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UNIVERSITY OF TRINITY COLLEGE.

THE UNIVERSITY OF TRINITY COLLEGE was constituted by a Royal Charter, bearing date 16th July. 1852, and empowered to confer Degrees in Divinity, Arts, Law, and Medicine.

The Convocation of the University consists of the Chancellor, the Provost and Professors of Trinity College, and all persons admitted to the Degree of Master of Arts, or to any Degree in Divinity, Law, or Medicine in the University.

No degree can be granted by the University, unless a Supplicat for that Degree shall have passed the Convocation, having been previously approved by the Caput.

THE CAPUT consists of the Vice Chancellor and four members of Convocation to be elected annually by Convocation, at the first meeting in the Michaelmas Term.

The University confers no Degree whatever, unless the candidate, being a British subject, has previously taken the oaths of allegiance and supremacy.

Subscription to the following declaration is also ordinarily required:—

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"I, A. B., do willingly and heartily declare that I am truly and sincerely a member of the United Church of England and Ireland."

The Chancellor and the Vice-Chancellor are, however, empowered to dispense with this Declaration, in the case of Degrees in Arts, Law, and Medicine, if such dispensation be sought by the candidate on the ground that he is not a member of the Church of England.

For any degree in Divinity, subscription to the Three Articles of the XXXVIth Canon is also required.

Broceedings in Arts.

All Candidates for the Degree of B.A. must be Matriculated Students of Trinity College, and have kept nine complete Terms. They will be required by the University to pass two Examinations.

Residence and attendance at Lectures may, however, be dispensed with in individual cases, in which application to that effect, shall have been made to the Corporation, and the grounds assigned by the applicant unanimously approved by the Corporation. In such cases the applicant must not be less than twenty-five years of age, and will be required to pass the Matriculation, the Previous, and the Final Examinations at intervals not less than those which are prescribed in the case of resident students, and to pay for each Examination which he undergoes, in addition to the fees for Matriculation and Degree, the sum of \$5.00 to the University Chest.

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I. THE PREVIOUS EXAMINATION.

This Examination will take place, in the case of Students entering in the Michaelmas Term, at the end of the second year. The subjects for this Examination will be:—

DIVINITY -One of the Historical Books of the New Testament in Greek.

Evidences of Christianity.

Church Catechism.

CLASSICS.—Portions of two Greek and two Latin Authors.

Latin Prose Composition.

MATHEMATICS.—Euclid, Books I., H., III., IV., VI.

A'gebra, to Binomial Theorem inclusive.

Trigonometry, to Solution of Triangles inclusive.

Elementary Statics.

Elementary Dynamics, to the end of Rectilinear Motion of a Particle.

The particular authors to be fixed at the beginning of the Lent Term of the preceding year.

The names of Students who pass this Examination will be arranged in three classes, in alphabetical order; the first class consisting of those who shall have obtained at least half the whole amount of marks in each subject: the second, of those who shall have passed creditably, though below this standard: the third, of those to whom the Examiners shall have only not refused their certificate of approval.

Any Student who shall have obtained a first-class in the previous Examination, and shall also have passed a satisfactory Examination in the Honour Subjects in Classics at the end of the second year, shall be

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r each to the 5.00 to allowed to declare for Classical Honours, and shall be exempted from attendance at Mathematical Lectures during the third year.

The like exemption will be granted on the like conditions (mutatis mutandis) to Mathematical Students.

Those Students who shall have been rejected at the previous Examination of their own year, or who shall have been absent from such Examination, shall be required to attend the previous Examination of the succeeding year.

If any Student shall absent himself from the previous Examination of his year, without the written permission of the Provost, he shall be considered not to have kept the Easter Term of that year.

Students entering in the Lent or Easter Term must offer themselves for Examination at the same time with those who entered in the preceding October.

II. EXAMINATION FOR THE DEGREE OF B.A.

PASS EXAMINATION.

The regular time for passing this Examination will be at the end of the ninth term of residence. By-term men may present themselves at the same time with those who entered in the preceding October. Those who have lost one or two terms may present themselves at the same time with Students of their own year. But in both cases the Degree will not be conferred until the Student shall have kept nine complete terms.

