IS FIREBUG NOW ON P. E. ISLAND?

Another \$25,000 Fire Loss in Charlottetown SASH AND DOOR FACTORY (Special to Times) Charlottetown, P. E. I., Aug. 5.—Close upon the fire in Paton and Company's on Sunday morning comes another. DRIVEN FROM BURNING HOTEL IN EARLY MORN

Philadelphia, Aug. 4.—The Blue Mountain House at Pen Mar, on the Pennsylvania-Maryland line, was destroyed by fire today. B. F. Metzger and Malouin Frank of Norfolk, Va., were badly burned in attempting to escape. The 175 people in the house were driven to the lawn in scanty attire, few being able to save their belongings. The loss is about \$250,000.

IN THE BALKANS

London, Aug. 5.—The Times' Bucharest correspondent says he believes the Balkan peace conference will allocate Kavala to Greece, but that as Russia, Austria, Great Britain and Italy insist that the fate of this Aegean Sea port should be decided by the powers, it is not unlikely that it eventually will be given to Bulgaria.

J. P. Morgan Had It

Paris, Aug. 5.—There is no truth in a report published in the United States that General Porfirio Diaz had left Southampton on July 15 for Japan by way of the Suez Canal to meet his nephew, Felix Diaz, and accompany him back to Mexico. The former Mexican president is still in Paris.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 5.—Two Russian military aviators, L. L. Polkarpoff and his mechanic were killed today owing to the breaking of a wing on their aeroplane while they were flying at a great altitude.

DAILY HINTS FOR THE COOK

FRITTER BATTER

Yolks of two eggs well beaten, one-half cup of milk, one tablespoon of olive oil or melted butter, one cup of flour, one-half teaspoon of salt. When ready to use add whites of eggs well beaten. Pastry flour is best. Add chopped apple or chopped strained quahogs.

JORDAN CAKE

One-half cup butter, 2 eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup sweet milk, 1/2 cup flour, 1 teaspoon cream of tartar, 1/2 teaspoon saleratus. Bake in large cake-tins or in a loaf.

FROSTING—Two-thirds cup of sweet milk, 1/2 cups confectioners' sugar, small piece of butter. Boil hard 7 minutes, stirring all the time. When cold add flavor, beat until thick, spread between layers of cake and on top.

SENDS NEW MAN TO MEXICO

Washington, Aug. 4.—President Wilson took the first steps in the policy through which he proposes to deal with the Mexican situation. He formally accepted the resignation of Ambassador Henry Lane Wilson, to take effect on October 14, and sent to Mexico City his personal representative—but not accredited to the Huerta government—former governor John Lind, of Minnesota, a life-long friend of Secretary Bryan.

Acceptance of the resignation of Ambassador Henry Lane Wilson, settled finally that his recommendations for recognition of the Huerta government in northern Mexico, on the part of the United States to restore peace had been rejected.

Some local comment is heard touching the fact that Mr. Hazen put himself beyond the reach of even telegraphic communication without having settled the question whether St. John is to be placed in a position to handle all the traffic that offers next winter or whether the port is to suffer a loss of trade.

The prospect for a general effort to make alfalfa a staple crop in New Brunswick appears to be bright.

The Frederickton Mail says:—The ticket collectors on the Canada Eastern branch of the Intercolonial have started in to make votes for the Liberal cause.

There is a vigorous fight in progress in Detroit for three cent fares on local street cars.

The western harvest has begun, and it may be hoped that it can be gathered without the usual exodus of promising young farmers from New Brunswick to the western fields.

A Washington despatch says that official circles see some danger in the Monroe doctrine in the proposed British naval base at Bermuda.

The president of Venezuela has decided to take the field in person against Ex-President Castro, who believes the time has arrived for a successful revolution in that country in his favor.

Another I. C. R. backdown is recorded in the Standard this morning. It came in the form of a message from Mr. Brady, granting to merchants the use of the track from the Eastern Steamship wharf to the Pettingall wharf as heretofore, until other traffic arrangements are made.

The medical journals are constantly calling attention to the great achievement of Colonel Gorges in exterminating yellow fever from the Panama Canal zone.

Germany was, we were gravely assured, about to give the law to Europe. Then came the Agadic incident, and a ray of suspicion illumined the recesses of the souls of the patriotic Jeremiahs, and they began to think that possibly after all the German Ogre had not scared the rest of the continent out of its senses and was not going about muttering, in diplomatic language, "Fee, fi, fo, fum, I smell the blood of an Englishman."

Now, if ever, was the time for German omnipotence to assert itself. If the time was going to come when someone ought to give the law to Europe it had surely arrived. But not a sound came from Berlin. The Balkan allies pounced upon Turkey, and had been leading Turkey money, and had been training her soldiers and expected great things in connection with the Baghdad Railway.

A little bit of real lively hegemony would have been a useful thing at that time to have, but Germany did not seem to keep any in stock. When the time came to talk peace, it was to London, not Berlin, that the representatives of the warring nations went. But the peace arranged for was broken by a row among the successful allies. Berlin was silent. It was St. Petersburg that said to the Roumanians that they were free to move against Bulgaria. The lesson of this is that German supremacy in Europe is an exploded myth.

The Colonist says it is far from suggesting that either the Kaiser or his ministers believe in this myth, which was exploited chiefly by a lot of English writers who have been wrong in their prognostications so often that it is difficult to see how anyone can take them seriously again. What is true of this lot of "English writers" is true of a lot of Tory writers in Canada, and the members of the Tory government in Canada, who during the last year or so have had so much to say about the German peril

Superior, Wis., Aug. 4—Nineteen ore boats lay at the Allouez ore docks waiting for a break in the strike of dock hands. Docking space is now at a premium and but few more boats can be accommodated. There are indications of a speedy settlement of the trouble. A committee of strikers met General Superintendent Jenks and the dock superintendent yesterday and their demands were met half way.

Jean Mason, who is employed in Chrysler's fruit store, gave evidence of what had taken place in the shop. She said that the Finn had said he had a knife which he intended to use on the proprietor, but had not drawn it. Finerose was remanded.

STILL NOTHING DEFINITE ABOUT VALLEY ROUTE

Premier Flemming Apparently Believes it Will Cross River at the Mistake

A member of the St. John Board of Trade who recently wrote to Premier Flemming in regard to the Valley railway route and construction has received a reply which is now in the hands of the council of the board. In it Hon. Mr. Flemming says the route of the Valley line from Gagetown to The Mistake has been "approved" and that the engineers are still busy with estimates and plans for the bridges. He says also that the route from Centerville to Andover has been forwarded to the dominion government for approval.

While the letter is guarded in tone, the inference fairly to be drawn is that Mr. Flemming believes the road will reach St. John by crossing the river at The Mistake. Apparently, however, that is not yet a certainty and the time for the completion of the bridges is evidently still unsettled, as is the method of financing them.

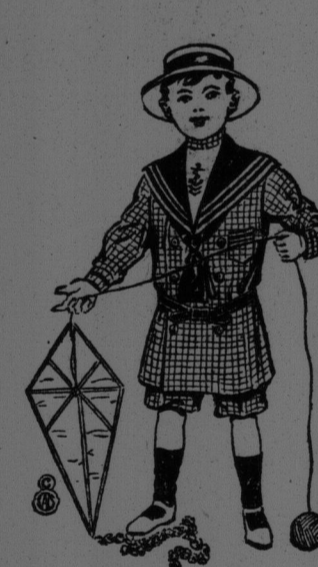
