# FIELD MARSHAL FRENCH REPORTS QUIET ON BRITISH FRONT IN WEST SINCE AUG. 18

London, Aug. 30.—A report from Field Marshal Sir John French, commander-in-chief of the British army in the field, was given out by the British War Office tonight as follows:

"Since my last communication of August 18 there has been no fighting on our front to record. There has been a certain amount of mining activity, but conditions generally have been normal.

"Both on the 18th and the 21st we succeeded in shooting down enemy aeroplanes. On the 25th our heavy artillery set fire to a railway train at Langemarck station (about five miles northeast of Ypres). On the same evening our royal flying corps co-operated with our Allies in an aerial attack on the forest of South Hurst, which was successfully carried out, without the loss of any machines."





HARCOURT

WHERE BRITISH SUBMARINE GROUNDED



The official announcement that the British submarine E-13, on its way to the Baltic, had grounded on the Danish island of Saltholm is the first authoritative indication that the British Admiralty is undertaking to reinforce the Russian fleet in the Baltic. The significance of the news lies in the fact, say navy men, that the British are attempting a passage through the waters of Elsinore Sound, and at the narrowest part of the Sound the width between the shores of Sweden and Denmark is approximately two miles. The narrowest navigable width is just above Elsinore and measures about one and two-thirds miles. It is impossible to pass through Elsinore Sound without coming within the three mile zone of either Denmark or Sweden. Special mention might be made of he violin solos. 

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
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
