Bracebridge, Ont., Dec. 2. - Chief Justice Armour yesterday passed sentence upon Matthew and Thomas Thompson, who were found guilty of 23 months each in the Central Prison. 

A Policy of Progressive Development.

Our city contemporary, the London Free Press, commenting on the Liberal victory in Toronto Center, says "That the Dominion elections of June, 1896, were carried by the Liberal party on the free trade issue everybody must concede." Everybody certainly does not concede any such thing. The attitude of the Liberal party, as we understood it in 1896, and as we understand it now, was that the tendency of the tariff should be in the direction of freer trade with the world, but more particularly with Great Britain. The tariff was revised on these lines, and when the full effect of the preferential tariff with Great Britain is in evidence after next midsummer, we will have a lowered tariff on manufacturers' raw material, a lowered tariff on articles entering into general consumption by our people, and a tariff giving a preference of 25 per cent to goods imported from Great Britain. This is a line of policy entirely in accord with the declarations of the Liberal leaders and newspapers advocating Liberal principles prior to last general elections. It is not, of course, in line with the prophecies of the now Opposition leaders, who, prior to June, 1896, asserted that it was the Intention of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues to destroy Canadian industry, and to take no heed of the conditions of Canada, the result largely of the long maintenance of a tariff policy with vicious tendencies. But the present Dominion Administration has refused to concede the truthfulness of these prophecies, and has shown, by its deeds, that the prognostications were false.