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CLASSIC

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All Students, not candidates for Honours, intending to proceed to the Degree of B.A., must go through this Examination. The list will be published in the College Hall in alphabetical order.

Students who shall have been allowed to declare for Classical Honours at the end of the second year, and shall have passed a satisfactory Examination in the Honour Subjects in Classics at the end of the third year, shall be exempted from Examination in the Mathematical Subjects of the ordinary Examination for B.A.

The like exemption will be granted on the like conditions (mutatis mutandis) to students who have been allowed to declare for Mathematical Honours,

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HONOUR EXAMINATION AT B.A.

Those who shall have been approved at the Pass Examination for B.A. may present themselves for further Examination for Honours in Classics or Mathematics. The result of such Examination will be published in the College Hall, and in the public prints, in three classes: the order of merit in each subject being determined by the number of marks obtained in this Examination, together with those obtained in that subject in the Pass Examination.

The Examiners in Classics or Mathematics may, at their discretion, add a fourth Honorary class to their Honour list, consisting of those who, not being candidates for Honours, have highly distinguished themselves in the Classical or Mathematical parts of the Pass Examination respectively.

Candidates for Honours who shall have claimed exemption from Examination either in the Classical or in the Mathematical subjects appointed for the ordinary Degree Examination, if they shall have failed to obtain a Class in Honours, will not be eligible for the Degree of B.A. until they shall have passed the ordinary Examination.

Lectures are given in French twice a week by Monsieur Pernet; and Prizes are awarded according to the result of an Annual Examination.

Proceedings in Divinity.

DIVINITY CLASS.

§ I. The following persons may be admitted to the Divinity Class: Graduates in Arts of Trinity College, or other Universities recognized by Trinity College.* Graduates of the University of Toronto, who have been resident Students. Undergraduates of Trinity College, who have attended the Lectures of the Arts' Course for one year, provided that they have obtained the approval of the Provost and Professors, and are of the full age of twenty-one years.

Students may also be admitted to the Divinity Class under the following conditions:

I. That the Candidate for admission be of the full age of twenty-one years.

II. That he produce testimonials from some Clergyman in Priest's Orders, certifying to his good moral character, and apparent fitness for the office of the Christian Ministry, and also to his inability to meet the expense of a three years' academical course; these testimonials being countersigned by the Bishop of the Diocese in which he resides, or in which he intends to offer himself as a candidate for Holy Orders.

*These Universities are Oxford; Cambridge; Trinity College, Dubliu; Durham; King's Cóllege, Windsor, Nova Scotia; King's College, Fredericton, New Brunswick; Bishop's College, Lennoxville; and the late King's College, Toronto/

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III. That he shall have passed a satisfactory Examination in the following subjects:

- 1. The Gospel of St. Matthew, in Greek.
- 2. Scripture History.
- 3. Paley's Horæ Paulinæ, and Blunt's Undesigned Coincidences.
- St. Augustine, De Catechizandis Rudibus. (In C. Marriott's Analecta Christiana, part II.)
- 5. The Liturgy, the Text Book being Procter's Elementary History of the Book of Common Prayer.

IV. That the Examination be held at the same time with the Matriculation Examination, the papers on the Gospel, and on Scripture History, being the same as those given to Candidates for Matriculation.

N.B.—It must be clearly understood that such Students, residing for two years only, will be eligible for the Degree of B.A., only on condition of a further residence of one year, and passing the several) Examinations required for that Degree.

- § 2. Previously to admission, each Student must subscribe the Thirty-nine Articles.
- § 3. The period of study will in all cases be two years; and no certificate in the Theological Department can be granted within this time.

Graduates of other Universities in Canada are also admitted to the Divinity Class under the following conditions:

1. That they shall have proceeded to their Degree by residence, and not simply by Examination.

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- 2. That they shall have graduated in Honours, or have taken an ordinary Degree, passing an examination in Classics and Mathematics.
- 3. That they shall pass an Examination in Trinity College in all the Divinity subjects for the B.A. Examination: viz., Scripture History, the Thirty-nine Articles of the Church of England, and the Acts of the Apostles in Greek.
- 4. That they shall be recommended by the Bishop of the Diocese in which they reside, or in which they propose to serve

BACHELOR OF DIVINITY.

