ACRIMONIOUS CORRESPONDENCE An acrimonious correspondence bebetween A. J. Balfour and Gen. Buller has been published. Mr. Balfour contends that Gen. Buller was in chief command at the battle of Spion Kop, while Gen. Buller denies this assertion. To his contention Mr. Balfour adds: There is no reason why all the Spion Kop dispatches should not be publish-

THE IRISH LAND BILL. Chief Secretary for Ireland George Wyndham introduced the Irish Land Bill in the House of Commons. Mr. Wyndham said the object of the bill The government could not ignore the tives of employers and employes. owing to the unwillingness of the land- picion of complicity in the abduction owners to sell.

ITS PROVISIONS.

The main provision of the bill authorizes the land commission to take over the whole or any part of an estate whose owner is willing to sell. The commissioner will then resell it to the tenants, but the assent of threequarters of the number of tenants is necessary before the commission will undertake to transfer any part of an estate. The landlord himself may repurchase part of his estate, not to exceed one-fifth of the total area, from the commission, thus becoming a tenant-purchaser, in case he desires to continue to reside on the estate. The bill does not provide for compulsory purchase. All the transfer arrangements are in the hands of the commission and are simplified as much as possible.

The bill provides that cash, not exceeding £3,000,000, to be outstanding at any one time, may be advanced to the commission by the exchequer, thus enabling purchases to be made on a vastly larger scale than ever before.

IRISH DON'T ENTHUSE. The Irish members evinced little enthusiasm over the bill. John Redmond, the Nationalist leader in the house, said he purposed to reserve his judgment until he had studied the provisions of the bill carefully. He warned the government that universal compulsory purchase must be the ultimate solution of the problem, as nothing else would be

acceptable. Timothy M. Healy (Nationalist) said he believed the bill would do something towards settling the question,

The Mutual Life SIR RICHARD MAKES REPLY.

Answers Mr. Bell's Charges Regarding Misquotations.

Veteran Statesman Produces Statistical Year Book for 1889 to Verify Statements.

Ottawa, March 25 .- All hope of concluding the budget debate before the Easter vacation has been abandoned, and the debate is approaching the stage when the average attendance of members barely exceeds the quorum. At the opening of the house Sir Richard Cartwright made a spirited reply to some charges made by Mr. Bell, that he had misquoted from a public document. The speakers on the budget were Messrs. T. O. Davis, A. E. Kemp, R. F. Sutherland (Essex), Edward Hackett and Henri Bourassa. Mr.

Bourassa adjourned the debate. SIR RICHARD CARTWRIGHT. On the opening of the house Sir Richard Cartwright rose to make a personal explanation in reference to a charge made by Mr. A. C. Bell that he had misquoted the Stafistical Year Book. He said: I did not expose the matter yesterday afternoon, because I wanted to see how far stupidity and party spite would drive these gen-tlemen, and I also wanted to see that they should be so committed that there could be no possible quibbling, and no possible wriggling out of the position in which they placed themselves. I will proceed briefly to give the house the au-thority on which I made the state-ments with respect to what appears in the Statistical Year Book for the year 1889. The house will recollect that I have used certain estimates of the population of Canada in the course of my remarks on the budget, and I stated that those had been derived from the Statistical Year Book of the year 1889. The house will also recollect that yesterday it was stated in this house that these figures were not to be found in the Statistical Year Book, that other figures were given, and a wrong deduction was made thererom. Sir, I have here the Statistical Year Book for 1889. On page 116 of this valuable and veracious document will be found the following statement: "In the fiscal year ending the 30th of June, 1887, the estimated population of Canada is given at 4,875,005 souls." Immediately thereafter, for the fiscal year 1888, the population is given at 4,972,-101, and for 1889 the population is give at 5,075,555. Sir, that is enough in itself, but there is more also. I stated, besides, that these honorable gentlemen, at least the predecessors of these honorable gentlemen, had carried out the calculation, at any rate as regards one year, and that they had produced the result of showing that in 1890 or thereabout the population estimated by them for Canada would exceed 5,200,000. I have here the trade and navigation tables for the Dominion of Canada for the year 1890, countersigned by Sir Mackenzie Bowell, then minister of customs, under date of Dec. 29, 1890. In it the total duty collected for customs is put down at \$24,014,908. On the opposite page you will find the amount of customs duties paid per head of the population put down at \$4 60. You will further find at the bottom of the page this statement: "The calculations in this column are based on the estimated population of the minion in each year, as published by the department of agriculture, and statistics in the Statistical Year Book. 

CANDIDATE FOR

Rev. Dr. Johnston Says He Has Not Been Asked to Run.

Prohibitionists Would Prefer to Have Old Party Candidate Indorse Their Views.

that a petition is in circulation asking Rev. Dr. Johnston, pastor of St. Andrew's Church, to be a candidate for the prohibition party of this city at the provincial elections. Dr. Johnston was asked if this was true, and said he was sure that it was not. As vice-president of the Prohibition League, he is in a position to know the action of the temperance body, yet he had heard nothing of such a petition, nor had several of the leaders in the movement, to whom he had spoken after seeing this morning's article. Dr. Johnston did not say, however, that he would refuse to become a prohibition candidate, if he were pressed.

Evidently there exists among many of the workers for prohibition, a dis-tinct feeling that, in the interests of their cause, and for the sake of a more positive educational tone to the campaign, a prohibition candidate should be nominated, and it is equally assured that many would prefer Dr. Johnston as the candidate. Others also have been mentioned-Dr. Roome, Mr. J. H. Bowman, F. W. Daly and one or two more. Some believe that a strong party man, one who has been in the game before, would be the best choice; while others think that it would be well to cut free from politics that they consider to be not the best for the moral welfare of the province. This is in the event of a third man being necessary It is agreed on the whole that it would be still better if one of the regular candidates would pledge himself to support their cause.

The prohibition people altogether are not whole-souledly unanimous in regard to either the manner or the advisability of conducting an energetic campaign at this time. The opinion that a vote taken upon a day set apart from the general elections would prevent a satisfactory result has led to doubt as to the advisability of accepting this opportunity as a test of the prohibition strength. Those who hold this opinion are inclined to think it unwise to condemn the referendum, though they do not like the method of securing the public opinion.







With Miss Meiklejohn's recommendation, Miss Mayou's application was supported by many eulogistic letters from individuals under whose no tice she has come during an extended experience. She was not so modest in her pecuniary demands as Miss Murray has been. Miss Murray's good services were repaid at the rate of \$35 monthly; Miss Mayou would not come at all for less than twice that amount. Nor would she come unless she could bring her own assistant. There is ar assistant head nurse at the hospital now, who is excellently qualified for the position. But apparently the deal had to be gone through with, so Miss Mayou's wishes were deferred to.
