CAR OF O-BE JOYFUL WAS SEIZED

ATTITUDE OF THE BIG FIVE Toward the Making of World Peace.

QUICK PEACE AND HARMONY AMONG ALLIES

(Special To The Record) PARIS, April 17.—(By Fred S. Ferguson.)—The attitude of the five great powers toward the peace situation appeared to be as follows:

Great Britain: Premier Lloyd George in his address to parliament yesterday, made plain that the Allies have reached a "complete understanding on the great fundamental peace questions. The British are in favor of a quick peace, as long as amicable relations are maintained among all the Allies.

United States: The German government having been notified to appear in Versailles on April 25, the treaty must be whipped into shape as speedily as possible. Always keeping in mind the terms of the armistice.

France: This country is strongly behind peace settlement as far arranged, as evidenced by the vote of confidence in the present government, passed by the chamber of Deputies yesterday, 334 to 166.

Italy: The Italian delegation apparently continues to stand by its territorial claims, based on the pact of London, reiterating its threats that it will withdraw unless awarded Fiume. In this connection the American delegates insist that all secret treaties were nullified by ratification of the armistice terms, but express belief that Italian aspirations will be settled under a rupture.

Japan—The Japanese have received no reply to their cable to Tokio asking instructions from the Japanese government, but expect to bring up their "racial equality" amendment to the league of nations covenant, at next plenary session, when the covenant will be opened debated.

Announcement of just what these new guarantees consist of is expected within a day or two, when Premier Clemenceau addresses the deputies. The "big Four" in addition to considering Belgian boundary questions, is discussing the question of mandatories under the league of nations. Both the British and French are understood to favor the designation of the United States as mandatories for Constantinople and Armenia.

that have heretofore been published in the terms of a peace treaty or the provisions of the league of nations. What those guarantees are is being kept secret but from additional information obtained to-day it would seem that some form of "Alliance" has been agreed on. Whether this takes the form of a defensive agreement under the league of nations, or whether the present association of allied powers will be continued until Germany complies with all the peace terms, could not be learned. However it was pointed out in connection with a possible defensive alliance that nothing in the league covenant prevents such an agreement.

Article X of the covenant, is intended to obviate necessity for such agreements, but if a group of nations desires a defensive alliance, in addition to the league charter, they could formulate such a treaty so long as it did not interfere with the laws of the league. It would of course have to be filed with the Secretariat of the League and be made public. Thus securing the world against "Secret Offensive Alliances."

One of the explanations advanced was that the entente treaty as it stands, being on a war basis, is unsuitable under the league of nations wherefore a new agreement, guaranteeing enforcement of the peace terms and establishing protection for France, while the league begins to function and France is recovering from the war, was found to be unobjectionable.

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U. S. Farm Hands Going Back to the Land

MANY HAD BEEN WORKING IN FACTORIES

(Special To The Record) WASHINGTON, April 17.—Farm hands who answered the warcall of the factory are migrating back to farms by hundreds of thousands, according to reports to-day to the Department of Agriculture, which showed the nation's farm labor supply was on April 2, 83 per cent, of the demand. This represents an increase over a corresponding period of 1918, when supply was 72 per cent, of the total demand.

U. S. Agriculture Department officials say the farm-labor outlook is surprisingly brightening. This is doubly welcome news in view of the forecast for the biggest wheat crop in world's history.

Time Limit for Signing Treaty May be Set

MAY 15 HAS BEEN SUGGESTED


(Special To The Record) PARIS, April 17.—(By Carl D. Gross.)—The German government may be required to sign the peace treaty by May 15, it was learned on good authority today.

There are still some differences of opinion among the peace-makers regarding the advisability of setting a time limit. But the majority appeared to believe the period between April 25, when the treaty will be submitted to the German delegates, and May 15, would be sufficient for the government to debate all the provisions and formally ratify them.

Those opposed to fixing a time limit contended the Allies possibly might not be ready to receive the delegates even by April 25, whereupon the enemy would seek to enlarge any difference in viewpoints still existing among the Allies, and which would naturally have to be discussed during the delegates' stay in Versailles. With a time limit fixed the Allies would then be required to hurry their work, resulting in some confusion and possible dissatisfaction.

Those favoring May 15 as the time for acceptance by the enemy delegates pointed out, however, that such an early curfew was established for the negotiations to the German government was apparently forwarded before all the belligerents had an opportunity to sign it. It is understood to have been taken by courier to Spa on Tuesday, at which time only the five great powers had signed the text. The 18 smaller belligerents were called in yesterday and the document read to them by Premier Clemenceau, after which their approval was asked. No objection was offered and the additional signatures were sent to Spa on Tuesday.

The meeting took place in Foreign Minister Pichon's office, at the Quai d'Orsay. It was purely formal but necessary, as there were 23 nations at war with Germany instead of the 22 smaller nations, it was believed was hurried to Spa in the wake of the first message.

