The issue between the two political parties on this great question is now clearly defined. That the Government themselves admit the full of the fiscal policy and now profess to reform it, but they say that such changes must be based only on the principle of protection. This is radically unsound and unjust to the masses of the people, and we declare our conviction that any tariff changes based on that principle must fall to allow any substantial relief from the burdens under which the country labors. This issue we unhesitatingly accept, and upon it we await with the fullest confidence the verdict of the electors of Canada."

This resolution, Mr. Laurier said, was complete in itself. It contained a thorough arraignment of the course that the Government had followed heretofore on trade matters. It drew the line distinctly and between liberty and oppression. It affirms that the Government has no right to take

"Resolved that this convention deplores the gross corruption in the management and expenditure of public meneys, which for years past has existed under the rule of the Conservative party, but the revelations of which by the different parliamentary committees of inquiry have brought disgrace upon the fair name of Canada. The Government, which profited politically by these expenditures of public moneys, of which the people have been defrauded, and which, nevertheless, has never punished the guilty ones, must be held responsible for the many wrongdoings. We arraign the Government for retaining in office a Minister of the crown proved to have accepted very large constributions of mency for election purposes from the funds of a railway company which, while paying the political contributions to him (a member of the Government) with one hand, was receiving Government subsidies with the other. CANADA'S GREAT INDUSTRY.

Hor Cheese Captures Ninety Per Cont. of the Awards at the World's Fair.

of the Awards at the World's Fair.
CHICAGO, June 22.—The judges appointed by the exposition committee on cheese awards were Messrs. John H. Hodgson, of New York, and A. F. Maclaren, of Windsor, Ont. Both are well known as judges of the highest reputation on the continent. They agreed to recommend that all exhibits of cheese which received a score of 90 and over should be awarded a medal and a diploma. The total number of single exhibits of cheese was 667. Of these Canada sent 162. The plan by which the Dominion dairy commissioner collected these from the different Provinces is already well known. These 162 exhibits were from 110 different factories and thus were truly representa-These 162 exhibits were from 110 different factories and thus were truly representative of the cheese industry of Canada. Most of the entries at Chicago were in classes for factory cheese. When the judging was completed it was found that some 135 exhibits in the factory classes were entitled to medals and diplomas. That was evidence that skill and care had been exercised in the selection of the cheese, as well as in their manufacture. If the exhibits from Canada had embraced as many as one-third of the total number which scored high enough to win medals, that result would have been most creditable to our dairymen and dairy commissioner in a World's Fair competition. The facts are that of the total number of some 135 exhibits which won medals in the factory classes no less than 126 were from Canada. Another strong point in honer of Canada was brought out in the fact that 31 exhibits of Canadian cheese scored higher than the highest United States cheese.

The medals go to the several Provinces in such a way as to show that Canadian

The medals go to the several Provinces in such a way as to show that Canadian cheese everywhere is now being made of excellent qualito. Of the exhibits which won the honor 69 came from Ontario, 52 from Nova Scotia and 2 from Prince Edward Island. Of the cheese of the make of the present season (1863), twenty lots from Quebec won medals, against one from Ontario. This is unquestionably the greatest triumph for dairying The medals go to the several Provinces against one from Ontario. This is unques-tionably the greatest triumph for dairying in Canada which has ever been achieved, and the dairymen of Quebec particularly are to be congratulated upon the way in which they have come to the very fore-front.

THE LEPER DEAD.

Ong Foy Toy Succumbs—He Went to Sleep and Did Not Wake Up.

New York, June 21.—Ong May Toy, the Chinese leper, died at the lazaretto on North Brober Island yesterday.

When Ong Moy Toy was first taken from No. 24 Most street on Aug. 15, 1891, to North Brother Island along with Tsang Ding, a merchant of 57 Most street, he was apparently strong and tipped the beam at about 150 pounds. Just before he died he had wasted away until he weighed only 85 pounds. His disease was not that generally found among lepers, thore being but lew eruptions on his skin. His leprosy was of the kind that is dry and wastes away or absorbs the flesh and tissue antil the victim finally dies of weakness. He knew his end was coming soon, but he kept up until Sunday afteruoon, when after a brief walk he lay down on his couch in his lonely tent, saying he felt tired and sleepy. He slept throughout the night, but did not again awaken.

Ong Moy Toy, after being first arrested by the health department and confined three weeks, was with Tsang Ding brought down from North Brother Island and set at liberty with the understanding that they were to go back to China. Tsang Ding succeeded in doing so, but Ong Moy Toy was not allowed to board the steamer at Vancouver. On May 5, 1592, he was again found in Chinatown. He was sent back to North Brother Island.

It has formulated a platform on the questions in dispute between the two great political parties, which places the issue beyond the possibility of evasion. Because of this stand, the result of its deliberations will receive the respect of all Liberals, as well as of many Conservatives who have not hitherto seen eye to eye with the Liberal party. The trade question-the bread and butter issueis so put in the declaration unanimously arrived at by those in convention that it will not be misunderstood and cannot as easily be misrepresented as some previous pronouncements have been.

Briefly stated, the trade resolution pronounces in favor of a tariff for revenue only, with perfect trade freedom as its goal, and with reciprocity, if occasion is presented, as an agency to hasten the day when the British principle shall fully triumph throughout the Dominion. This is in accord with the eloquent declarations by the Liberal leader at the opening of the great gathering. Mr. Laurier then said:



The Sunday school committee was glad to be able to state that 34 parishes were willing to enter on the work then proposed at once, and that many others would have done so but for prior engagements. And no appointment shall be made to such vacant parish until such finding has been complied with." Following this he also moved the exception from section 8, canon 28, of all provisions for filling vacancies.

Mr. A. C. Clark, of Sarnia, pointed out that when a congregation got behind in the payment of the cirryman's salary the bishop should immediately remove him. The non-payment of salaries by some congregations was a great evil. It had been the rule to meet these exigencies by drawing upon the mission fund. 

The Oid City Burying Grounds.

"I see," said Mr. James Gillean this morning, as the spry veteran of 50 summers' toil and enjoyment in London met an Advertiser man, "I see that you ask who remembers when there was a burying ground where O'Callaghan's terrace now stands on Ridout street? Well do I remember it. After my arrival in London in the summer of 1842, I attended many a funeral there. It was a public burying ground, and at its west end, at the corner of North street and Ridout, stood a frame Methodist Episcopal Church, a leading member of which was ex-Ald. John Christie. I recollect when many of the bodies were moved to other cemeteries in order that the land might be used for building purposes. Among the remains unearthed were those of the late Simeon Morrill's first wife, who in her day was regarded as a beauty. Her fine tresses of black hair were found in the coffin, arranged as when she was buried. The coffins in those days were not ornamented with timel, but were made of oak. I have no doubt that many bodies yet lie interred in the O'Callaghan terrace neighborhood. The graveyard extended from Ridout street to the river and west as far as North street, now Queen's avenue. At the corner of Maple and Richmond streets the Roman Catholics of this locality had a graveyard. Its entrance was where Peel's marble works and Taylor's shoe shop now stand. The bodies interred there were also removed to other graveyards. There have been many ups and dows since these cities of the dead were given up for the more medern ones."


