JOURNAL OF SYNOD.

THE FIRST SESSION.

OTTAWA, July 6th, 1896.

In accordance with Canon three, the first Session of the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa was preceded by Divine Service in Christ Church pro-Cathedral. Evensong was said at 8 p.m. by Rev. J. J. Bogert, M.A., Rural Dean of Carleton. The first lesson was read by Rev. Rural Dean Houston, M.A., and the second lesson by Rev. W. J. Muckleston, M.A.

The sermon was preached by the Venerable J. S. Lauder, D.C.L., Archdeacon of Ottawa, from I Cor., xvi, 13: "Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit you like men, be strong."

FIRST DAY.

Whereas an attempt is being made on behalf of the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario and the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa respectively, without prejudice to the subsisting rights of either Synod under Clause 14 of the Act Incorporating the latter Synod or under the report of the Synod of the original Diocese of Ontario therein mentioned or otherwise to amicably settle the division and apportionment of the funds and securities of the original Diocese of Ontario between the said incorporated Synods as at present subsisting.

And whereas the Chancellor and Dean of Ontario have, during the current sessions of the Synods of both Dioceses, submitted (without prejudice) on behalf of the Synod of Ontario written proposals in that behalf to a committee of the Synod of Ottawa, consisting of the Chancellor of Ottawa, Rural Dean Pollard, Rural Dean Bogert, Rural Dean Nesbitt, His Honour Judge Senkler, Mr. J. P. Whitney, Q. C, the Rev. Mr. Samwell and Mr. W. H. Rowley (Chairman).

And whereas, as a result of the deliberations of said committee, no report has been made to this Synod, but His Honour Judge Senkler has, by substantive resolution, been requested and authorized to proceed to Kingston to make counter proposals with plenary powers.

Resolved that in the event of such amicable settlement being without prejudice arrived at between said Synods, His Lordship the Bishop be and he is hereby authorized on behalf of this Synod to execute any deed, instrument, or agreement on behalf of this Synod for a complete settlement of all matters in difference between said Synods. And that the Chancellor and other officers of Synod do thereupon attest the same and affix the Synod's Corporate seal thereto.

And be it further resolved that His Lordship the Bishop be and he is hereby authorized to submit any outstanding points of difference in his discretion to the arbitration of such person or persons as he may think best, and, on behalf of this Synod similarly to execute and cause the Corporate Seal of this Synod to be affixed to all necessary deeds, instruments, agreement and arbitration bond in that behalf.

And it is further resolved that in the event of settlement or arbitration, His Lordship the Bishop be and he is hereby authorized to appoint on behalf of this Synod an arbitrator or arbitrators with full powers to bind this Synod on such arbitration.

And it is further resolved that this Synod hereby ratifies and confirms all and whatsoever may be done in the premises.—

Carried.

Moved by Ven. Archdeacon Lauder, seconded by Mr. Jas. G. Higginson:—

That in the event of an amicable settlement of the differences mentioned in the preceding resolution, being arrived at; His Lordship the Bishop is hereby (without prejudice) empowered if he shall consider it necessary, to appoint on behalf of this Synod, one or two or three or five Commissioners (as His Lordship may think fit) to meet a similar number of Commissioners appointed by or on behalf of the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario for the purpose of dividing and apportioning the securities representing the funds so divided between the said Synods, and that such Commissioners shall have full authority to determine, adjust and settle all matters pertaining to the division and apportionment of the said securities, and to select an umpire or referee to whom may be referred any question on which the Commissioners may be equally divided in opinion whose decision shall be final.—Carried.

Moved by Rev. Rural Dean Nesbitt, seconded by Mr. W. H. Rowley :-

That in the event of no settlement being arrived at nor arbitration agreed upon with respect to the matters mentioned in preceding resolutions, this Synod without prejudice to its rights, hereby authorizes and empowers His Lordship the Bishop to confer with His Grace the Archbishop of Ontario, and hereby pledges itself to ratify and confirm any agreement for a complete settlement of the matters in difference between the two Synods which may be thus reached and signed by the Archbishop and Bishop in the interval between this session and the next session of this Synod.——Carried.

SECURITY BY CLERICAL SECRETARY.

Moved by the Chancellor, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Bogert :-

That the Clerical Secretary be required to furnish security by the policy of a Guarantee Company; that the annual or other premiums shall be paid by the Synod; That the amount of such security shall not be less than \$5000; such security to be given to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee forthwith; and that the premiums be charged against the assessment fund annually, or be otherwise paid as the executive committee shall direct.—

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.

Moved by Rev. Rural Dean Bogert, seconded by Ven. Arch-deacon Lauder:—

That the following scheme for securing religious instruction in public schools be referred to a special committee to consider the same and report upon its practicability at the next meeting of the Synod with any suggestions or recommendations which they may deem advisable. That this committee be authorized to correspond with and co-operate with the committees of other Dioceses in promoting religious instruction in our public schools.

TAXATION.

- All ratepayers to contribute to a common "building" fund necessary to meet the cost of providing accommodation for all Public School children not attending Voluntary Schools.
- 2. All ratepayers to contribute to a common "Educational" fund necessary (with the Government grant) to meet the cost of imparting secular instruction to all children attending Public Schools (including Voluntary Schools).

This sum with the Government grant to be distributed among the various Public Schools (including Voluntary Schools) according to the average number of children attending each school.

VOLUNTARY SCHOOLS.