Walter Snider's Deed Is Bearing Fruit

Bill Passed Regarding Private Forest Reserves

WILL ENCOURAGE CONSERVATION AND REFORESTATION.

(Special To The Record) TORONTO, April 17.—During the morning session there was introduced a bill unique in its provisions, establishing a system of private forest reserves and has as its basic provision that where forest land has been designated as a private reserve, no trees on this land may be cut or removed without the consent of the Minister of Lands, Forests and Mines.

The Premier in introducing the measure pointed out that it would contribute very materially to the beautification of the province, by giving an impetus to reforestation and by protecting existing forests. He then added that the particular case in mind when the bill was drafted was the woodland set aside as reserve in Waterloo County by Mr. Walter Snider.

Mr. Wm. Proudfoot, leader of the Opposition, heartily agreed with the Premier, declaring he considered it a form of advanced legislation. The bill consequently passed through the house, without opposition of any kind for its first, second and third readings and will become law at the conclusion of the session.

Owing to the sustained criticism levelled at one of the provisions of the bill to provide for the establishment of the office of Public Trustee, which specified the kind of securities in which this office could invest trust money, Hon. I. B. Lucas, Attorney-General withdrew the clause. In its stead a provision was inserted which limited the nature of securities in which such money could be invested to those issued by the Ontario or Dominion governments.

OUTLINE OF WHAT SHE WILL ASK

PARIS, April 17.—Germany intends to claim indemnity from the Allies, according to the Frankfurt Gazette. It says German negotiators at Versailles will ask payment for damages sustained from aerial attacks, from occupation of German territory by allied troops and for the delay in concluding peace, containing gift of bonds from Canadian people. GEORGE AND NORTHCLIFFE ARE AT LOGGERHEADS

Two Former Friends Have Disagreed on Public Policy.

MAY MEAN DOWNFALL OF LLOYD GEORGE'S MINISTRY

(Special To The Record) NEW YORK, April 17, (By J. W. T. Mason).—Premier Lloyd George's attack on Lord Northcliffe in house of commons means that the two strongest men in Great Britain, after having helped win the war together, have changed sides on the policy of postwar reconstruction. The fight between them is due primarily to Lord Northcliffe's belief that Lloyd George is clinging to the Tory reactionaries for support in parliament and is not working for the interest of the laboring classes. Before the war, Lord Northcliffe was a Conservative and Lloyd George was a Radical. Lloyd George now, however is head of a ministry which is ostensibly a coalition cabinet, but in reality owes its life to the support of the Conservatives.

Lord Northcliffe on the other hand believes the British government should adopt progressive policies which are distasteful to the reactionaries. Lloyd George has shown no inclination to follow Lord Northcliffe's suggestions in the matter.

The difference of viewpoint between them on the kind of ministry necessary to carry out reconstruction reforms has led to an estrangement which now includes numerous other differences as well.

The probable downfall of the Lloyd George ministry, soon after the peace treaty is signed, is foreshadowed by the open break between the Premier and Lord Northcliffe. The opinion of the country has apparently been rightly sense by Lord Northcliffe, for two recent by-elections in England have administered heavy defeats to coalition candidates. Owing to Lloyd George's violent attack upon Lord Northcliffe, a change in the premier-ship will be attributed to Lord Northcliffe's influence. Lord Northcliffe is apparently thus destined to come once more, into the title of England's modern Warwick.

BELIEVED WOMAN HELPED McCULLOUGH TO ESCAPE

No Trace of Him Since He Broke Jail.

WILL NEVER BE TAKEN ALIVE, SAYS LAWYER.

(Special To The Record) TORONTO, April 17.—A woman, it is believed, was probably the accomplice who aided Frank McCullough in his escape from the death cell in the Toronto jail, the first escape of his kind in Dominion police annals.

It is alleged that this woman came to Toronto from the United States, on hearing of McCullough's death sentence and by means, which are yet uncertain, was able to send letters and even parcels to McCullough at the jail. These letters and parcels, the latter often the size of a small box of chocolates, reached McCullough in his cell.

According to Inspector Dunlop, the guards were chosen by the Sheriff's office irrespective of local police authorities, and when a prisoner is taken to the jail and placed in the death cell, he then remains under the jurisdiction of the Sheriff's department. The guards were chosen on recommendations from various cabinet ministers and war veteran associations.

Mr. Dunlop stated today that in view of the comment on the inadequacy of the staff at the jail, an investigation by Sheriff Movat and himself will probably be held either on Saturday or Tuesday next and a report given to the public.

The war-service buttons which McCullough returned to Guard Curroll were enclosed in envelope postmarked Toronto April 16, but the time of posting it was rather vague, it appearing 6 p.m., which points to it having been posted late last night. One of the guards now reports that McCullough was writing letters in his cell for the greater part of Tuesday evening prior to his escape. The buttons were taken to the Toronto jail by Mrs. Curroll, and are now in hands of Turnley Adey, to be turned over to the police. Curroll's cap and coat, both civilian apparel, are still out of sight.