Candidates for this Degree must be Masters of Arts of at least seven years' standing. The requisite exercises are:

A Latin and an English Thesis; one on some point of Doctrine connected with the Thirty-nine Articles, and the other on some Scriptural subject, to be appointed by the Examiners.

An Examination must also be passed in some Latin or Greek Treatise or Treatises chosen by the Examiners.

An English Sermon must be preached before the University.

The Theses are to be sent in to the Provost on or before the 1st of September, 1874, and the Candidates will be notified of the time at which the Examination will be held, which will not be earlier than the 1st of October.

DOCTOR OF DIVINITY.

Candidates for this Degree must be Bachelors of Divinity of five years' standing. They will be required to write an English and a Latin Thesis, as in the case of B.D., and to preach an English Sermon before the University.

The Examiners for the Degree of Bachelor and Doctor in Divinity shall be the Professor of Divinity and two Graduates in that Faculty, to be appointed by the Corporation.

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Proceedings in Medicine.

DEGREE OF M.B.

The following are the requisites for admission to the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine in this University:—

Having passed a Matriculation Examination in the following subjects, or one equivalent thereto in all respects, either in this, or some other recognized Institution. The subjects comprised in this Examination, are the following:—

English Language, including Grammar and Composition.

Arithmetic, including Vulgar and Decimal Fractions.

Algebra, including Simple Equations.

Geometry, first two books of Euclid.

Latin Translation and Grammar; and in one of the following subjects, the Student having the option of naming the one in which he will be examined:—

Greek.

French.

German.

Natural Philosophy, including Mechanics, Hydrostatics and Pneumatics.

Note.—Students are recommended to select Natural Philosophy, or one of the Modern Languages.

Graduates in Arts of any British or Foreign University are not required to pass this Examination.

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The Kingston October, by the Matricu A certificate of having Matriculated before the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, will be accepted by this University.

Having produced a satisfactory certificate of good conduct.

Being of the full age of twenty one years.

Having pursued Medical Studies for the period of at least four years, and having regularly attended Lectures extending over a period of at least three Sessions of six months each, in the following branches of Medical Education, for the respective periods herein set forth:—

Anatomy, two courses of six months.

Practical Anatomy, two courses of six months.

Theory and Practice of Medicine, two courses of six months, including Pathology and Medical Diagnosis.

Principles and Practice of Surgery, two courses of six months

Chemistry, two courses of six months.

Midwifery and Diseases of Women and Children, two courses of six months.

Therapeutics and Pharmacology, two courses of six months.

Physiology, two courses of six months.

Practical Chemistry, one course of three months.

Medical Jurisprudence, one course of three months. Botany, one course of three months.

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^{*}The Matriculation Examinations of this Body are held in Toronto and Kingston on the first Tuesday and Wednesday of January, April, July, and October, of each year. The attention of Students is drawn to the fact that by the Medical Council the period of study is reckoned from the date of Matriculation.

Having attended for at least twelve months the practice of some general Hospital, and having attended during two Sessions, Clinical Lectures on Medicine

and Surgery.

Having attended for at least six months the practice of a Lying-in-Hospital, or giving satisfactory evidence of having otherwise enjoyed equivalent obstetrical advantages, with certificates of attendance upon at least six cases of labour.

Having passed in this University an Examination in all the above subjects.

The above course of study may have been pursued either wholly in the Medical Department of this University, or partly in some other recognized Medical School. In the latter case, at least one full Session must have been spent in this Department.

The last requirement does not apply to Medical men coming up for Examination, who have been several years in practice.

Examination in Moral Science.

AN EXAMINATION IN MORAL SCIENCE will take place at the end of the Lent Term in each year, open to Bachelors of Arts. There will be a course of lectures on the History of Philosophy, and on portions of the works of standard ancient and modern Philosophers.

The particular subjects for Examination will be fixed in the Lent Term of the preceding year.

Candidates will be arranged in order of merit.

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Examination in Scripture History.

The Family of the late Mrs. John Hamilton, of Hawkesbury, have founded, in her memory, an annual prize of \$30 in books, under the following regulations:

I. The Prize to be called the Hamilton Memorial Prize, is to be awarded according to the result of the annual Examination in Scripture History, including such books, illustrative of Scripture History, Antiquities, and Interpretation, as may from time to time be selected.