3. Any religious body conducting a school in a suitable building provided at their own cost, and (a) having an average attendance of at least thirty pupils maintaining a standard of efficiency in secular subjects, and (b) using the Public School Text Books, and (c) employing as teachers only those holding Public School certificates, to be entitled on the written application of at least twenty heads of families resident in the school district, to have such Voluntary School placed on the list of Public Schools, subject to the same inspection, and to share in such "Educational" fund, according to the average attendance, as in the case of the other Public Schools.

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

4 Religious Instruction to be given in all Public Schools from 9 to 9.30 a.m.

(a) Such religious instruction to be based upon a common text book in the ordinary (State) Public Schools and (b) in the (Voluntary) Public Schools, to be such as the various religious bodies may respectively desire to impart to the children of parents of their own communion.

5. Pupils in either case, not to be required to join in religious exercises or receive religious instruction objected to by their parents or guardians.

The Bishop addressed the Synod on the subject of the motion after which it was put and carried.

His Lordship thereupon appointed the committee as follows:-

The Bishop in an address to the Synod expressed his appreciation of the services of the Chancellor during the Synod and at other times since his installation, and also his gratitude to Judge Senkler, the Chancellor and Mr. Rowley for their valuable services in the negotiations for the settlement of the matters in question between the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario and the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa.

His Lordship spoke of the valuable time given by these gentlemen to the affairs of the Synod, of their patient and long continued work on the Committee of Settlement, and of Judge Senkler's journey to Kingston in the interest of the Diocese and expressed his hearty thanks to them for their labours.

His Lordship's address was received by the whole Synod with the most hearty applause.

On motion the Synod adjourned until 10 a.m. tomorrow.

FIFTH DAY.

OTTAWA, July 11th, 1896.

Matins were said in St. John's Church at 9.30 a.m. by Rev. Rural Dean Read. Rev. Geo. Bousfield read the First Lesson; Rev. A. W. Mackay read the Second Lesson.

At 10 a.m. the Bishop took the Chair in St. John's Hall and opened the meeting for business with prayer.

The minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read by the Clerical Secretary and confirmed.

59 Vic. Chapter 117.

AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF OTTAWA IN CONNECTION WITH THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN THE DOMINION OF CANADA, "ASSENTED TO 7TH APRIL, 1896."

HEREAS it has been determined that the Diocese of Ontario in Preamble. connection with the Church of England in the Dominion of Canada, shall be divided into two dioceses by setting apart from the said Diocese of Ontario the following territory, namely:-the counties of Lanark, Renfrew, Carleton, (including the city of Ottawa), Russell, Prescott, Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry and the District of Nipissing as bounded and set off by the Legislature of Ontario, save and except that portion thereof lying north of the Mattawa river and Trout lake and of a line produced westerly to where the said lake is intersected by the northern boundary of the township of Ferris and north of that boundary produced westerly to the easterly shore of Lake Nipissing, the territory so set apart to constitute a diocese to be called the Diocese of Ottawa in connection with the said church; and whereas it is expected that the division of the said diocese will be completed within a short time and it is expedient to provide means for the proper division of the property of the present diocese of Ontario between the two dioceses, and to enable the said new diocese of Ottawa to arrange its affairs and to receive and hold such part of the

said property as it shall be entitled to by incorporating the synod of the said proposed diocese when formed; and whereas the executive committee of the said Diocese of Ontario has prayed that the synod of the said proposed Diocese of Ottawa, should, on the formation thereof, be incorporated, and should have the powers and authority hereinafter conferred upon it, and whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petition.

Therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario enacts as follows:—

- 1. The Bishop, clergy and laity members of the Church of Incorporation of synod of England in the Dominion of Canada within the limits of the said pro-Ottawa. posed Diocese of Ottawa shall from the time of the consecration, or in the case of the election of one who is already a bishop from the installation and induction, of the first bishop of the said diocese, be a body corporate and politic under the name of "The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa."
- 2. The Synod of the said Diocese of Ottawa shall be composed Constitution and consist of the bishop of the diocese, for the time being, the priests of new synod. and deacons of the same, holding the license of, or otherwise under the jurisdiction of the bishop of the said Diocese of Ottawa, and of the said lay representatives from the several parishes within the boundaries of the Diocese of Ottawa, to be elected as provided for by the constitution and regulations of the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario until the Synod of the Diocese of Cttawa shall by canon or otherwise have adopted or may from time to time adopt other constitution or regulations in that behalf; provided always that the Chancellor and Registrar of the said Diocese may, with the consent of the Synod, be ex officio members of the said Synod.
- 3. All the canons of the said Synod of the Diocese of Ontario, Canons of diocese to Canon VI, "seal of synod," canon XX., "surplus income of to be canons of the Kingston rectory," section 5 of canon XXIV., "the election of a new diocese. bishop and sub-division of the diocese" and canon XXV., "the patronage of rectories" shall be canons of the synod of the said Diocese of Ottawa, substituting the word "Ottawa" for the word "Ontario" wherever the same occurs in said canons, until the same are altered or repealed by the said synod of the Diocese of Ottawa.
- 4. - 7. All lands situate within the limits of the said Diocese of Ottawa Transfer of lands held by any person or corporation upon any special use, trust, or pur. held in trust for pose for the benefit of any church, burying ground, parsonage, or rectory certain purposes of the Church of England within the limits of the said Diocese of Ottawa may by such person or corporation, with the consent of those beneficially interested, be transferred to the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa as trustee.

