarn does not take on the semblance of a dream or a good bit of story-telling.

Tuna, weighing nearly half a ton, are the reward of ambitious anglers who fish in Nova Scotia waters, particularly in St. Ann's Bay, off Cape Breton. Three mammoth tuna have been taken from this locality, each holding the world's record in tuna. Captain Laurie D. Mitchell's 710 pound tuna held a record for a number of years, till along came J. K. L. Ross of Montreal, well known as an owner of racing horses, director of the Canadian Pacific Railway and his skill as a fisherman. He landed a tuna after 3 1/4 hours' fight, that measured 9 ft. and 2 in. in length, and 6 ft. in girth, and tipped the scales at 712 lbs. thus winning the honor of record tuna fishing from Captain Mitchell by 2 lbs.

His record seemed secure, when along in August, 1924, came Zane Grey and his brother, R. C. Grey, eager to catch big tuna. They used a Nova Scotian-built schooner, a staunch little craft admirably adapted to their plans and needs. They got three tuna, weighing respectively 638, 684, and then as a climax, the biggest tuna ever landed, weighing 758 pounds. The time taken to land the first was 6 hours and 10 minutes, for the second, 88 minutes which was caught by R. C. Grey, and 8 hours and 10 minutes were spent to conquer the record breaker with which Zane Grey is said to have wrested the Palm from the C. P. R. director and won the title of champion tuna fisherman.

Other big fish of various species taken in various Canadian waters, include a record pike caught in Big Lac Nominique in the Laurentians of Quebec, weighing 98 lbs.; a 88 1/2 lb. muskellunge caught in 1924 in French River, Ontario, by Samuel W. Franklin of New York City; the world's record speckled trout, weighing 141-2 lbs., taken from Nipigon River by Dr. J. W. Cook of Fort William; and a great Northern pike, 4 ft. long and a weight of 21 lbs., which gave Harold Sweeter of New York a 45-minute fight on the Nipigon.

Canada's infinitude of rivers and lakes are filled with a vast wealth of fish, many of them of record measurements and weight. The foregoing are sportmen's records.

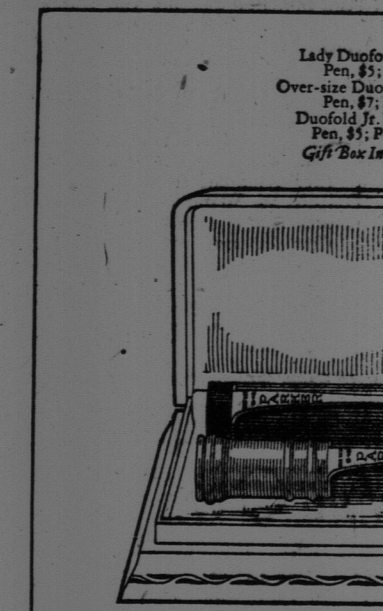

WEATHER GIVES BUSINESS BOOM

Middle Canada Reports Great Impetus in Hardware Lines—West More Confident.

"Hardware and Metal," Toronto, comments on hardware and metal market movements as follows in its issue of June 15:

"Torrid weather conditions of the last week in Eastern Canada have resulted in a most surprising impetus to retail and wholesale distribution of many hardware lines. London reports the busiest week in many months, with an exceptionally heavy demand for seasonal goods. Montreal dealers state a decided improvement was noticeable, which, at times, needed their fullest energies to keep up with business offered. In Toronto district, the movement of refrigerators, electric fans, garden hose, screen doors, window screens and screen wire cloth developed rapidly and in proportions as altogether unexpected. Wholesale distributors state that the rush of telephone orders necessitated extra assistance, that sales of certain seasonable lines depleted their entire stock of those lines and that in other lines such as electric fans, their sales for the last week were as high as six times as great as during all last year. Rush orders came in from all sections of the country for immediate shipment by express or truck.

"Reports from Western Canada indicate considerable confidence to trade in that section. Crop prospects in Calgary district are decidedly good, with moisture conditions much better than in recent years. This is having a beneficial influence on trade. Winnipeg reports considerable activity in building supplies, auto accessories, sporting goods, garden tools and paints. "Auto tires have been advanced 5 per cent and tubes 10 per cent. TO ARRANGE FOR ENGLISH SETTLERS

Church of England Delegates Return After Conference in London.

Canadian Press. TORONTO, June 15.—Cosan C. W. Vernon, general secretary of the Council for Social Service, Church of England, has returned from England, where, as a member of a delegation from the Canadian church, he has been in conference with the Council of Overseas Settlement, established this spring under the auspices of the Church of England Assembly. Canon Vernon was accompanied by England by Right Rev. J. E. Blwelle, Bishop of Ontario; W. G. Skyles, Regius, and G. B. Wood, Toronto. While in London they were guests of the Bishop of London.

Understanding Reached. A satisfactory understanding was reached between the Council of Overseas Settlement, which will disseminate information regarding openings in the Dominion for prospective settlers and make selections, and the Church of England in Canada, which will endeavor to provide suitable settlements and seek openings for British immigrants.

