IN LABOR'S FIELD.

Terms on Which the C. P. R. Strike Was Settled.

MONTREAL, March 25.—Vice-President T. G. Shaughnessy, of the C. P. R. yesterday said: "Everything is quiet and running smoothly. The terms of settlement agreed upon were these: All men who have been discharged and who have gone on strike, also any employee who has been discharged for refusing to take the place of any strike, or who has voted to strike, to be reinstated without prejudice. It can be shown to the committee of engineers who have mediated between the company and the trainmen that any of the strikers committed an assault upon any official of the road, he to be dismissed; this to apply to the Pacific and eastern divisions as well as the western division."

SEPARATION GRANTED.

The Canadian Royal Templars Chose from the Supreme Council.

BUFFALO, March 24.—The Supreme Council of the Royal Templars of Templance adopted the revised ritual after a lengthy debate. The council went into committee of the whole to consider a memorial which came from Canada to the effect that a dissolution of the organic relations existing between the Grand and the United States be granted by the Supreme Council. The reason for this request is on account of certain legislation pending in the Dominion, which would seriously interfere with the effective work of the beneficial department with their supreme head in the United States. A long discussion took place on this request. Judge John H. Bates, of Michigan, supreme councilor, R. D. Manger, of Pennsylvania, and Supreme Secretary Nelson, of Buffalo, spoke on the subject from the United States point of view. They were followed by W. H. Buchanan and the Rev. A. M. Phillips, of the Dominion, who spoke on the Canadian side. The opinions of both Canadian and United States representatives agreed, and the request of the Dominion Council was granted. Canada had five grand councilors in the Supreme Council, and are under different ritualistic work from the councils in the United States. The Dominion Council will now take the place of the Supreme Council of the United States, which they formerly sent their representatives.

THE REPORTS OF THE OFFICERS gave a summary of the history of the order for the two years ended on Dec. 31. They show that the order has increased in membership since the last year, and the Royal Templars suffered from the increased mortality which followed the grip, and the order has a smaller membership now than two years ago. Supreme Councilor R. D. Manger reported, however, that the order has adhered to its principle of paying death claims immediately, and therefore stands on a firm and smooth footing. It is on a sound financial basis, with no debt, and the Supreme Secretary Nelson reports a mortality of 187 in 1890, with a membership of 15,019 at the close of the year and a mortality of 201 in 1891, with a membership of 13,626 at the close of the year. Each have over \$1,000,000. These four funds have nearly seven-eighths of the total insurance of \$19,763,000 outstanding.

bodies that we in Canada possess. He is

Premier of Quebec, member of the Legisla-

tive Council of the Province and a Dom-

inion Senator. Well has it been con-

tended that when one man can fill all these

offices without working over-time, it is safe

to say the number of offices is greater than

need be.

The settlement of the C. P. R. employ-

ees by a reference to the Brotherhood of

Locomotive Engineers of the points in dis-

pute between the company and its men is

another triumph for arbitration. Every

strike that takes place is a loss to one or

both of the parties to it, as well as to the

public, and those who are able by speedy

and satisfactory means to avert a rupture

or to bring it speedily to an end may justly

men arbitrate their differences?

Mr. Erasmus Wiman has resigned the

presidency of the Great Northwestern

Telegraph system, and Mr. H. P. Dwight,

for a number of years vice-president and

general manager of the organization, has

been appointed his successor. Mr. Dwight's

promotion is deserved. He has shown

marked business ability in the offices which

he has hitherto held, and there is every

reason for the belief that in the higher

office to which he has been called he will

be able to still further develop and render

efficient the great system of telegraph lines

now placed fully in his care.

CHEAP RAILWAY FARES.

The cheap fares granted by the G. T. R.

and C. P. R. authorities brought large

crowds of excursionists from Detroit and

Toronto on Thursday.

Cheap fares seem to pay the companies.

They fill the company's cars and make

little additional work for the employees,

wear and tear of rolling stock or consump-

tion of fuel.

From a selfish point of view, therefore,

the railway companies stand in their own

light if they do not more and more

encourage travelling by lower fares.

Some companies, however, persist in the

old idea that high fares and light travel is

the most profitable arrangement, and the

public are debarred from using the lines as

much as they would do under other cir-

cumstances. In the charters of British com-

panies cheap fares are generally provided

for street railways run out, the electric

authorities take good care that the com-

panies shall give cheap fares in return for

valuable franchises granted by the munici-

palities. In the event of any railway com-

panies seeking new powers or privileges

from the Legislature or from the Dominion

Parliament, it would be well to have the

interests of the public conserved by stipu-

lating for cheap travelling facilities. In the

long run the companies would be gainers.

Everyone who has been to Japan catches

the witchery of the Japanese woman. They

are just as sweet and pretty as they can be,

at least that is the verdict of all the men

who go there and see them in their own

homes. They are so clean, too, and so will-

ing and so obliging. When a Japanese

beauty gets herself up to a banquet leaves

this doesn't sound very pretty, but to of-

fend the blackness she put a dash of red

pomade right upon her mouth, making such

a tempting beauty spot that no man can

resist admiring the spot of loveliness.

A GRAVE CRISIS.

What is the situation?

Talk talk on both sides of the Atlantic.

As "tall" on one side as the other—

certainly so far as the newspapers of Great

Britain and of the United States are con-

cerned.

The trouble is that tall talk makes an

exaggeration of feeling among the populace

of the respective sides.

So long as the tall talk confines itself to

Blaine and Salisbury, to the London

Standard and the New York Sun, it may do

less harm, though it can never be harm-

less.