Mystery surrounds McCullough's moves since getting out. One deduction is that he was able to catch the Grand Trunk Montreal train, which left the Union station about eleven o'clock on the night he escaped.

His financial assistance is also baffling. Investigation in Youngstown, Ohio, shows that his people are of ordinary means, the father of the family being a laboring man, and that it would be most improbable for any financial aid coming from that quarter.

T. C. Robinette, K. C., who defended McCullough during his trial, today received a letter from the Dominion parole department at Ottawa, whom he has petitioned for a repeal of sentence. The letter dated April 14th is signed by W. P. Archibald, on behalf of the Dominion authorities and states everything possible is being done in the interests of Frank McCullough and that the matter is at present under consideration by Mr. J. D. Clarke.

Mr. Robinette told today that he was of the opinion that the matter would probably be heard by the cabinet to-day and that he was hopeful of the sentence being changed to life imprisonment. "He will never be taken alive," Mr. Robinette told the reporter.

MORE CANADIANS ON WAY HOME

OTTAWA, April 17.—The transport Araguaia, carrying 794 sick and wounded Canadians and seven nursing sisters, due at Portland, Maine, about April 23. The soldiers include 254 for Toronto district, 88 for Kingston and 53 for London. The transport Corsican, with 384 Canadians and number of dependents is due at St. John about April 24.

NO HOPE FOR HOP OFF ENTERTAINED AT ST. JOHNS

BOTH RIVAL CONTENTS ARE READY

(Special To The Record) ST. JOHNS, Nfld., April 17.—Hope that either Pilot Harry Hawker or Captain F. E. Raynham would make their many times postponed "Hop Off" in the trans-Atlantic plane flight for the \$50,000 London Daily Mail prize, was dissipated today by reports of unsettled weather all across the ocean.

Indications this morning were that the flight would not be attempted within the next twenty-four hours, "We are not downhearted," declared Captain Fenn of the Sopwith airplane to-day, when questioned regarding the flight. Pilot Hawker and Lieutenant MacKenzie Grieve, his navigator, were confident and eager to be off but they would not discuss their hopes or plans.

A Big "Find" Made Last Night

Shipment of Liquor Now Rests in the City Hall.

There were tears and lamentations took place in the city hall, was occasioned by the removal of a big shipment of liquor from the G.T.R. siding on Turk Street to the city hall, where it will be in state pending its permanent interment with the Department at Toronto. The director was Chief O'Neill assisted by the whole staff of the police department and several other helpers.

As a result of the activity of the police over \$10,000 worth of liquor is temporarily stored in the City Hall. No wonder there were smiles and cheering countenances at the counters and desks in the municipal quarters. With the fragrance there was permeating the atmosphere from bottom to the top it can be understood why everybody was happy.

How did all happen? It was shortly before midnight that Chief O'Neill had an idea that there would be something doing in the G.T.R. yards. The car had been located somewhere in the yards. Les the precious liquid flow away a complete guard was put on the job. At five o'clock this morning a big truck was commissioned and the efforts began to put the contents into a place considered safer and a better storage place. This truck was hitched to the car and the truck pulled the freighter over the siding to Turk street. Here the real operations commenced. Barrel after barrel, "dry goods" cases of every shape and description, all minus the name of the consignee, were pulled out onto the truck. Five times did the truck make a trip to the City Hall. From five o'clock to 10:30 the staff of the city officers of the law, including the day men who came on at eight o'clock, and several truck men in an noticeable way earn their money by the sweat of their brow. Express Tie-up Mooted Next Week on Railways

MINISTER OF LABOR GO TO MONTREAL TO CON-CILIATE

(Special To The Record) TORONTO, April 17.—Hon. G. D. Robertson, Minister of Labor, left for Montreal last night to endeavor to settle the Canadian Express strike. Deputy Minister of Labor, F. A. Ackland, left Ottawa for Toronto to try and settle the impending dispute between the Canadian National Express employees and the government administration. This is the information contained in official telegrams received to-day by the Toronto strikers, and also that preparations have been made for a general tie-up next week.

General President, A. R. Mosher, head of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, to which the strikers of the Canadian express men belong, wired: "Evidently the pressure being applied has had desired effect. Situation excellent here. Instructed all Canadian National divisions to prepare for immediate action. First of next week will see grand tie-up, if no settlement." This wire came from Halifax.

General Chairman Alf. Se'cleary, from the headquarters of the strikers at Montreal, sent the following message: "Montreal is absolutely firm, likewise all points here from to-day. Montreal Trades Council meeting tomorrow night. Expect strong action in our favor. Advise men to stand firm. We have no doubt here of final victory. Steps for general strike have been taken." The strikers at their meeting to-day cheered the messages from their chief officials. The Toronto Trades and Labor council meets to-night and the strike of the expressmen will be considered by the delegates, as President O'Leary and Secretary Hevey have promised the strikers the support of the council.