- 8. The said Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Otttawa may Assignment of take and receive from the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario, the synod of Ottawa's share by assignment or conveyance, such proportion of the funds and property in funds, etc. held in trust for various purposes by the said Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario as the said Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa may become entitled to by virtue of any agreement or arrangement arrived at between the synods of the said dioceses, and shall hold such property as regards the Diocese of Ottawa upon trusts similar to those on which the same are then held by the said Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario.

The said Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa may Power to take take and receive any devises or bequests of land, or any interest there-property by devise, etc. in, or other property, for any purpose connected with the Church of England in the said diocese, or in connection with any of the objects or work carried on by the said synod to the same extent as the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario is capable of taking and receiving the same.

THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS, DELIVERED AT THE OPENING OF THE SYNOD.

My Reverend Brethren and My Brethren of the Laity,

The assembly of Bishop, Clergy and Laity in Synod is no ordinary meeting, for they constitute the Church of the living God in the Diocese. They are in close and blessed union with the Saviour for they are part of the Mystical Body of which Christ is the Head.

Your thoughts to-day must revert to the venerable Archbishop and the old time friends who for so many years constituted with you the Diocese of Ontario. As they gather in their council to-day they will miss you; they will be sensible of their loss of numbers and of strength. Our position brings to us all the freshness and hope which attend the entrance upon a new existence. No doubt you will be moved to send promptly an affectionate greeting to the Mother Diocese with the assurance of our loving sympathy and earnest prayers that God will abundantly bless and prosper her efforts for His glory and the advancement of His Church.

In the Church of God among the Israelites men of Saintly minds encouraged one another with the inspiring song, "God is in the midst of her, therefore shall she not be removed. God shall help her and that right early." What a joyous burst of praise should be ours, as during the Synod we make our daily offering of worship to HIM Who is not merely in the midst of us but is one with HIS Church. What an absorbing, loving interest should possess us as we enter upon the two duties which devolve upon us as the Church of God in this new Diocese assembled in Synod, first to offer unto the Most High God homage and happy worship and second to enact such Canons as will remove all hindrances and introduce all well considered facilities into our methods of promoting the Church's work in every part of the Diocese.

Our Synod should indeed be bright with joy and hope whether we are engaged in the services of prayer and praise or in the study of such regulations and plans as may be best for our Parishes and the Diocese.

The warm welcome to my responsible Office extended to me by all classes in the community has made me feel at once at home among you. I will seek diligently by every honest effort to keep undiminished all the wealth of love and confidence which you have so freely bestowed upon me. I shall, however, be ready to surrender it all rather than fail in my duty to God and His Church.

M. A., Chancellor, and Mr. John Bishop, Registrar. I have appointed the Rev. T. A. Blyth, D. D. Wicar of Stoke, Coventry, and the Rev. C. Chetwode Hamilton, M.A., my Commissaries in England. I have appointed the Rev. William Ashley Read, Rural Dean of Pembroke. The Rural Dean of Renfrew will now be relieved of that portion of the County of Renfrew embraced in the Townships of Ross, Bromley, Westmeath, Stafford, north half of Wilberforce, Alice, Fraser, Pembroke, Petawawa, McKay, Wylie, Buchanan, Rolph, Head, Maria, Clara, and the north half of the district of Nipissing, which lies in the Diocese of Ottawa. This arrangement will give to the Rural Dean of Pembroke the care of 6 parishes, Mattawa, Pettawawa, Pembroke, Stafford, Beachburg, and Cobden.

The Rural Dean of Renfrew, who never spares himself, will retain the care of 6 parishes, Arnprior, Renfrew, Calabogie, Eganville, Combermere, and the new Mission of Long Lake which we hope will be created in the near future.

Ordination.

On Trinity Sunday, in the spacious and dignified Church of St. James, in Perth, I admitted to the order of Priests the Rev. William Ernest Arthur Butler, who has been serving the Mission of Combernere.

Confirmations.

I have already had the joy of conveying the blessing of the Lord through the laying on of hands to 479 persons in 24 of our Congregations. Of these 67 had been brought up outside the Church of England. My Reverend brethren are, I am convinced, sensible of the favourable opportunity brought to them by the preparation of our young people for Confirmation. I do not propose to dwell to-day on the vital importance of using it with the utmost diligence and to the fullest extent. When the numbers presented at one time are very large it is impossible that the care and attention can be bestowed upon each individual which his or her particular case may not merely admit but require. I propose, therefore, so long as my health and strength will permit, to visit, once a year, each Congregation in which there are candidates ready and desirous of being Confirmed. It is not my purpose to go once a year to those Congregations in which there are no candidates.

In order that the Clergy may know when the Bishop may be looked for and arrange accordingly for the instruction of their candidates, I now desire them to take notice that I propose to visit the several Deaneries in the following order, until further acquaintance with the Diocese leads me to modify it: Renfrew and Pembroke, in the end of September and the beginning of October; Prescott and Russell, September or October; Stormont, end of October; Carleton and Lanark, in June. If the opportunity is to be duly used the preparation should commence not weeks but months beforehand. I desire further to indicate that it will be well for the Clergy not to attempt the well nigh impossible task of preparing candidates in several con-

regations at the same time. The Bishop's annual visit will admit of their affording a thorough instruction to the candidates in one congregation each year and so securing a visit from the Bishop to every part of a Mission every second or third year. I do not desire to lay down any absolute rule in this direction as circumstances must, in many instances, be permitted to rule if we are to secure the best results. But I must not keep you from the pressing duties which this First Synod in the new Diocese of Ottawa brings to us.