But with the British and American

aquarions face to face on the Bering Sea,

the St. James' Gazette is justified in the

view that "it is impossible not to feel

anxiety as to what might happen if a

couple of naval officers on a remote sea

should lose their heads or their tempers."

Then Sir Charles Tupper, according to

a published dispatch, is getting in

some tall talk on his own account

by urging Lord Salisbury to speak

up to the United States a little livelier.

"Should the sealing issue result in war,"

Sir Charles is reported as saying, "the

Canadians would be prepared to do their

part and prove their loyalty on land, but

they must look to England for defense at

sea." It may be all very well for Sir

Charles Tupper, from the midst of his more

than Oriental luxury in England at the ex-

pense of the Canadian taxpayer, to "sit

on" a combat between the pot on one side

and the pickin on the other; but in case of

trouble does anybody suppose for a moment

that Sir Charles would leave his Sybaritic

surroundings to come back and take his

own share of the hard knocks?

The question of war is one which the

fathers and mothers of Canada may not re-

gard with so much composure as an orna-

mental and luxurious High Commissioner

3,000 safe miles from the hunt of attack.

To-day's telegrams again indicate the pos-

sible withdrawal of the railway bonding

privileges. Do those who profess to con-

sider this matter immaterial to our railways

really believe what they say?

War with shot and shell is barbarous and

unchristian; yet commercial war, war by

tariff, is only one degree less barbarous, less

unchristian.

Canada to-day is not only ruled, as was

shown by the revelations of last session at

Ottawa, by the most corrupt administration

of which English-speaking history has ever

made record, but by demagogic Ministers

possessed, to use Mr. Blake's phrase, by

"a boastful jingo spirit far enough removed

from true manliness, loudly proclaiming

nreel conditions and exaggerated senti-

ments, while actual facts and genuine op-

inions are suppressed."

STILL A MYSTERY.

A well-arranged, strongly-stuck-to alibi

seems to be the one thing needful in a

murder trial these days. No more remark-

able display of contradictory evidence has

ever been brought out in court than that

relating to the whereabouts of Bartram and

Lottidge on the cold winter night of

January, 1891, when the Ancaster

township treasurer was brutally murder-

ed by burglars in search of his

wealth. There was perjury or mis-

representation on the part of one or other

of the sets of witnesses that for over a

week gave testimony at the Hamilton

Assizes. On which side the false swearing

predominated each student of the evidence

will have his own opinion. In all proba-

bility the murderers of John Hyslop, how-

ever they are, will now go unwhipped

of human justice. But they have consciences,

and they must be scared beyond measure

if the recollection of the fearful crime does

not haunt them night and day and make

their lives miserable. The gallows is not

the only agent for expiating murder.

TORONTO MINISTERIAL ASSOCIA-

TION.

The W. C. T. U. of Toronto recently

sent a deputation to the Toronto Minis-

terial Association on the question of giv-

ing more prominence to the teaching of tem-

perance principles in the Sabbath schools.

After taking plenty of time for reflection,

the Toronto Ministerial Association, ac-

cording to the report published in the To-

ronto papers, "reaffirmed their previous de-

cision to take no action thereon."

What's the matter with the Toronto

Ministerial Association?

Are they afraid to face the music of the

questions of the day?

Do they consider the liquor traffic a

means of grace?

Are they afraid to disturb the consciences

of any distillers or brewers who may hap-

pen to be in their congregations?

Do they think they have performed the

whole duty of ministers when they de-

nounce Amalek, and Pharaoh, and Ahab,

and Baalam, and Pilate, and Herod, and

Judas, while running away from living sin-

ners and the moral questions of the living

present?

If those who compose such bodies as the

Toronto Ministerial Association have no

duty in regard to great moral and social

questions, what are they for?

It is said that many of the German col-

onists on the Volga River, who are suffer-

ing from the Russian famine, in order to

save fuel, have dug holes in the ground,

sundered shingles in which they burrow

like foxes. They form, undoubtedly, the

only instance of civilized people who to-day

are living the lives of troglodytes.

JUDGE ELLIOT, MR. MEREDITH

AND MR. TAIT.

Usually the Ontario Legislature is a quiet

body, conducting its important business

with decorum and dispatch.

Yesterday the surface was ruffled by a

lively encounter between Mr. W. R. Mer-

edith and Mr. Joseph Tait.

Mr. Meredith is known to a number of

our readers as a former resident of this

city, and for some time past as a Toronto

lawyer. The people of London had seen

very little of him for a long time till, in the

recent Dominion campaign, he arrived in

the city simultaneously with the Ingram

gang from St. Thomas, and took to ward-

walking for Mr. Carling, to the neglect of

his duties in the Legislature.

Mr. Tait is one of the members for To-

ronto. He is a baker, and a more than

usually able public speaker, as those who

listened to him when he spoke in the Opera

House during the campaign of 1891 will re-

member.

A bill was under discussion in the House,

and Mr. Meredith objected to some of its

provisions because, as he looked at it, the

measure reflected on the county judges.

Mr. Tait jeeringly suggested that Mr.

Meredith must be "thinking of Judge

Elliot." Then Mr. Meredith flew into a

passion such as he probably has not been

in since, at Mount Brydges, assailing the

late Mr. Pardee, he simulated a rage that

passed boiling-over point. Recriminations

followed, and Mr. Tait gave the warty

man a well-deserved castigation, reminding

him of the humiliating Weekes case in

which he figured, and also of the sworn

testimony of one of his own supporters, to

the effect that he knew all about the

bribery plot concocted in 1882 to upset the

Ontario Administration and put his friends

in power.

Premier Mowat threw oil on the troubled

waters, and the tempest caused by Mr.

Tait's innocent reminder passed over.

Mr. Meredith seems to regard it as an

insult to him personally to even suggest
