HENRY MORE SMITH IN NEW YORK.
An offender who no prison can keep--The Career of Philip Winslow.
New York, June 7.

On Thursday morning Officer Jeremiah Mahoney, of the Matherly street police, arrested Philip Winslow, alias "Blindie" Winslow, alias Burke, at Hester street and Bowery. Mahoney clapped a pistol to Winslow's head, and took him to the police station. He was searched and placed in a cell. Ten minutes afterward he was taken in front of the desk and handcuffed with a pair of new patent handcuffs, after which Capt. Clinchy directed Mahoney to take him before Chief Matzell at the Police Central Office.

When Winslow was placed in the cell he had a pistol in his left breast which he searched him. This pistol he took from his sleeve and put into his breeches pocket. The officer caught him returning to the Central Office. In front of 237 Mulberry street Winslow managed to get the pistol from his pocket. Holding the pistol with one hand, he turned to the officer and with his other hand he struck the officer's forehead. He then ran through the engine house to the street. He then ran up Spring street, crossing Broadway, and ran over Green street with one hand out of his hand. He then returned to a house in Hester street, near where he was arrested in the morning, and sent for some one to help him. He then returned to this house all day, and at night was seen in South street. At 2 o'clock yesterday he was in one of the lower wards, but has not been re-arrested.

Two years ago, after serving a term in Sing Sing for burglary, Winslow returned to this city and was confined in the State of Mike Broderick. One day he knocked a man down in broad daylight in Peck slip and was arrested by Detective Finn of the Park street station. Broderick was arrested for this crime by Detective Finn of the Park street station.

One week afterwards "Blindie" was arrested by Officer Mahoney, and taken to the Oak street police station. While Serg. Christie was taking his pedigree Winslow jumped out of the window, and although he pursued, escaped. One of the Master's men arrested him. Detective Nathaniel Stillwell of Captain Caffry's command and turned over to Captain Christie, and with Broderick was sentenced to five years imprisonment in Sing Sing.

After he had been in Sing Sing one month he escaped by jumping on the roof of a down train which he had in motion. After "Blindie" had ridden twenty miles the conductor of an up train saw him and signalled the conductor of the down train to stop. At the expiration of the time he was sent to the Auburn prison, from which he escaped three weeks ago. After he had been here two days he shot a man and was arrested.