The Chancellor of the Diocese of Ontario has forwarded to me for your information the report adopted by the Executive Committee of that Diocese setting forth the objections to Clause 14 of the Act, incorporating the Synod of Ottawa, passed for us by the Legislature of Ontario. (See Appendix E.)

Armenian Relief Collection.

His Grace the Archbishop of Offiario has sent me a statement of the collections for the Fund for your information (printed in Journal of Ontario Synod.)

Until we are organized under the Act we have no standing committees to report to us all necessary information for our guidance. In anticipation of this and in view of the pressing importance of our having the facts at least before us I have asked those who were in a good position to know to inform me and I will now lay this information before you so that we may proceed to act in each matter as we may unite in judging to be best.

(The Lord Bishop then proceeded to give to the Synod a large amount of information gathered from the financial statements furnished by the Clerical Secretary of the Diocese of Ontario, all of which will appear in the printed journal of the Diocese of Ontario for 1896. His Lordship also presented the suggested classification of Missions for the current year printed at page 58.)

My Lord, I write for the Prisoners' Aid Association of Cauada to make our annual appeal to the Clergy and laity of the different synods of Ontario in behalf ofthe cause of prison reform.

With regard to the proposed reformatory for young men which the Dominion Government has commenced to build at Alexandria, I would be glad if your synod would take the same action as that taken by the House of Bishops at the late meeting at Ottawa, namely: first, to petition the Government to establish a separate reformatory for Protestants near a city or large town where the inmates may be brought under the religious teaching of Protestant clergymen and lay workers; and secondly, to suggest to the Government the propriety of appointing a Commission to formulate a scheme for the management of said reformatories.

With regard to the reforms we are asking from the Ontario Government, we would be glad if you would give us a helping hand in our efforts to procure the establishment of a hospital, reformatory, or farm colony for the reformation of habitual drunkards. We know that the ordinary jail treatment of this class is neither deterrent nor reformatory, whereas, according to the experience of other countries, we believe that a large percentage of inebriates may be reformed when placed in a well equipped and well managed hospital or reformatory. A petition or memorial to the Ontario Government from your synod would very materially streng hen our cause.

We also bespeak the kind co-operation of the Clergy and laity of your diocese in our efforts to promote good classification of prisoners in the county gaols, and in the establishment of a house of industry in every county.

Proposed Memorial to Mrs. Alexander, wife of the Venerable Archbishop of Armagh.

I have received from Her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen and from His Honour the Lieut. Governor of Ontario, letters requesting me to interest the Clergy and members of the Church in the Memorial which is about to be erected in the city of Derry, to the authoress of several of our best and most highly valued hymns,

which are in constant use in nearly all our congregations. It is suggested that the most prompt and practical method is to appoint a Treasurer to receive contributions of 25 cents and upwards from every one who may desire to aid in this movement, and to forward the amount at once to the Countess of Aberdeen or the Lieut. Governor of Ontario. I sent in my subscription some weeks ago.

The Education of Our Children in the Province of Ontario.

The difficulties which surround this most important question owing to our unhappy religious divisions are forcing themselves upon the attention of all thoughtful people. Before we can reach any practical solution of them which will be generally acceptable, we shall have to devote a great deal of time and patient discussion to the subject in all its aspects. The weak points in our provincial system are being recognized. All the religious bodies are preparing to take their part in the discussion of it if they have not already united in making representations to the Minister of Education and the Government of the Province. I do not propose to do more on this occasion than to remark that in my humble opinion voluntary denominational schools should be our aim and goal, however distant and unlikely they may appear at present, and that in the meantime we should throw our influence in with all who will seek to have more religious instruction in our present schools. I hope you will appoint a strong committee to unite with others in discussing the question in all its aspects and in studying the Public School scheme recognizing voluntary schools which is now before the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto. Our committee should be instructed to report to our next Synod upon the practicability of this scheme, with any suggestions or recommendations they may deem advisable.

Now, Brethren, let us give our best attention to the work which is before us,

and may God supply all our need.

Memorial of Sub-Committee of Executive Committee of Diocese of Ontario on Division of Funds.

The sub-committee of the Executive appointed to draw up a statement of objections to clause 14 of the Act Incorporating the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa respectfully present the following as objections to the clause in question.

- I. The clause in question is inconsistent with clause eight of the Act which implies that the matter of division is still open for agreement between the two Synods.
- 2. The clause in question was introduced into the Act without the knowledge or concurrence of the authorities of the Diocese of Ontario though the Act had been prepared by the Chancellor of said Diocese, and had been revised from time to time by the Archbishop, the Chancellor and the Clerical Secretary.
- 3. That it was not the province nor the intention of the Act to do more than incorporate the new Synod and to enable it to receive property conveyed to it and to make any necessary agreement with the Synod of Ontario with respect to division and other matters.
- 4. Because the Report of the Committee referred to in the fourteenth Clause of the Act was in no sense an agreement between the two Dioceses or anything more than an expression of the opinion or desire of the members of the Synod then present as to the manner in which the funds should be divided and no agreement between the two Synods upon that subject has ever in fact been arrived at.

5. Because the report in question could not be acted upon unless supplemented by the report of the sub-committee therein referred to.

6. Because the division of the funds suggested by the report appears in some respects to be unfair to the Diocese of Ontario and because it was generally understood by the members of Synod that the question of division should be open for discussion after the Synod of Ottawa had been formed.

