SOME RESULTS OF PROHIBITION

(Moneton Transcript.)

An interesting report on the economic effects of prohibition has been made by the commercial research division of the advertising department of the Curtis Publishing Company of Philadelphia. Statistics are given from cities like Boston and Pittsburg showing decreases in arrests by one-half and two-thirds; marked decreases are also shown in major crimes. Enquiries made as to off-days in various industries show a large decrease in absence from work, since prohibition. Another benefit claimed from prohibition is a very notable decrease in the number of industrial and railway and automobile accidents.

The report points out that following prohibition workers are buying better food and more household furniture than formerly. Buildings formerly used by the liquor business were converted to other purposes without any appreciable other purposes without any appreciable loss to property owners, and the men employed in the trade have been absorbed in other employments. The grape growers who feared ruin have found a bigger market at better prices than formerly, and even hon growing is said to merly, and even hop growing is said to have thrived under prohibition.

There is one line in the retail grocery that is really affected by the tax, and that is extracts, but to what extent, manufacturers are still at sea. For the purpose of getting more definite information on this subject, a deputation composed of extract manufacturers is going to Ottawa to interview Sir Henry Drayton In one section of the Act it says that a tax of \$2.00 per proof gallon shall be applied to alcohol and in another place it says that extracts shall be taxed \$2.00 per gallon. Pure extracts contain a large percentage of alcohol. Manufacturers are therefore doubtful as to whether both these taxes are to be applied. "Whether the \$2.00 per gallon on alcohol is paid when it is taken out of bond, and again added on the manufactured extract, is a point that has to be cleared up," stated Frank Sherriff of the Imperial Extract Co. "The ruling now reads as though extracts have to bear a double tax."