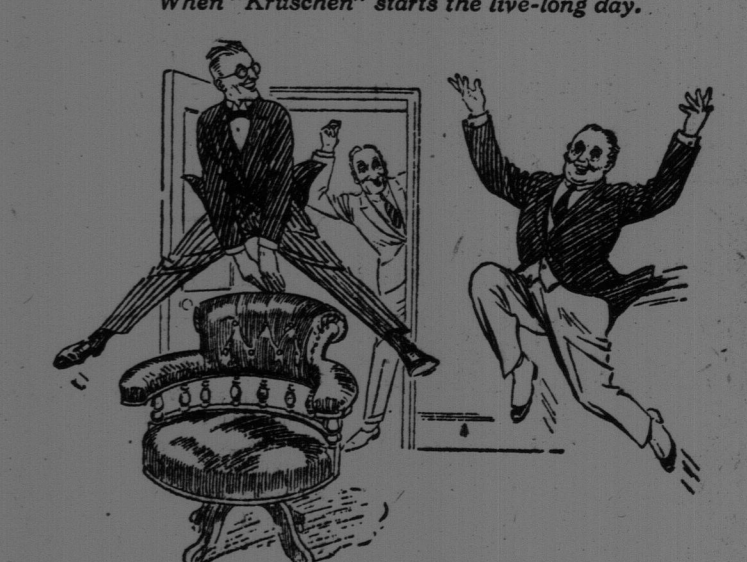

CHAMPION SENATORS ONLY HALF GAME BEHIND THE MACKMEN

LEAGUE LEADERS WERE SHUT OUT BY CLEVELAND

Weak Pitching Staff And Batting Slump Responsible

NEW YORK, June 15.—The Athletics, who have been leading the American League since early in May, now have their backs to the wall. Only half a game separated them from the champion Senators this morning.

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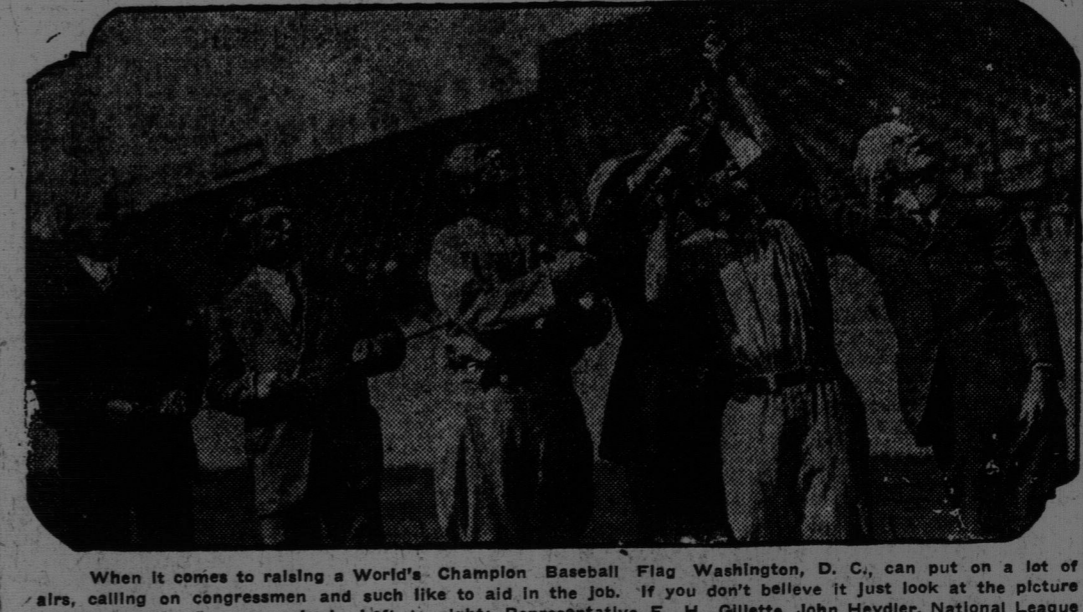

SCOTT'S DEATH IN ANTARCTIC IS RECALLED BY AMUNDSEN TRIP

Explorer Frozen to Death on Attempt to Rediscover South Pole

There is a cold goddess who is hidden among the eternal snows of the polar regions, and for every man who returns from her domain another must remain there forever.

Rosalind Amundsen is somewhere up in the white emptiness with his airplane. Will he come back from his trip to the North Pole? Or will he add his name to the long list of those who sought the goddess of eternal winter and met the specter of death?

Recalls Scott's Death.

Amundsen's adventure recalls that of Captain Robert F. Scott, whose tragic adventure was so closely bound up with Amundsen's discovery of the South Pole.

The antarctic winter struck with unleashed fury. Food and fuel gave out. Scott and his men plodded on with frozen feet. Then a blizzard made progress impossible.

They were only 11 miles from a supply depot, but they could not continue. Months later their frozen bodies were found near a long-dead camp-fire.