Report of Special Committee appointed to consider Memorial of Executive Committee of Ontario Diocese.

1. In answer to the first objection of the Ontario Synod Sub-Committee, the committee is of opinion that Clause 8 deals with matters of conveyance and the trusts upon which the funds shall be held, and that the agreement or arrangement therein mentioned had already been made by the adoption of the report of the Synod of Ontario dated 20th June, 1895. Clause 14 was merely intended to indicate the machinery for carrying out the agreement or arrangement therein made.

2. In answer to the 2nd objection the Bill as drafted by Chancellor Walkem was introduced in the House by Lt.-Col. Matheson; that it was referred to the Private Bills and was amended both in that committee and in committee of the whole House, the amendments proceeding from various sources; that as a result the Bill was actually printed three or four times, such amendments being communicated to the Chancellor of Ontario from time to time; that the member in charge was not responsible for the action either of the committee or the action of the House, except as aforesaid, and that if the amendment embodied in Clause 14 was not communicated to the Chancellor of the Ontario Diocese before the final passage of the Act it is to be regretted; but that due notice, according to the Rules of the House, was given of the amendment; and the validity of the Act of the Legislature, as such, does not depend upon notice of any amendment to the Bill as introduced having been given to the Chancellor of the Diocese of Ontario. The provisions and amendments to the Bill were inserted in good faith and with the object of carrying out the obvious intention of the Synod of Ontario.

3. REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

I.-Report of Board of Rural Deans.

To the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa:

The Board of Rural Deans are required by Synod to present, through their Chairman, an Annual Report on the condition of the Church in their several Deaneries, and in particular to inform the Synod of any neglect on the part of parishes or missions in contributing to the maintenance of the Clergy.

Since the Rural Deans of the Diocese were constituted a Standing Committee of Synod in 1890 the preparation and presentation of their Annual Report has been the work of a venerable priest and pioneer missionary of forty years ago—the worthy Rural Dean of Lennox and Addington, whom year after year the board delighted to honour by continuing him in the office of Chairman. The wisdom of their action may be seen in the valuable reports which appear in the Synod Journal.

The Board of Rural Deans of the Diocese of Ottawa have held their first meeting and elected the undersigned to the position of Chairman, instructing him to prepare and present to Synod their first Annual Report, based on the information supplied by the several Rural Deans.

In presenting this their first report the Board feel that the duty devolves upon them of giving expression to their unfeigned gratitude to the great Head of the Church for so manifest a blessing on the recent efforts to increase the Episcopate and extend the Church in the section of the Province now embraced in the new Diocese of Ottawa; and of placing on record the expression of their earnest hope that the separate Dioceses may work side by side in brotherly union and concord, each reciprocating the love and emulating the good work of the other, and each bearing in mind and endeavoring to fulfil in practice the apostolic injunction to "Stand fast in one spirit, with one mind striving together for the faith of the Gospel."

I. CARLETON DEANERY-REY. J. J. BOGERT, M.A. RURAL DEAN.

In this Deanery the Rural Dean reports 18 Parishes; 20 Clergy; 41 churches, in 36 of which seats are free; Church accommodation, 9,360 sittings; 12 Parsonages; 34 Sunday Schools, with 2,699 pupils and 275 teachers; 3,032 Church families; 12,459 Church population; 3,960 Communicants. Parochial contributions to Clergymen's Income, \$16,933.08. For other Parochial objects, \$20,809.74. For Diocesan Missions, \$1,838.82. For D. & F. Missions, \$1,464.12. For other Diocesan objects, \$536.13. Total contributions in Deanery, \$41,581.89, being an average of \$13.70 per family. The Deanery receives aid from the Mission Fund to extent of \$700.00 per year. A new stone church has been built at Dunrobin in the Parish of March, which for beauty of design and completeness of appointments is unsurpassed by any Church in the rural parts of the Diocese. The erection of such a Church free of encumbrance reflects great credit upon the Rector and parishioners generally.

II. LANARK DEANERY-REV. A. C. NESBITT, RURAL DEAN.

This Deanery includes 8 Parishes; 8 Clergy; 16 Churches, with seating capacity of 3,450; 8 Parsonages; 12 Sunday Schools, with 876 pupils and 76 teachers; 1,113 Church families; 5,470 Church population; 1,788 Communicants; Parochial contributions to Clergymen's Income, \$5,770.66; for other Parochial objects, \$1,984.66; butions to Clergymen's Income, \$5,770.66; for other Parochial objects, \$1,984.66; for Diocesan Missions, \$1,537.65; for D. and F. Missions, \$286.60; total contributions in Deanery, \$13,373.68, being an average of \$12.01 per family. The Deanery receives from Mission Fund \$450.00 per year. The Rural Dean reports all Parishes supplied with Clergy and urges the necessity of forming a new mission between Perth, Smith's Falls and Carleton Place, with grant of \$300.00.