Merchants Decide on Afternoon Holiday

Majority Will Close Wednesday Afternoons, June 1st. at Oct. 1st.

At a meeting a petition representing the majority of the merchants agreeing to close their stores every Wednesday afternoon at one o'clock from June 1st, Oct. 1st, was considered and adopted. It was felt that as nearly all factories close Saturday afternoon allowing their employees a half holiday it would be only just as fair that clerks and others engaged in stores should also enjoy the same privilege. Notices announcing the close will be given in due time.

Parliamentary Triumph For Lloyd George

SAY THE LONDON PRESS.

LONDON, April 17.—While opinions are divided regarding the substance of the address delivered by Lloyd George before the house of commons, there is general agreement by the London press that it was a great parliamentary triumph. With the exception of the Laborites and Northcliffe newspapers, none of the morning journals condemn the Premier's statement wholly, while several warmly applaud it. They admit that Mr. Lloyd George revealed nothing of the peace terms, but they do not complain. The London Telegraph, for instance, says, his general account of the terms will "give deep satisfaction" and adds that he "demolished the whole structure his critics built on his supposed departure from his pre-election pledges."

Interesting News About California

Dr. Weidenhammer and Party Return.

Dr. F. J. Weidenhammer, Mrs. Weidenhammer and daughter and Miss Carrie Conrad returned home last night after a sojourn of three months in California and other points of interest. The return journey was made via Vancouver and the Canadian Northwest and the entire trip was a beneficial one in every respect the doctor and party being much benefited.

In conversation with the doctor this morning he said much could be written about the wonders of California. Anyone who visits Southern California for the first time, is struck with the entire change in the vegetation, which is sub-tropical, and thus differs markedly from anything that one is accustomed to seeing in Ontario or any of the Northern provinces. The climate too is decidedly different from that of Canada. The bright sunshine and the genial warmth at once make one feel that one has shifted considerably southward. The nights however, are also justly cool and the contrast is felt as soon as the sun sinks behind the horizon.

The mountains are everywhere visibly near and when it rains down in the foothills and valleys they are covered with snow. This is a curious sight as it seems strange to see snow in the mountains just a few miles above the foothills among which are situated the most beautiful citrus groves of that country.

One is further struck with a certain artificiality which however is not objectionable as it is simply wonderful what the hand of man has wrought in that once barren country. The high altitude and dryness of the soil was very unfavorable to growth of vegetation and as rainfall is very scant the country is barren unless relieved by irrigation.

Southern California possesses the most efficient system of irrigation to be found anywhere in the world and the land originally barren is there-by turned into a veritable garden. Evidence of this fact are the beautiful citrus groves where are grown the finest oranges, lemons and peaches (or breadfruit). These are the admiration of every tourist from a northern climate.

One of the first pleasing events of the tourist is to get out among these beautiful groves and pick the ripe fruit from the trees. There is no finer spectacle than the miles upon miles of orange groves along either side of the most perfectly paved highways for which Southern California is noted. It is indeed the autoists paradise, for the bright sunny winter days of the south and are so attractive that one does not desire to stay indoors. There is no better way of seeing this beautiful country than by auto. We were fortunate in possessing one, and made good use of it indeed. We motored to every nook and corner of Southern Cal. and saw what there was to see. Perhaps the most beautiful auto trip is that along the Ocean highway to San Diego. Here one finds the ocean on one side, and the mountains studded with the richest profusion of varied colored wild flowers—such as the cactus, poppy wild geranium, peony etc. Nor is it alone the wild flowers that attract one's attention. All along the country highways have been beautified with trellises of roses at both sides of the road, and the fronts of the groves are decorated everywhere with all kinds of beautiful flowers and vines. These grow all the year round and so one is never at a loss to find flowers for a bouquet.

This has been a lively winter for tourists in California. There were more Canadians registered among this number than usual. At the Santa Monica and Long Beach pinnacles for Canadians there were over ten thousand present from all parts of Canada, a very large number of these being from Ontario. The cities of Los Angeles and Long Beach were simply filled with tourists being very centrally placed these two cities are especially favored, perhaps also because of the many attractions they offer to them. Of these I shall write more later on.

At the present time too the returned soldier was everywhere in evidence and was feted by the different organizations in every city. Wentwood quite a large number of Canadian boys among the number. They too were made right royally welcome, especially by the Canadian authorities at Santa Monica and Long Beach. 

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PART TIME EDUCATION FOR ONTARIO

Addressing the legislature on Tuesday, the Minister of Education explained the main principles of his Adolescent School Bill, which proposes to extend the school age of boys and girls in Ontario from 14 to 18 years and require that from the age of 14 to 16 they must attend school at least 400 hours per year and from 16 to 18, 320 hours per year. The measure will be known as the part-time education law. The present School Act provides for compulsory education up to the age of 14 years. Circumstances ever which many parents have no control now oblige them to send their children to work as soon as the law permits. Secondary education is provided but as a rule only a minority of parents are seemingly able to avail themselves of it. They are 327,814 pupils in the Public and Separate Schools of Ontario. In the High Schools there are only 29,000 in attendance. This is to say that only 5 per cent. are able to avail themselves of secondary education.