II. All Students belonging to the Divinity Class, as well as all others who have passed through their Theological course, and have not attained M.A. standing, shall be eligible as candidates.

III. The Examination shall take place at the end of the Lent Term in each year.

IV. All Students belonging to the Theological Class at the time shall be required to attend the Examination.

V. The Examiners shall be empowered to withhold the prize, if no candidate be found worthy.

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Trinity College.

TRINITY COLLEGE was, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Canada, passed in the year of our Lord, 1851, constituted a body corporate, consisting of the Lord Bishop of Toronto, (or in case of the division of the Diocese of Toronto, of the Bishops of the several Dioceses into which the Diocese of Toronto shall be divided), the Trustees of the College and the College Council.

On the first of January, 1850, an Act of the Provincial Legislature came into operation, constituting the University of Toronto; and, under the provisions of this Act, the Faculty of Divinity was suppressed, and the use of the ritual of the English Church forbidden, in King's College, now known as University College.

This important change in the Constitution of a foundation, which owed its origin mainly to the long-continued and persevering efforts of the Bishop of Toronto, appeared to his Lordship, and to the great body of the Churchmen of the Province, to render indispensable the erection of a College for the instruction of members of the Church of England.

The Bishop, consequently, on the 7th of February, 1850, issued a Pastoral Letter to the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese inviting their co-operation in the good work. This appeal was nobly responded to, and about £25,000 currency was subscribed in money, lands, and stock in building societies.

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Wit same t by the appoin the lat In the same year his Lordship proceeded to England, where he received very liberal assistance in carrying out his great design. The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, made a vote of two thousand pounds, payable by instalments of four hundred pounds per annum; and also gave seven acres and a half of land within the precincts of the City of Toronto. The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, granted three thousand pounds; and the University of Oxford, five hundred pounds. The subscriptions of individuals exceeded four thousand pounds.

On Wednesday, April 30th, 1851, the foundation stone of the College was laid, and on Thursday, the 15th of January, 1852, the Inauguration took place, and from that day the regular course of instruction commenced.

In the year 1852, the Ven. A. N. Bethune, D.D., Archdeacon of York, raised further subscriptions in England; and in 1852-3, the Rev.William McMurray, D.D., by the appointment of the Bishop, made a tour in the United States, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions on behalf of the College. He met everywhere with a most cordial reception from the members of the sister Church; and obtained in books and money, little short of \$10,000.

Within the Diocese, successful efforts were at the same time made by the Rev. T. B. Fuller, D.D., and by the Rev. Saltern Givins—the former, by the Bishop's appointment, undertaking the canvas of the Western—the latter, that of the Eastern section of the Diocese.

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In April, 1853, Dr. Burnside placed at the disposal of the College the munificent sum of £6,000, in lands and money—a portion of which has been devoted to the foundation of two Burnside Scholarships for Students in Arts, in order permanently to associate with the College the name of this noble benefactor.

In the year 1864, the Rev. William McMurray, D.D., D.C.L., Rector of Niagara, was deputed by the Corporation of Trinity College, to visit England for the purpose of seeking aid towards the endowment of the College. The result of his laborious and successful endeavours was the realizing of an amount in money or in books of about \$20,000. The books are mentioned in detail in the account given of the Library of the College. Dr. McMurray's mission having been interrupted by the necessity of returning to Canada, the Rev. W. S. Darling was appointed in the following year to take up the unfinished work, and he succeeded in collecting \$2,526.

The Hon. James Gordon, M.L.C., bequeathed to the College, in 1865, the sum of £500 currency.

In the year 1866, Enoch Turner, Esq., of Toronto, bequeathed to the College £2,000 currency, payable on the death of his wife, "to be applied towards carrying on the charitable and holy purposes for which the College was incorporated."

Thomas Clarke Street, Esq., bequeathed to the College, in the year 1872, the sum of £1,000 currency.

Other benefactors to the College will be found mentioned in connection with the Library, or under the head of Scholarships.

Library.

