

Board of Trade and Builders **Exchange Getting Together** On Splendid Plan.

REQUIRES UNITED EFFORT

Loan Companies, Contractors. Architects Will Join Hands To Further Prosperity.

A plan, which it is believed will develop the spirit of "business as usual" in a marked degree, has been brought to the attention of the board of trade, and when the details have been worked out in accordance with a co-operative scheme, it is promised that the public will be encouraged to proceed in the spring with a measure of construction of normal proportions. Appoint Committee.

A committee of the board of trade was appointed at a meeting of the executive, held yesterday afternoon, to discuss the situation with rep resentatives of the Builders' Ex-change, and when the proposition has been thoroughly evolved it will be set forth in a manner that, it is promised, will prove most attractive, in that it cannot do other than redound to the advantage of owners, contractors and labor.

Requires Concerted Action. The proposition is one which requires a certain concerted action of loan companies, contractors and architects, but a preliminary investigation by a committee of busiressmen, in which those concerned have been approached has brought such encouraging results that it is not doubted that construction will be stimulated to an extent that will at least offset any depression which may exist because of the war. Fine Detail Work.

The plan is being worked out in very fine detail and, as part of the general scheme, it is the intention to approach various municipal bodies where reasons will be submitted that will no doubt convince those in charge of civic funds, that it is the best interests of the public to proceed with any works which have been projected as part of a normal 1915 program. Expedient and Advisable.

It will be shown that it is not alone expedient, but advisable, that the erection of new schools and other buildings should be commenced as early as possible. It is argued that in case of the schools, the accomdation is urgently required by the board of education, and such public works will relieve in a large degree, the pressure of the problem of the unemployed.

Ambassador at Washington Says Enemy Will Not Seize American Vessels With Supplies For Civilians, Unless Wilhelmina Seized by Britain.

AGAIN RECOUNTS THE NEUTRAL FLAG STORY

(Canadian Press.)

Washington, Feb. 6.—The German embassy declared in a statement issued today in regard to the decree placing the waters around the British Isles in the war zone, that Germany 'does not intend to molest or seize American vessels lader with foodstuffs for the civilian population of enemy countries."

The statement expresses the hope "that Britain will not make necessary a reconsideration of this attitude by seizing American ships like the Wilhelmina!" The statement follows: NOTHING NEW.

"The German ambassador has not received instructions regarding the decision of the German admiralty, but according to the text of the decision, the following seems clear:

"There is nothing new in the communication made on February 4 by the German admiralty with respect to the attitude of the German imperial navy toward ships of the enemy or toward neutral commerce. 



A denial by Great Britain of the existence of the order would be followed, it is understood, by inquiry of the German authorities as to proof of their charge. LATE HON. F. D. MONK BRITISH TRADE SHOWS EFFECT OF GREAT WAR

Exports and Imports Decrease Considerably For Month of January.

[Canadian Press.]

London, Feb. 6.—The effect of the war on British trade again is apparent in the figures given out by the board of trade for the month of January.

These show that in this month imports were decreased by £604,000 (\$3,020,000), and that imports were decreased by £19,558,000 (\$97,790,000). Food imports increased £7,250,000 (\$36,350,000), but this was offset by the decline in manufactured articles and raw material, in which cotton showed a decrease of £3,500,000 (\$17,500,000). In exports, the decrease of coal amounted to £1,750,000 (\$5,750,000), and in manufactured articles the decrease was £17,000,000 (\$5,750,000). Of this lastmentioned amount £6,000,000 (\$30,000,000) is found in cotton textiles.

He said that a four-room school was needed in West London. The Collegiate Institute accommodates 200 more students than it was built to do. "As for the Industrial School, we have simply camped at Alexandra School, and it is too small.