Were every parent in Ontario able to send his children to high school or college, there would not be sufficient schools to accommodate them nor would the courses now provided equip them for their life's work in shop, factory and farm. That the 14-year limit of compulsory education is too low has long been apparent but educational equipment has only been provided in the primary schools for school population embracing the ages up to fourteen. Education facilities are a matter of development. Our daddies, as a rule, considered a knowledge of the Three R's ample for boys and girls who were to learn a trade, become a shopkeeper or a farmer. The apprentice system was then in vogue and machinery did not play such an important part in the industry. Technical education was practically unknown. Then the securing of bread and butter was the paramount issue. The province was poor and manufacturing in its infancy. Only he who had entered one of the professions wore a boiled shirt. Ontario has gone far since then. Skilled trades abound and are in many instances better remunerated than the professions.

The human curve is ever upward. It is realized to-day as never before that technical or occupational education is necessary not only for itself but for industry if it is to remain in the front rank and overcome foreign competition. This has led progressive nations to take stock of their educational systems and seek to better them.

In introducing his bill, the Minister of Education quoted the United States Bureau of Labor as showing that 90 per cent. of the persons who left school at 14 years of age or under, were in industries where the wages of grown men were not more than \$10 per week. These men had when boys taken the first jobs offered, probably remained a year or two and then taken others, becoming Jacks of All Trades and Masters of None. It is clear that when they reached maturity they felt themselves too old to learn a trade. Consequently, their smattering of knowledge of any one did not fit them to command mechanics' wages. It is the fact that boys of 14 years are not capable of choosing their life occupations. They are in the formative stage, with their proclivities undeveloped. That which they are best adapted to do can only be ascertained after tests and sittings in an occupational school.

The Record would have been pleased had the province proposed that full time education should be given to boys and girls until they reach 16 and part time until the age of 18 years. But to immediately put this into force would presently be impossible. The necessary occupational schools are not in existence. To order that every boy and girl of 14 years, leave the positions they are filling and put in two years more at school would be impractical and presently impossible.

We ought to view this part-time education measure as a bridge which will enable the youth of Ontario to cross from Three R's to Occupational Training. Before it can be used, occupational schools will require to be established in such centers as our own. After this is done, and the provision made, the boys and girls of 14 to 16 now employed, will be required to attend at least 400 hours per year. This much will be compulsory but all may attend more hours per day, by arrangement with their employers. The 400 hours a year is the minimum.

Once an occupational school is obtained and its benefits are patent to parents, they will pinch themselves in order to let Freddy and Katie attend it until the age of 16. The heads of industrial establishments are just as keen to see technical education introduced as are the parents themselves. Efficiency, and its resultant, Production, is nowadays the big factor.

Those parents who are not in a position where they could afford to send their children for full time would make it as much as possible. Having part time education continue until the age of 18, will undoubtedly benefit those receiving such instruction.

In education as in house building, the foundation must be laid before the roof can be put on. The next generation will probably attend school until the age of 10 years. But it will only be practical to make it compulsory for those who have reached 14, to attend occupational schools part time. Such schools, it should not be overlooked, are not yet in existence, nor trained teachers to conduct them.

A gratifying feature of the proposal is that it gives recognition to the importance occupational education can be made to play in the life and progress of 95 per cent. of the young boys and girls of Ontario.

A PROVINCIAL MINISTER OF LABOR

Having established a Provincial Department of Labor, it is announced that it will later be headed by a representative of Labor, who possesses the confidence of the workmen of Ontario. The members of the legislature were a unit in endorsing this proposal. They recognize the importance in the scheme of things of those who constitute the working forces of the province and the advisability of giving them representation in the cabinet.

Being on the inside and assisting in the framing of general legislation, as well as protecting the interests those the Minister of Labor will the more particularly represent, will tend to remove numerous misunderstandings.

To be truly democratic, the government should contain representatives of all classes in the province.

Each should have its spokesman, to protect its interests and to promote its welfare.

The proposed step will further dignify Labor. The placing on its representative's shoulders the task of assisting in directing the trend of public affairs will be beneficial. We are all "Joe's Thompson's bairns" and the guiding principle should be the greatest good for the greatest number. Progress in government is said to depend upon the spirit of give and take or on honorable compromises. Reforms are of slow growth, largely because they require the force of public acceptance behind them.

Power to appoint a Minister of Labor has been sought and will be granted. As soon organization of the department can be made, the portfolio will be filled.

THREE QUERIES ANSWERED

A reader put three questions: (1) What sum is Canada to expend this year on its returned soldiers; (2) What amount will it take to finish its war work; and (3) What will the Dominion's war debt be when all is over?