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The College Library contains about 4,500 volumes. 600 of which are a gift from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge. About the same number were sent from England by private benefactors before the College was opened. Valuable additions have been made to the Library by the Government of the State of New York, from the Smithsonian Institute, and from Columbia College. The late Bishop of Toronto also presented upwards of 300 volumes, including many valuable works in Theological, Classical, and General Literature, and at his death bequeathed to the College the remainder of his extensive and val-The University of Oxford made a uable Library. munificent grant of books, published at the University Press, of the value of £150 sterling; and Trinity College, Dublin, kindly presented copies of the works published by the University, amounting to upwards of 80 volumes.

Two Scholarships, founded by the late Duke of Wellington, of the annual value of £50 currency, tenable for one year.

Two Scholarships, founded by Alexander Burnshe, Esq., of the annual value of £30 currency, tenable for one year.

Two Scholarships, founded by William Dickson, Esq., of the annual value of £30 currency, tenable for one year.

Two FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIPS tenable for one year, one of £50 currency, and the other of £35, open to all Candidates for matriculation of the required age.

THREE SCHOLARSHIPS, of the respective values of £50, £35, and £25 currency, will be offered for competition at the Matriculation in October, 1874.

Two Scholarships, founded by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, from the Jubilee Fund of the year 1851, of the annual value of £40 currency, tenable for two years. One of these Scholarships is awarded yearly to the most deserving Bachelor of the year, who, having graduated in at least second class Honours, shall have expressed his intention of studying for Holy Orders.

THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF TORONTO also provides Exhibitions, tenable by Students of Trinity College. Two exhibitioners have also been nominated by the DIOCESE OF ONTARIO.

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also prof Trinity nominated C. W. Cooper, Esq., of Mount Pleasant, left by will, in 1866, the sum of \$4,000, in City of Hamilton debentures, for the purpose of endowing an Exhibition to be held in Trinity College. The Exhibitioner to be nominated by the executors of Mr. Cooper's will during their lives, and afterwards by the Bishop of Toronto. The present value of the exhibition is £40 currency, it is tenable for one year, and any Matriculated Student of the College, not holding a Scholarship, is eligible, with a preference in all cases to the Sons of Clergymen.

The Corporation has also provided that four Bursaries shall be open every year, tenable from year to year, for a period not exceeding three years, of the value of £15 10s. per annum. Any Student who shall have passed the Matriculation Examination, and shall have satisfied the Corporation that he cannot, without the aid thus afforded, avail himself of the advantages of a University Education, shall be eligible for a Bursary, provided that he be not the holder of a Scholarship or Exhibition. Ceteris paribus, the sons of Clergymen will be preferred.

Trinity College School.

" Beati mundo corde."

The School was first established in the village of Weston, near Toronto, and was opened May 1st, 1865. In consequence of the liberal offers of assistance made by the inhabitants of Port Hope, during the summer of 1868, the School was removed to that town, where it was established in buildings provided by the townspeople, free of rent for three years. Early in 1871. the property, consisting of ten acres of land, together with the buildings upon it, and situated on one of the most picturesque sites in Canada, was purchased by the School. The erection of large permanent buildings, designed by H. Macdougall, Esq., Architect, Toronto, was then proceeded with. They furnish accommodation for about eighty boarders, with apartments for Masters, Matron, and Servants, and were occupied for the first time in January, 1872.

Trinity College School was, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, passed during the Session of 1871-2, constituted a corporate body, consisting of the Lord Bishop of Toronto, the Chancellor of the University of Trinity College, the Provost and the Professors in Arts of Trinity College, the Head

Master of the School, and such other persons as may from time to time be appointed by the Governing Body.

During the past year (1873) a large and handsome Chapel, capable of containing upwards of two hundred worshippers, and a spacious Dining Hall, have been erected at the east end of the new school building. Detailed descriptions of the new buildings are given in subsequent pages.

At the western end of the present range of buildings there is being added this year (1874) a wing running north and south, with a projecting tower on the west front. This addition will contain spacious Class-rooms, School-hall, Dormitories for about seventy more boys, and apartments for an increased staff of Masters and servants.

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The Chapel.

Extract from the Port Hope "Times," April 2, 1874.