III. PRESCOTT AND RUSSELL DEANERY-REV. H. POLLARD, RURAL DEAN.

In this Deanery there are 6 Parishes; 5 Clergy; 16 Churches, with accommodation for 2,005 worshippers; 6 Parsonages; 10 Sunday Schools, with 361 pupils and 31 teachers; 379 Church families; 1,812 Church population; 602 Communicants; Parochial contributions to Clergymen's Income, \$1,722.04; for other Parochial objects, \$735.98; for Diocesan Mission Fund, \$337.06; for D. and F. Missions, \$46.16; total contributions in Deanery, \$5,605.35, being an average of \$14.79 per family per year. The Deanery receives from Mission Fund, \$750.00 per year. During recent years there have been improvements in the Deanery, but the Rural Dean is very anxious that the Church be redeemed in many parts where now she is weak, to accomplish which pecuniary aid to a considerable extent will be required. It would also be necessary to re-arrange existing Missions in the County of Russell. Janeville should be a centre for new mission, with out-station at Blackburn; Navan should surrender Cumberland and Blackburn and take Eastman's Springs, while Rockland might be the centre of a new mission with Cumberland and Canaan as out-

This Deanery com 4,300 sittings; 9 Parson 939 Church families; 4 stations. Bearbrook might surrender Canaan to take over South Indian, and Osgoode requires to be divided, Duncanville becoming the centre of a new mission from which fresh ground could be broken. All this would necessitate additional grants to the extent of \$700.00, and application has been made to the Mission Board in the hope that funds may soon permit of this work being undertaken. At Metcalfe a new church is about to be erected, the congregation having subscribed liberally.

IV. RENFREW DEANERY-REV. C. V. FORSTER BLISS, RURAL DEAN.

Application has been made to His Lordship to divide this Deanery, it having been found very hard to work owing to the extent of territory covered. It embraces 47 Townships, many of which, while only sparsely settled, yet have to be travelled over to reach outlying posts. The reports presented at the recent Deanery Conference show 11 Parishes; 11 Clergy; 38 Congregations; 23 Churches with accommodation for 2,985 worshippers; 8 Parsonages; 16 Sunday Schools, with 593 pupils and 66 teachers; 736 Church families; 3,725 Church population; 970 Communicants; Parochial contributions to Clerical Income, \$4,715.43; total contributions in Deanery to all the purposes of the Church, local and foreign, \$9,840.47, being an average of \$13.37 per family per year. The Deanery has but four self-supporting Parishes and is aided by the Mission Fund to the extent of \$2,300.00. There are many signs of vigorous Church life and growth. Within three years two of the oldest parishes (Stafford and Eganville) relinquished their grant from the Mission Fund, and have since become more vigorous than ever, one of them (Stafford) having built a stone church which was consecrated as soon as completed. Let this go on record, to the credit of the Congregation of Saint Patrick's and the Rector of Stafford. The stipends are very inadequate in seven missions, ranging from \$490.00 to \$635.00, inclusive of grant. At Beachburg the Parsonage debt has been reduced to \$140.00; at Cobden, \$255.00 expended in property; at Eganville cemetery newly fenced, debt on Lake Doré Church reduced to \$90.00, Parish Hall finished and Parochial Library added. Church, Hall, and Rectory lighted by electricity; at Petawawa \$236.00 paid on property; at Reufrew, Church refurnished with handsome oak seats. New mission work is being opened on the D. A. and P. S. Railway, where a student from Trinity is to be employed during vacation. A resident missionary is urgently needed and strong-representations have been made to the Mission Board in this connection. Within the limits of this proposed new mission there are, at Whitney and at Gillmour two large saw-mills, employing several hundred hands. The Archbishop administered Confirmation in December in Pembroke, Eganville and Stafford, consecrating the Church of St. Patrick in the latter Parish.

V. STORMONT DEANERY-REV. R. L. M. HOUSTON, M.A., RURAL DEAN.

This Deanery comprises 10 Parishes, with 11 Clergy; 18 Churches, providing 4,300 sittings; 9 Parsonages; 16 Sunday Schools, with 968 pupils and 120 teachers; 939 Church families; 4,854 Church population; 1,531 Communicants; Parochial

contributions to Clergymen's Income, \$5,759.26; for other Parochial objects, \$7,543.13; for Diocesan Mission Fund, \$707.51; for D. and F. Missions, \$252.82; total contributions of Deanery for all the purposes of the Church, \$14,465.55; being an average of \$15.40 per family, the highest average of any Deanery in the Diocese, though leading the Deanery of Prescott and Russell by only 61 cents per family. The Mission Board expends \$900.00 in the Deanery and the Rural Dean asks most urgently for an increase of \$600.00 in the grant in order that the County of Glengarry may be opened up by the Church, there being at present no Church services within its borders. A number of Church people are living in the villages of Alexandria and Lancaster, as well as in other parts of the County, and evidently the time has come—God grant it may not have passed—when an earnest effort on the part of the Church to break ground in this too long neglected field, may confidently be expected to yield an ample harvest of souls.

The handsome new church at Morrisburg has, by the liberality of the congregation, been entirely cleared of all liability. It is worthy of special remark that the congregation comprises but 80 families, and yet they have, within three years, erected and paid for a Church costing \$15,000.00. The Diocese could very well stand an epidemic of such liberality. The Rural Dean recommends the division of the large parish of Osnabruck and Moulinette, which numbers 218 families. Improvements are reported from the various parishes: Iroquois, new shed; Moulinette, new font; Wales, new cemetery well fenced; Newington, new altar vessels and sanctuary carpet. At East Cornwall three new houses have been built by Dr. Mountain at a cost of \$3,400.00, the rents of which will ultimately form part of the parish endowment. On the whole the Rural Dean reports the work of the Church throughout the Deanery as having been carried on during the past year with gratifying

In regard to the incomes of the Clergy, it can scarcely be said that our missionary Priests are in receipt of adequate stipends. By resolution of Synod the minimum stipend of a country Priest is fixed at \$800.00 and a house; Deacons, \$600.00. In no reported instance is this minimum attained, and the attention of the Synod is earnestly called to the fact that many of our missionaries are daily enduring privations, which must inevitably result wherever insufficient provision is made for a living income. It may be instanced that in one Deanery four Priests report their stipends respectively at \$600.00, \$593.00, \$551.00, and \$478.00. Comment is unnecessary, but action is urgently called for.