Answering the first question: The Minister of Finance has placed \$77,763,420 in the estimates of the fiscal year, beginning April 1st, 1919. There is to be \$30,000,000 provided for pensions; \$25,000,000 for the settlement of soldiers who desire to go upon the land; and \$22,763,420 for soldiers' establishment, including vocational training. The whole of the \$77,763,420 is to be raised by taxation.

To finish the work, including maintenance and demobilization, calls for approximately \$300,000,000. This sum will be required to be raised by way of a popular loan in Canada or secured from investors in the United States.

Only an estimate can be given of what the Dominion's national debt will be when the last soldier is mustered out. It is presently placed at \$1,500,000,000. With \$300,000,000 required during the fiscal year, the country's debt will ultimately reach \$2,000,000,000. Whether the Dominion will be awarded the whole or any considerable proportion of its war outlay, by the Peace Conference, remains to be seen.

BY THE WAY

There is still corn in Egypt.

The Rockefeller Foundation will appropriate \$500,000 to promote fundamental research in physics and chemistry.

At a recent meeting held in Pittsburg, representatives of 98 per cent. of the nut, bolt, and rivet manufacturers of the United States and Canada agreed to a reduction of from 20 per cent. to 40 per cent. in the prices of their products without reducing wages. The schedule will be submitted to the Industrial Board of the Department of Commerce for ratification.

In connection with the establishment of the billion dollar credit to be loaned to United States orders through the War Finance Corporation, a precedent is found in the policy of Japan which was adopted in 1911. The Japanese Government borrowed millions in the United States at 9 per cent. and then loaned the money at 4 1/2 per cent. to manufacturers in Japan, principally those engaged in the textile industry, so that they would be able to enlarge and speed up their factories, having in mind particularly the exportation of their commodities to China.

The Canadian Trade Commissioner at Yokohama reports that it has now been decided to build aeroplane plants in Japan, and that 600 will be constructed this year. The engines will be imported, but the casings will be constructed entirely in Japan. The Commissioner adds: "This will mean a new market for Canadian aeroplane spruce and also for the many materials and parts necessary for aeroplane construction, such as wire, screws, bolts, nails, forgings, stampings, turn-buckles, varnish, aluminum, rubber and 'dope,' etc."

The latest issue of The Weekly Bulletin of the Department of Trade and Commerce contains inquiries from firms in Japan for quotations on aeroplane spruce and aeroplane accessories. The Trade Commissioner warns that, as the authorities intend to begin their aviation campaign at once, Canadian exporters should lose no time in answering these inquiries.

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

Settlement Scheme of Bruce County Passed

PLAN STARTED BY BRUCE COUNTY IS MUCH FAVORED
Toronto April 16—A bill introduced by the Government in the Legislature to-day authorizes corporations of communities of counties to enter agreements for the settlement of returned soldiers and seamen upon lands in the North.

While the Bill is a general one, its introduction is largely due to the initiative of the Bruce County Preparedness League which had for some time been at work upon a comprehensive scheme to settle Bruce soldiers as a colony in the Northern townships. The prime minister paid a tribute to the pioneer work done by the County of Bruce. It had given the lead to others and men from Bruce were particularly well fitted for settlement work in the North.

The bill, said Sir William would give the County Council power to appoint a committee that would have legal power to enter into the necessary agreements.

Mr. Proudfoot, the Opposition leader, commended Bruce County for its enterprise and hoped that other counties would follow suit. When the bill was in committee, Mr. Proudfoot suggested an amendment to allow the county committee to use more than \$20,000 in working out its scheme and this was approved.

The two Bruce members, William McDonald of North Bruce and W. D. McGill of South Bruce both spoke in support of the bill, explaining the scheme more fully to the members.

The bill was given third reading.

Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee in the last senate, is to speak in Boston tonight under the auspices of the League to Enforce Peace.

Union Party's Future Depends on Tariff

ITS PERMANENCE AS POLITICAL UNIT WILL DEPEND ON PROBLEM OF CUSTOMS TAXATION

OTTAWA, April 16.—Parliament, or at least the more active end of it, finished up to-night for the time being and went home for Easter. The Senate already is enjoying a repose. The Commons will resume next Tuesday and the Upper House a week later.

The session has been under way since the 20th of February, but the measure of its accomplishments cannot be classed as considerable.

There has been a wealth of talk and a great many indications of marking time. Many matters of relative unimportance have consumed days, but of driving force there has been none.

Several bills have been passed, but not outside of the health department measure has any outstanding significance. The others mainly have been amendments to existing statutes or something of that class.

Much Legislation
Considerable constructive legislation has been brought down, but most of it is in the preliminary state. Those questions which are vital and controversial have yet to be introduced and, for the matter, decided by the Cabinet by itself or jointly with caucus.