"The new School Chapel was opened for Divine Service on Sunday last (March 29) by the Lord Bishop of Toronto, an event which has been long looked forward to by the friends of the institution. building, which is larger than is required for the present needs of the School, has been designed The style of archiwith a view to future increase. tecture is the Perpendicular - a style which is usually employed in England for Collegiate buildings. consists of a nave, 75x21 feet, and a chancel terminating in an apse 25x19 feet, and is attached to the east end of the School, making the total length of the buildings two hundred feet. It is of red brick, relieved by white brick facings and buttresses with cut stone caps; the east end of the nave is run up into a bellcote, also of white brick. In each of the five bays, into which the nave is divided, is a window in three lights, filled with cusped tracery of exceedingly beautiful character. The Chancel is lighted by a series of five small three light windows, one in each of the sides of the apse. These are at present filled with plain glass, which will shortly be replaced by stained glass windows, the promised gifts of friends; the subjects will be illustrative of our Lord's childhood and His dealings with children. The interior is arranged in a matter somewhat different from that in ordinary use, but admirably adapted for the purposes required. At the west end of the nave is an ante-chapel communicating with the building, and entered from the outside by means of the stranger's porch; over this ante-chapel is an organ loft. From the ante-chapel a broad passage leads into the chapel proper, which is seated lengthwise—the plan almost universally adopted in School and College chapels. The seats are of pine, stained and varnished, with top railings of oak and ends of ash, and are of an exceedingly neat pattern and very comfortable—a requirement which is too often overlooked in our church seatings. The remainder of the furniture is only of a temporary character, and will be replaced as soon as possible by permanent fittings executed from designs by the architect. east end of the nave is the choir, of dimensions 31x20 feet, reached by a flight of three steps of oak. will contain the lectern, pulpit, and organ, and also stalls for the choir and the officiating clergy. Another step leads into the chancel, which is divided into two parts—the presbytery containing the sedilia, or seats for the clergy, and the Bishop's throne; and the Sacrarium, in which are the Altar and Credence.

"The nave windows, the gift of past and present boys of the School, are of thick rolled cathedral glass, in three tints, worked in a leaded geometrical design, and are remarkably chaste and beautiful; but the chief adornment of the chapel is the magnificent roof, which, as

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far as we know, has no equal in any church in the Dominion. It is an open roof in wood, without any plaster, showing the principals, the purlins and rafters, and divided by mouldings into panels. The vertical hammer-beams of the principals terminate in pendants, and the horizontal beams in shields, on which will be painted the emblems of the apostles. The edges, both of the principals and the purlins, are chamfered; and this is brought out by vermilion and blue, which, contrasting with the dark staining of the rest of the wood, gives a very pleasing and beautiful effect.......

"The whole workmanship reflects very great credit upon the architect, Mr. Henry Macdougall, of Toronto, and Mr. Bethune's foreman, Mr. John Cottrell."

The Dining Hall.

The new Dining Hall, which is situated beneath the Chapel, was formally opened on the 5th of November, 1873, by the Most Reverend, A. Oxenden, D.C.L., Lord Bishop of Montreal and Metropolitan. It is a very handsome and spacious apartment, consisting of the hall proper, 63x21 feet, and a recess at the east end for the high-table 19x15 feet, raised two steps above the floor of the hall, and entered through a massive arch. At the west end is the Dinner-serving room, connecting directly with the kitchen, pantries, &c., &c., cut off from the hall by a sliding window. The main approach to the Hall is by means of an oaken staircase from the floor above, on which are situ-

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ated the boys' studies, Masters' rooms, &c. The Hall is lighted by four three-light windows on each side, filled with tinted glass in geometrical lead-work, and with ornamental cusped heads; the high-table is also lighted with similar glass windows, one at each end The floor is laid with narrow of two-lights each. boards of oak; the ceiling is entirely of wood, handsomely panelled with mouldings, and showing the massive beams, supported by a double series of pillars, that sustain the floor above. The sides are wainscoted with pine, which, with all the rest of the woodwork, is richly stained and varnished. The tables are of white oak and are arranged at present to accommodate a hundred; if necessary, however, in the future, more than double that number can be provided for.

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Course of Instruction.

The Course of Instruction includes all the usual branches of a sound education in Classics, Mathematics, English, German, French, Natural Sciences, Bookkeeping, Drawing, and Vocal Music.

Pupils are prepared for the Matriculation Examination of the Universities, and the Entrance Examination of the Law and Medical Schools, the Army, Navy, &c. 4n the Modern Department special attention is directed to preparation for commercial pursuits.