In concluding their first report to this Synod the Rural Deans desire to give expression to their high appreciation of the deep personal interest taken by the Lord Bishop in the successful working of the office to which they have been called, and to place on record the expression of their assurance that such personal interest on the part of the Bishop will surely result in largely increased Ruri-decanal usefulness. /3. - Report of the Committee on the State of the Church.

The Committee on the State of the Church, after much correspondence and calculation, report that in some instances the returns from some parishes are a puzzle to ordinary mathematicians and the statements are only approximately correct. As this is an historic year, we have made the returns complete from every Parish by filling in from last year's report where necessary. The Rev. J. K. McMorine of Kingston, has kindly supplied the following figures showing the state of the Church in Ontario Diocese in 1864:—

The total revenue of 1864 was \$25,505, of which this part of the Diocese contributed \$13,733; during the past year, which has not been an average one, this Diocese raised \$88,473. While we have not progressed very much numerically, we have made a fair financial showing.

Comparing the returns of 1895 and 1896, we find the following interesting facts: We have gained 99 families, 561 persons, and 140 Communicants.

The parishes which have gained are St. Luke's, Ottawa, 330, due to more correct returns; Fitzroy Harbour, 136, from a more complete return; Osnabruck, 58; Stafford, 46; and losses are reported from Iroquois, 99; Calabogie, 61; Eganville, 57; Almonte, 40.

The Communicants have increased in Carleton. Renfrew and Stormont, and decreased in Prescott and Russell, by more accurate returns, and Lanark, in the Parishes of Almonte, Clayton and Franktown.

In every Deanery there is a decrease in the number of services held. There have been 15 additional mid-day celebrations and a decrease of 45 early, 27 additional week-day services and 210 less services on Sunday—Renfrew, Prescott and Russell, and Carleton being responsible for the decrease.

We have also to report the following decreases:—80 baptisms, 18 marriages, 83 burials, 2 Sunday Schools, 134 pupils, 12 male teachers and 16 female teachers.

From these statistics it can easily be seen that the past year has not been a successful one, and we must hope that under the energetic direction and example of ou Reverend Father in God the Clergy and Laity will be roused to work with more system and enthusiasm for God and His Church.

Parochial objects have also decreased \$5,204.

When we compare the contributions for objects inside the Parish we are still more dismayed, and many parts of the diocese show alarming symptoms of that spiritual paralysis, called parochialitis, failing to look upon the Church in its length and breadth and height. The figures seem to prove in every case, "There is that scattereth and yet increaseth; and there is that withholdeth more than is meet, and it tendeth to poverty." If we may venture the word of exhortation to our brethren it is: "Give and it shall be given unto you, good measure, pressed down and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure that ye mete withal it shall be measured to you again." Our contributions last year diminished \$9,127. The previous year had been an unusually heavy one, as many parishes had given generously to the Ottawa Episcopal Endowment Fund; but when all allowances have been fairly made we find no ground for congratulation in the fact that for extra-parochial objects the average contribution per capita, per week, is little more than half a cent.

The total contributions from all sources are \$88,473 an average yearly amount of about \$14 per family, or \$3 per capita per annum.

Your Committee feel that the returns are; on the whole, fairly satisfactory; but there seems a great necessity for some recognized standard of reckoning, as much flexibility seems to exist.

The Church in the Diocese of Ottawa has bright prospects for the future, and we believe that it will in due course become the Canterbury of Canada.

THIS INDENTURE made in triplicate the twelfth day of August A.D. 1896.

THE INCORPORATED SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF ONTARIO, (HEREINAFTER CALLED THE "SYNOD OF ONTARIO"),

AND

Of the first part,

THE INCORPORATED SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF OTTAWA, (HEREINAFTER CALLED THE "SYNOD OF OTTAWA"),

WHEREAS the Diocese of Ottawa in connection with the Church of England in Canada has lately been set off from the Diocese of Ontario;

AND WHEREAS by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario passed in the fifty ninth year of Her Majesty's reign intituled "An Act to Incorporate the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa in connection with the Church of England in the Dominion of Canada," provision was made for the incorporation of the said Synod of Ottawa and for enabling the said Synod of Ottawa to take and receive from the said Synod of Ontario by assignment or conveyance such proportion of the funds and property held in trust for various purposes by the said Synod of Ontario as the said Synod of Ottawa might become entitled to by virtue of any agreement or arrangement arrived at between the said Synods.

AND WHEREAS the incorporation of the said Synod of Ottawa has been completed and the said Synod of Ottawa is now capable of entering into this agreement and of receiving a transfer of the moneys and securities hereby assigned to it.

AND WHEREAS the Synod of Ontario is possessed as trustee of moneys and securities in connection with the funds hereinafter mentioned, heretofore controlled and managed by the said Synod of Ontario, and it has been agreed between the said Synods, in pursuance of the powers contained in the said Act, that the said funds shall be now divided, as of date the 1st May, 1896, in the proportions and subject to the limitations and conditions hereinafter contained.

