While there does not seem to be any particular opposition to the Beck water scheme, and it seems to be the general opinion that this is the best water scheme the city can adopt, it must not be forgotten by the people that it is necessary for them to turn out in full force on Monday and vote for the bylaw. It not only requires a majority vote, but it also requires one-third of the voters on the list to record their votes in its favor. This water question is such a serious one that it will not do to take any chances at the present time. I believe that the mayor would be doing the right thing if he declared Monday afternoon a half-holiday. If this is not done, I have no doubt the manufacturers of the city will see to it that their employees have sufficient time to vote on Monday, either by closing down at, say, 3 c'clock, or else arranging to give their men an extra

A LITTLE MOTHER TAKES HER LIFE.

Reed City, Mich., July 21.-Worn out and despondent from the weight of the burden she had borne since the death of her mother two years ago, in the care of her smaller brothers and sisters and the management of the household for her father, a farmer, little Minnie Schmidt, aged 15, sought release yesterday afternoon by ending her own life.

In the kitchen, which was the scene of her labors, the child, who had for two years sacrificed her childhood to be housekeeper, cook, nurse and mother for the family, shot herself through the heart with her father's shotgun. Her body fell beside the table on which the dinner dishes, washed and dried, were piled neatly away. Save for the blood that stained the floor from her own body, the house was faultlessly clean. The children, carefully washed and dressed, played about the yard in baby ignorance of the little tragedy inside the house. In the field, far out of hearing of the house, the father toiled, without a thought

of the little mother who had grown tired even to death. When he came at 6 o'clock from the field to the house to get his supper he found the lifeless body of the girl upon the kitchen floor. He called the neighbors, and Coroner Grant was summoned. Even then the import of the tragedy did not reach

the mind of the father. She had done all the housework and taken care of the children since her mother died," he said wonderingly. "She never complained, but was always cheerful, always thoughtful of my comfort and careful of the little ones. I don't know why she did this. She must have been just tired of living."





City Once Destroyed by Storm | Snell Now Have a Problem Passes Through Safely.

Immense Damage to Property by Cyclonic Disturbance in Gulf of Mexico.

Galveston, Texas, July 21.-Fortified behind her 17-foot seawall and elewhich has been protected, suffered comparatively little harm. No lives were lost and the property damage is not large.

Sweeping westward, the tropical storm, which had been central over the Gulf of Mexico for 24 hours, struck Galveston shortly after 11 o'clock. The wind attained a velocity of 68 miles an hour, and shifted to the northwest heaving the waters of Galveston Bay up against the island and flooding that quarter which had not been raised. The water backed up into the main streets of the city, but the damage was confined to the beach front, where bath houses and pleasure piers were swept away. Shipping was undisturbed.