The obvious intention is to await the home coming of the prime minister. He is the head of the Government and primarily responsible for

its policy. So the ministers who are here are not desirous of finally committing themselves or the premier while he is absent.

The session so far has had some flashes of interest and some rather enlivened episodes, but on the whole it has been very quiet and, at times, listless.

The operating causes are plain. Just as proceedings were to start, Sir Wilfrid Laurier died. Even with him the Opposition forces were weak numerically, but his leadership and strategy went far to compensate for this shortcoming.

Only Temporary
The present leadership is only temporary and till the national convention meets and selects a chief and adopts a policy, little, it seems, is to be gained by attempting to force matters.

On the other side a somewhat similar condition awaits the return of Sir Robert Borden before there can be developments. He has to be consulted on many matters, particularly upon the tariff and the Franchise Act. They present the difficult problems that arise always when there are divided opinions. All the ministers do not see alike on either question and the following is in the same position.

The angle of view of many Western Unionists is very dissimilar to that of the Eastern members of the party, both upon the tariff and the franchise. The Western men want something "substantial" this year and better things in the future. Many of them, but not all, want further a material modification in the franchise in relation to the disfranchisement of naturalized aliens and also in regard

to the methods of preparing the lists. The Eastern Unionists, while not wedded particularly to the tariff in its present form, hold to the idea that this is not an opportune time for extensive changes. As to the franchise, such as are particularly interested in it would perpetuate, in the main, the existing provisions. Sir Robert will be the arbiter on all these controversial questions and some others that are in the offing.

Less Talk of Permanency
The future of Unionism is much discussed and the pendulum seems to swing back and forth. A few weeks ago the talk of forming a permanent party was strong. Latterly there has been less of it. The advocates of the system rather expect that when Sir Robert comes home he will infuse some new life into the idea and that it will emerge from the present uncertain form. The ultimate result will depend essentially upon the measure of success in working out a policy in relation to the tariff, which may compromise or reconcile the existing divergence of view.

It is conceded that much time has been lost so far this session largely because of the desire to give the private members a show. They have now had their innings and after Easter Government business will have precedence. The Government has had smooth sailing all along and its strength has not been lessened, though certain of its tactics have invited a measure of criticism from the following.

Prospects In The Toy Industry

As Reviewed From American Standpoint.

Chicago, April 9.—Toy manufac-
turers of America who found their
opportunity when war shut off im-
ports, believe they are now suffi-
ciently entrenched to retain the busi-
ness thus gained. They even expect
to do some exporting when shipping
facilities are available.

The toy makers are holding a fair
here, with Christmas goods spread
over several floors of a big down-
town hotel. It was said that scores
of buyers who recently made the
usual annual pilgrimage to the French
and English fairs, with a look into the
general European market, returned
virtually empty-handed, more than ever
convinced of the economy and efficiency
of the American market.

To compete with the cheap labor
of Europe and Japan, Americans
have had to offer inducements other
than price, such as ingenious me-
chanisms, durability and education-
al value.

The Japanese can undersell them
in the market for the Christmas tree, but
the Americans have perfected tin-
sel, wreaths, and colored globes that
they expect to hold the market be-
cause they are practically indestruc-
tible and are fire-proof.

In the higher priced mechanical
toys America always led, and
has even been an exporter. This
trade of course will remain, dealers
say.

Immense quantities of dolls, farm-
erly came from Germany, and
bisque heads are still imported from
France, but to all intents and pur-
poses America is now manufacturing
dolls, the traders averred.

"The Germans used to dress their
dolls in their own conception of the
styles of the countries to which they
were to be exported," said the de-
aler. "The result was often funny.
Since America entered the doll busi-
ness the play-babies have been gowned
in faithful reproductions of what
we have seen on Fifth avenue."

Airplanes and tank figure largely
in the novelties. One of the toy
planes is said to fly 200 yards under
its own power derived from a spring.
Another is fitted with an electric
motor which, attached to a light-
socket by a wire, will float about the
room for hours. Some of the toy
tanks, too, are very practical elimi-
nators of obstacles. Another novelty is
a ferryboat on wheels. When the boat
butts it sprang against a wall a mechan-
ism turns it about for the return trip.
For the girls there is a doll that
walks and talks.

The Committee of Union and Progress, a Young Turk organization, which was driven from power in Constantinople, as the result of the Allied victory, is reported to be secretly conducting an energetic reorganizing movement.

SITUATION IS CAUSING GRAVE ANXIETY.

LONDON, April 17.—It is learned here that that situation in Turkey is causing grave anxiety. Internal disorder is rife, according to reports from Rear-Admiral Webb, at Constantinople. It is feared there will shortly be outbreaks and massacres of the Armenian population on a large scale.

Reduction in Number of Judges is Favored

County Council Goes on Record.

The County Council at the morning session unanimously passed the following resolution:

MOVED BY DR. A. OCHS, SECONDED BY F. DEBUS.