AND WHEREAS it has been directed by the said Synods that this agreement shall be drawn up and executed by the officers of the respective parties hereto:

NOW THEREFORE this Indenture witnesseth as follows:

EPISCOPAL ENDOWMENT FUND.

The Episcopal Endowment Fund of the said Synod of Ontario shall be divided in the proportion of two thirds to the Synod of Ontario and one third to the Synod of Ottawa; provided, however, that such division shall not take place until the next

avoidance of the See of Ontario, until which time the Archbishop of Ontario shall receive the income of the whole fund, which shall until division be controlled and managed by the Synod of Ontario; provided that the Synod of Ottawa, its officers and agents, shall, meanwhile, at all times, on reasonable notice, be at liberty to inspect the Books, Vouchers and Securities of the Synod of Ontario respecting said fund and its management, and that the Clerical Secretary of the Synod of Ontario shall forward half yearly in May and November of each year (until the said avoidance and division) to the Clerical Secretary of the Synod of Ottawa a full statement respecting said fund and the securities therefor; and provided further that at the time of such ultimate division the Synod of Ontario shall have the right to deduct from the share of the said fund belonging to the Synod of Ottawa the sum of two thousand eight hundred dollars without interest, which sum so retained by the Synod of Ontario shall be in full satisfaction of any claim of the said Synod of Ontario against the Synod of Ottawa in respect of the See house fund, from which claim the Synod of Ottawa is otherwise hereby released and discharged, the Synod of Ontario hereby agreeing to assume and pay the debt in connection with said last mentioned

SUSTENTATION FUND.

The Sustentation fund of the said Synod of Ontario shall, subject to the provisions hereinafter contained as to gifts and bequests in connection with the Mission Fund, be equally divided between the two Synods, provided that the Synod of Ontario shall have the right to deduct from the share of the said fund belonging to the Synod of Ottawa an amount equal to one half the debt due on the first day of July, 1896, in connection with the Mission Fund of said Diocese of Ontario, which sum so retained by the Synod of Ontario shall be in full satisfaction of any claim of the said Synod of Ontario against the Synod of Ottawa in respect of the Mission Fund debt, which debt the said Synod of Ontario agrees to assume and pay and from which the said Synod of Ottawa is otherwise hereby released and discharged.

THE MISSION FUND.

Each of the said Synods shall assume and pay one half of the debt of the Mission Fund of the Synod of Ontario due on the first day of July, 1896, the share payable by the Synod of Ottawa being provided for by deduction from its share of the Sustentation Fund as hereinbefore provided.

MISSION BEQUESTS.

All mission bequests held by the Synod of Ontario shall be retained by the Synod of Ontario, which shall, however, pay out of its share of the Sustentation Fund to the Synod of Ottawa an amount equal to one half of the Capital of the Labatt, Keefer and McMillan bequests.

The said annutants shall retain the respective priorities according to the list in force at the time of the division of the said Dioceses for all purposes, and shall be entitled to a lien on the entire fund as security for their payments.

The question of the proper disposition of the said sum of \$12,432 is hereby referred for determination to Mr. J. A. Worrell, Q.C., of Toronto, as arbitrator; or in the event of his being unable or unwilling to ac', to such arbitrator as may be named by the Archbishop of Ontario and the Bishop of Ottawa.

Until an award be made with respect to the said sum of \$12,432 by the said arbitrator, the Synod of Ontario shall pay the said sums of \$345.92 payable to the Archbishop, and \$400 payable to the Archdeacons of Kingston and Ottawa out of

the interest thereof, and the said Capital sum of \$12,432 shall be hereafter disposed of by the said Synod of Ontario in accordance with the terms of the award.

RECTORY LANDS FUND.

The Synod of Ontario shall retain so much of the Rectory Lands Fund as belongs or is applicable to Rectories within the limits of the Diocese of Ontario, and the Senod of Ottawa shall be entitled to and shall receive so much of said fund as belongs or is applicable to Rectories within the limits of the Diocese of Ottawa.

THE WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The Widows' and Orphans' fund of the said Synod of Ontario shall be equally divided, and each Synod shall assume the payment of one half of the pensions and charges thereon.

THE DIVINITY STUDENTS' FUND.

The Divinity Students' fund of the said Synod of Ontario shall be equally divided, and each Synod shall assume the payment of one half of the pensions and charges thereon.

THE CLERGY SUPERANNUATION FUND.

The Clergy Superannuation fund of the said Synod of Ontario shall be equally divided, and each Synod shall assume the payment of one half of the pensions and charges thereon.

THE ASSESSMENT FUND.

Each Synod shall have the right to the arrears of the assessment fund due by Parishes within the respective limits of each Diocese.

DEBTS AND LIABILITIES.

All debts and liabilities of the said Synod of Ontario as of the first day of May, 1896, not otherwise provided for, shall be assumed and paid by both Synods in equal proportions.

DIVISION OF SECURITIES.

The division of the securities belonging to the said funds shall be made by six commissioners, three appointed by each Synod, who shall have authority to take such steps as they may think necessary to inform themselves respecting the value of such securities. The division effected by the said Commissioners shall be carried out by necessary conveyances and assignments, and the result shall be reported to each Synod.

The said Commissioners shall have authority to adjust and settle all accounts between the parties hereto, and to determine all matters pertaining to the division.

The said Commissioners shall at their first meeting, and before they enter on the work of division, select an umpire or referee, who shall not belong to either Diocese, to whom shall be referred any question on which the Commissioners are equally divided in opinion, and whose decision shall be final.


