Promptly Paying Down the \$500 Head Tax Scarcity of That Class of Labor Be-

lieved to be the Cause—Unusual Spots on the Sun Discovered

OTTAWA, June 18th.— Chinese are coming into Canada again. Owing to a protest by labor organizations in British Columbia against competition by Chinese, an admission tax of fifty dollars was imposed on the Orientals some years ago. This was afterwards increased to a hundred dollars, and two sessions ago the tax was raised to five hundred dollars a head. For a year after this not a Chinese entered Can-ada except merchants and a few others who were exempt from the lifense charge. However, word has reached China that the opportunity to work in Canada is worth five hundred dollars, or some employers of labor on the Pa-cific coast have come to the conclusion that the service of a Chinese is worth that amount to them, for three months ago Chinese began to arrive on the Pa-tific coast and pay down the \$500 fee, which allows them to become residents of Canada. The number of these ar-rigals has been increasing and last month sixty-six of them entered and paid \$500 each, swelling the revenue of Canada by thirty-three thousand dol-lars. 

PROFESSOR DOES NOT FEAR SUN SPOTS


PITTSBURG, Pa., June 18.—Prof. John A. Brashear of Allegheny made a number of observations today of the sun spots, or solar storms, discovered yesterday by Prof. George H. Peters of the United States naval observatory at Washington, and later said that there is practically no possibility of earthly disturbances arising from the sun spots. Prof. Bashear's observa-tions were made in his private observa-tory in Allegheny. He said: "The spots are much smaller than those observed by me last February, but they are very beautiful and in-teresting. This afternoon I could see spot. The position of the spots is such that they will have no magnetic influ-ence on the earth. Electrical solar dis-turbances are always projected in

ence on the earth. Litertrical solar dis-turbances are always projected in straight lines. These spots are so low that any projections would hardly af-fect us. The spots have passed the sun's meridian about two days and should be discernible for about three days more." Prof. Brashear said the spots are so

Prof. Brashear said the spots are so large that they can be observed through smoked glass without the aid of any astronomical instrument. The size of the present group of spots, Prof. Brashear says, is about 32,000 miles long and 30,000 miles wide. The spots observed by him last February meas-ured 130,000 miles in length.
