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

A LESSON FROM THE OTHER SIDE. There are 341 cities and towns in the United States which have a population of over 10,000. Massachusetts stands first with 37, Pennsylvania second with 32, New York third with 29, Obio fourth with 24, Illinois fifth with 20, and Michigan sixth with 15. Delaware, South Dakota and Wyoming have each one city with over 10,-000, and Arkansas, Mississippi, Montana, Oregon, South Carolina, Utah, Vermont, Washington and West Virginia two each. The cities with seven figures are: New York, 1,513,501; Chicago, 1,099,133, and Philadelphia, 1,046,252; while Brooklyn heads the list of cities of six figures with

The State of Michigan with her fifteen cities with a population of over 10,000— Detroit being first with 205,669—makes a better record than Ontario, which has not more than ten. Will the restrictionists please tell us why this should be? It is not because Ontario is inferior to Michigan in soil, climate or natural resources; neither is it because she is less favorably situated for trade. In these respects our Province is more favorably circumstanced than Michigan. We surpass our neighbor State largely in area of territory, we grow larger crops, we produce finer live stock, we have larger and better forests, we have a greater variety of minerals and vast deposits of the economic ores, and we have an immense stretch of coast line extending from Pigeon River on Lake Superior almost to the city of Montreal. The life-blood of citles is trade and commerce, and they grow and flourish as they are fed. The cities of Michigan enjoy free trade with 62,000,000 people, and their prosperity follows naturally from the advantages which so large a market affords them. Those who say that the cities and towns of Ontario would suffer were trade between the two countries free have only to be directed to Michigan for their answer. Had the same rate of growth in area of territory, we grow larger crops, have only to be directed to Michigan for their answer. Had the same rate of growth obtained here as there during the last ten years we should now have sixteen or seven-teen cities with a population of over 10,000, while the fact is that we have only ten.

and with the growth of cities would come improved markets and increased prosperity for the farmers. An experience of twelve years with a policy of exclusion and restriction should satisfy us that prosperity is not to be found along that road. But let the markets of the continent be made free to us and every State of the Union and every Province of the Dominion will be mutually benefited.