1. THAT this Council of Waterloo County place on record its full approval of the action of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, at its present session in the discontinuation of appointments to the office of Junior Judge in this Province, which is fully in accord with a petition from this County Council, passed at its June Session of last year, and which was supported by various other Municipal bodies throughout Ontario.

2. THAT it is the opinion of this Council that the Provincial Government will be highly commended through out the Province for this move in the direction of reducing the cost of ad-

administration of Justice.

3. THAT it is further the opinion of this Council that the Provincial Government would be warranted in proceeding further with such legislation, and to the extent, at least, of cancelling the appointment of such Junior Judges throughout the Province as are now unnecessarily holding such positions.

4. THAT inasmuch as the office of Senior Judge of this County is now vacant through the lamented death of the late Judge Renne, that this Council heartily approves of the action of the Warden in his opposition to the appointment of a second Judge for this County, and hereby petitions the Provincial and Dominion Departments of Justice to see that no more than one Judge is appointed for this County.


5. THAT copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Premier and Attorney General of Ontario; the Premier and Minister of Justice of Canada; and to the representatives of North and South Waterloo, in the Legislature and House of Commons; also to the Clerks of the Cities of Kitchener and Galt, with the request that the Councils of both cities pass similar resolutions so as to offset the possibility of the appointment of two Judges for this County.

RICH SANDS OF ALBERTA

Very Remote but Large Supplies of Asphalt Materials

The Mellon Institute of Industrial Research at Pittsburgh, Pa., investigated the possibilities of using the asphaltic sands of Alberta for commercial purposes. Since the first explorer descended the Athabaska River, upwards of one hundred and fifty years ago, the existence, in the northern part of the Province of Alberta, of deposits of asphaltic or bituminous sand has been recognized. said the Canadian Chemical Journal. This material consists of approximately 15 per cent. of high grade bitumen and 85 per cent. of silicious sand. That the deposits were of large extent was evident, but until after 1900 little was definitely known regarding their true economic importance.

For many years, the remote geographical position of the deposits, as well as lack of transportation facilities, effectually prohibited any attempt at actual development. Smart from widely scattered fur trading posts, there was an entire absence of settlements throughout great tracts of Northwestern Canada. Methods of transportation were of the most primitive sort—dogs and toboggans in winter, snow and canoes in summer. Gradually, however, with the opening up of the country, conditions have changed. New railways and highways have been built and settlements have come into existence.

The old historic fur-trading post of Fort McMurray, three hundred miles to the north of the city Edmonton, stands near the southern border of the bituminous sand area. Three outstanding features presented by a consideration of these deposits may be given: (1) They represent the largest known deposits of solid asphaltic materials; (2) The deposits are undeviated; (3) All asphalt used in Canada is imported from foreign countries. The areal extent of the deposits is probably not less than one thousand square miles and the average thickness is upwards of 100 feet.

MUCH WAYSIDE FOOD
 Nettle is Useful and Dandelion Much More So

Not every green thing good to eat grows in a market-garden. To the initiated the field and hedgeside are always sufficient for a limited salad at least. The most wholesome and deliciously flavoured of these wild salad ingredients is the dandelion, that despised "weed" which we grab out of our lawns with such savage delight. A dandelion diet would be a little monotonous, but the young and tender shoots, either boiled as greens, or used with other things as a salad, are tip-top stuff.

Few farmers would object to anyone armed with a sharp knife, and to slice of the dandelion tops, surveying his fields for a salad, and the result would be a basketful of tender greens, superior to those you buy at the shop. Next to the dandelion comes the nettle. Catch your nettle young, and it beats spinach all to nothing. The old and mature nettle, which flaunts itself in such quantities in hedgerows, is no use for a salad, or for a boiled green, either. But in Lancashire, England, tens of thousands of gallons of nettle beer are made.


FEED FOR DAIRY COW
 Should Store Flesh on the Animal by Right Care

The milk produced by a dairy cow of proper type is in proportion to feeds consumed plus the reserve of food stored in the body as fat and flesh. As an example of the latter it has been shown that fresh cows may be fed on a maintenance ration or even starved for several days yet produce milk in fairly large quantities with, however, a proportional decrease of weight and flesh. Again it has been proven that cows of proper type having a store of flesh before calving will not only milk more heavily but also more persistently during the succeeding milking period. It is clear, therefore, that this supply of fat and flesh stored on the dry cow of dairy type will be drawn upon when most needed and be either given off as milk or so take the place of feeds consumed in supplying bodily needs that a larger proportion of these feeds may be utilized for milk production.

Ships Made of Stone
 Concrete holds its own in the construction of our homes, our public buildings, our bridges, our monuments and even in our ships. Harbored safely in Norwegian waters is an enormous thousand-ton barge, built entirely of concrete; a 70-year-old skiff of stone floats merrily on the waters of the River Seine, while a concrete barge is daily towed up and down a certain portion of the River Thames.