Balloon Disappears.

Others, too, found an unseen death in the polar lands. Strangely like Amundsen's adventure was that of a Swedish aeronaut, S. A. Andree, who in 1897, sailed north from Spitzbergen in a balloon.

The balloon is still up there, somewhere, its flabby envelope encased in ice and its occupant eternally buried in the white, unbroken silence.

Dea of Disease.

Sir Ernest Shackleton was another. After a life time of exploration in the ice fields, he died of disease on his ship while at sea near the antarctic continent in 1922.

Sir John Franklin was still another. In 1845 he sailed from England with two ships, the Erebus and the Terror, to explore north of Greenland. His ship was sighted in Baffin Bay months later by a whaler, and then the cold arctic silence settled down.

Relief expeditions were sent out from America and England. It was 1858, however, before the secret was solved. Franklin had died after his ships be-

came locked in ice. His men sought to escape over land, and all perished. Another victim? Now the north has beckoned again. Amundsen, who planted his flag at the South Pole, has gone to the top of the world. Will he come back? Will he add another chapter to the thrilling stories of narrow escapes from the arctic's clutches? Or will he be just one more to fall a victim to the white goddess of the north, who reigns where there is no color but white and where icy gales howl through the darkness of an everlasting winter?

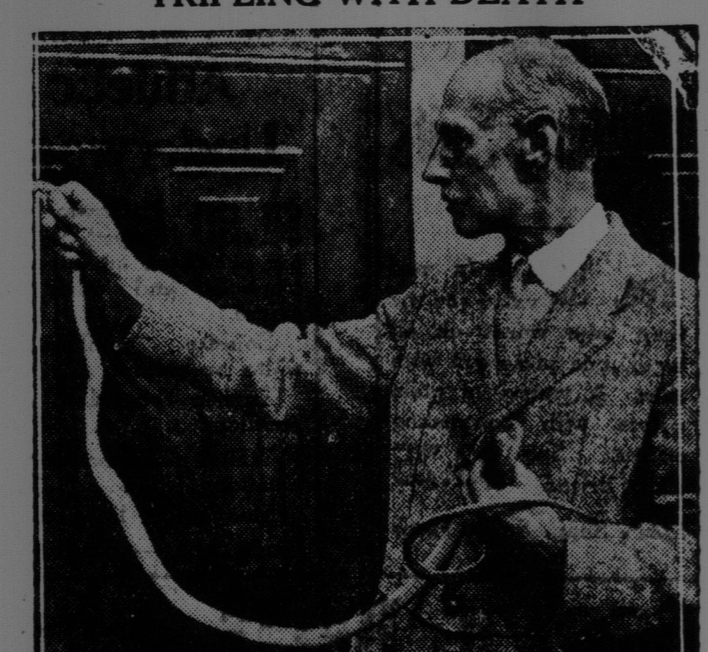

OFFICIALS GET LIQUOR AND CAR AND T. WIGGINS

Customs Men Seize Auto and 24 Cases After Chase

SPRUCE LAKE SCENE OF SPIRITED RUN

Believe Liquor Landed From Rum Schooner—Car Overturns in Race

Getting a tip that liquor smuggling was being carried on in the region around Spruce Lake yesterday, local customs officials left at noon Sunday by automobile for Spruce Lake and arrested Thomas Wiggins, local taxi man and driving a car with N. B. license No. 4017, said to be owned jointly by Thomas Wiggins and another, also of Saint John. It was loaded with 24 cases of liquor. Wiggins was brought to the Central Police Station and spent the night there. He was up before Magistrate Henderson this morning and, in answer to the charges, pleaded not guilty. J. Starr Tait appeared for the accused.

It is expected that the case will come before Stipendiary Magistrate Allingham in the Fairville court some time this week.

HAD CHASE.

Local customs officials announced this morning that they suspected the liquor to have been landed somewhere on the southwest coast of this province from a run-runner off shore and that it was destined for Saint John, as Wiggins was coming toward the city when he was met at the railway crossing at Spruce Lake yesterday afternoon by customs men. Two of the officials jumped from their car and ordered Wiggins to stop. Instead of complying with their request, they say, he stepped on the accelerator. The customs officers gave chase, but they had not gone far when Wiggins' car and the machine turned over. Wiggins escaped miraculously with a few minor bruises. The liquor packages also escaped breakage. The contraband was taken to the bonded warehouse of John Poole & Son and the car consigned by the authorities.

GO TO ENGLAND IN INSURANCE CASE

Three Saint John Lawyers Are to Appear Before the Privy Council.

Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., and J. H. A. L. Fairweather will sail on Saturday from Montreal and A. D. Gilbert will sail on Friday for England to appear before the Privy Council in the case of the Palatine Insurance Co. vs. J. A. Gregory.

This is an appeal from the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada, which found in favor of Mr. Gregory and concerns the payment of insurance on lumber burned when Mr. Gregory's South Bay mill was destroyed by fire recently.