The discipline and general management of the School are based upon the English Public School System. Out-of-School government is, accordingly, to a large extent, vested in the hands of the Prefects, who are selected from the senior boys by the Head Master.

FEES.

\$225 per annum; or \$75 per Term, for board and tuition.

\$60 per annum; or \$20 per Term, for tuition only. The Piano-forte is taught as an extra. Fee, for tuition and use of instrument, \$10 per term.

Each new boy, on admission to the School, is required to pay an entrance fee of \$4, which is devoted to the maintenance and improvement of the Boys' Library, and a fee of \$12, in lieu of bedding, &c., which are now supplied by the School, instead of, as formerly, by the pupils.

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ng Master.

The above fees are inclusive of all School expenses, except books, stationery, drawing materials, &c., and medical attendance.

The payments for Board and Tuition, which are apportioned between the School Terms, must be paid strict'y in advance. All other School Accounts will be sent in the usual way.

A half term's notice must be given in writing before the removal of a pupil. If such notice is not given, a half-term's fees, will be collected.

The following Rule respecting the payment of Fees was adopted, at a meeting of the Governing Body of the School, held on August 18th, 1870:—

"The Fees for Board and Tuition in each Term, and any balance which may remain for Books or otherwise, from the previous Term, must be paid within a week after a Boy presents himself at the School. If this be not done, the Bursar is required to draw on the Parent or Guardian for the amount (with Bank charges,) at ten days, and should this draft be returned dishonored, the Boy must be sent home by the Head Master."

Books and Stationery are supplied in the School at the ordinary prices.

Boys over fourteen years of age will be admitted to the School only on the production of such testimonials of previous good conduct and diligence as shall perfectly satisfy the Head Master and the Governing Body. The Control of the Whol long as he tinue to s

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BURSARIES.

The Corporation offers to the Sons of the Clergy in the Dominion of Canada, Ten Bursaries of the annual value of \$50 each, tenable from year to year, during the whole period of a Boy's residence at the School, so long as his conduct and attention to his studies continue to satisfy the Head Master.

The Son of any Clergyman who is, or was at the time of his death, actually engaged in Parochial or Missionary work, or in a Church School or College, in the Dominion, shall be eligible for a Bursary. Written application must be made to the Corporation by the Parent or Guardian of the Boy, certifying that, without the aid thus afforded, the educational advantages of the School cannot be obtained for him. Ceteris paribus, preference will be given to the Sons of the Clergy in the Dioceses of Toronto and Ontario.

BOARDING.

Boarders are received into the new School House, a building warmed and ventilated on the most approved modern system, and furnished with bath-rooms and all other appliances which can promote the comfort and health of the Boys. It is under the personal supervision of the Head Master, assisted by three Resident Masters, who direct the Boy's evening work. The household arrangements are attended to by an experienced Lady Matron.

It is particularly requested that Parents should send their Boys to School with their clothing, linen, and other requisites, carefully and clearly marked with the name in full.

It is desired that no eatables should be sent to the Boys during Term, with the exception of fruit.

Pupils from a distance are allowed, upon application, to remain in residence during the Christmas and Easter Vacations at a charge of \$4 per week for board. No Pupils are permitted to remain during the summer holidays.

It is recommended that pocket-money should be supplied to the younger Boys only through the Head Master instead of directly from home. A small sum furnished weekly is more beneficial than an occasional larger amount.

Lent Term, 1875:—January 9 to April 9. Trinity Term, 1875:—April 23 to July 20.

VACATIONS.

Two weeks at Easter; eight weeks at Midsummer; three weeks at Christmas. Return tickets are issued for the holidays by the Grand Trunk, Great Western, Northern, and Midland Railways, for one fare and a third.

EXAMINATIONS.

Examinations are held at the end of the Christmas and Summer half-years,—the Midsummer Examination being conducted by the Professors of Trinity College. Removes are made only after these Examinations. General Proficiency Prizes are given at Christmas and Midsummer to the Head Boy of each Form; and at Midsummer, Form Prizes for standing throughout the year. A report of the progress and general conduct of each Pupil is sent by the Head Master to parents or guardians, at the end of each half term, and at the close of each Examination.
