

Head of Huron Diocese Delivers Annual Charge to Synod.

Recommendations of 1919, charge of Bishop of Huron:

Bishop's Recommendations 1. (a) That the sum of \$2,000 be added to the capital of the widows' and orphans' fund, to bring it up (b) That the synod consider the advisability of including in the budget an annual sum to be added

to the capital, which should at least 2. (a) That the synod refer the whole matter of increase of pensions to the executive committee for complete report and recommenda-

tions to the next synod.

(b) That the grants to clergy in purely Indian missions be increased from \$600 to \$800, the balance of the stipend to be made up by Indian congregations, an addition of \$400 a year.
3. That the synod through the

executive committee apply to the augmentation of the commutation fund capital such an amount as may be deemed advisable from the 10 per cent held back according to statute, and afterwards by vote transferred to the mission fund.
4. (a) That a fund be created to cover traveling expenses of the executive committee, by levying a rate upon the parishes similar to the rate now levied for the equaliza-

tion of railway fares to synod. (b) That the rate be made sufficient to cover traveling expenses to regular meetings of the provincial syrod and of the departmental boards of the general synod. Reason for these recommenda-tions: Increase in railway rates, which results in breakdown of representative system because delegates cannot afford to attend owing to

expenses.

5. That the executive committee be reduced to 40 or 30 members, instead of 60; also that the representation of each diocese on the depart-mental boards of the general synod might be reduced from four to two epresentatives, traveling expenses having a bearing also upon this recommendation.







Mount Clemens, Mich., May 12.— With the reputation of the Chicago Tribune, one of the leading news-papers of the United States, at stake papers of the United States, at stake on one side, and the millions of Henry Ford, auto manufacturer, on the other, one of the biggest law suits of modern times, from the standpoint of financial disbursements, a suit for \$1,000,000 was scheduled to open before Circuit Judge James G. Tucker here this morning. With most of the preliminary battles already fought and decided in Illinois and Detroit courts, it is anticipated the case will come to decided in lithous and Detroit courts, it is anticipated the case will come to trial with little delay. The suit has already been in the courts two and a half years. The meat of the alleged libellous article was the headline of an editorial published by the Tribune June 23, 1916, as follows: "Ford is an anarchist"

Ford counter-charges that the Tribune was given to the expression of pro-German senti-ments during the war, and lent itself to the German propagandists, who flaunted their literature throughout the United their literature throughout the United

Ford, moreover, has flooded the States of Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Wisconsin and Michigan with booklets composed of reprints from the editorial and news columns of the Tribune of an alleged pro-German color, with a view apparently to winning public approval.

#### A Bob Rogers Reaction

Hon. F. B. Carvell, minister of public works made known in the House of Commons Monday night that the cost of the new Parliament buildings at Ottawa would exceed the estimate of \$5,-000,000 by \$3,000,000. He expressed dissatisfaction with the progress being made on the build-

The statement recalls the circumstances under which the reconstruction of the Parliament buildings was undertaken by Hon. Robert Rogers, former minister of public works. The word 'reconstruction' is used advisedly, as may be seen by reading on. When the ruin left by the fire was inspected, it was decided to begin operations at once. Mr. Rogers took the matter in hand and soon had architects chosen, without going to the trouble of inviting competition from the profession as a whole. He also did a peculiar thing in regard to the contract. The law says that all new buildings undertaken by the Government at a cost above \$5,000 must be constructed by public tender. But there is no provision for tenders for "reconstructed" buildings, and Mr. Rogers' architects decided this question by declaring there was a salvage of \$2,000,000 in the old buildings. Therefore the contract was quickly let to Peter Lyall & Sons on a percentage basis. No other contractor was invited to bid. Soon after work commenced the architects reconsidered the salvage proposal, and it was determined that the walls would have to come down; so that the \$2,000,000 counted on there was lost, at least in part, and the work went ahead on the old plan of following the style of the old buildings, with more room provided.


