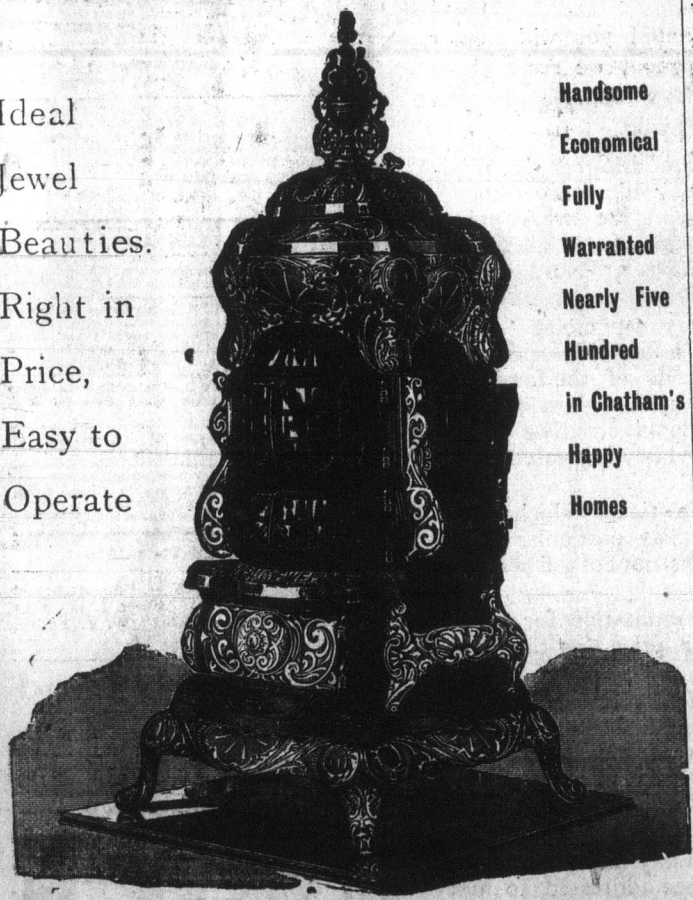

WAS WRECKED ON A REEF

Norwegian Barque And
Crew Go Down At Red
Island

ANOTHER SEA TRAGEDY

Quebec, Nov. 22.—Capt. Chas. Koe-
fig of the Canadian Government
steamer Bruid, which arrived yester-
day morning from the Lower St. Law-
rence, tells of the loss of a vessel,
together with her crew, at the south-
east reef of Red Island. The vessel
is believed to be a barque, and to
have been loaded with lumber at
River du Loup.

Capt. John Ryan of the Red Island
lightship saw the vessel leave her
anchorage ground at Cacouna on
Thursday last, previous to the wind
springing up. On Thursday evening
she was not seen again until after
the snowstorm abated, when Capt. Ir-
van saw the stern standing up, a por-
tion of the stern being above water
on the southeast reef of Red Island,
inside of the buoy.

The impression is that all of the
crew perished with the vessel, as no
trace of them has been found.

The operator at Father Point wires
that the steamer Savoy, outward
bound, states that the barque is a
Norwegian vessel which loaded at
River du Loup.

A BUILDING WRECK

Collapse of Kodak Structure At Ro-
chester Finds Many Victims.

Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 22.—A fatal
accident occurred yesterday forenoon
at Eastman Kodak Park Works on the
Charlotte Boulevard, in which three
men were killed, eight seriously in-
jured, and six slightly injured. The
dead have been identified as James
Burns of Rochester, Earl Cleveland of
Auburn and B. C. Casemack of Ro-
chester.

The men were at work on a scat-
fold near the top of a two-story build-
ing. The probable cause of the acci-
dent was the removal of the supports
of the steel flooring before the concrete
had properly set.

About twenty men were on the upper
floor when it gave way. The roof and
walls toppled in with a crash.

The men were hurled into the debris,
falling about forty feet.

Coroner Killip yesterday afternoon
preferred a charge of manslaughter in
the second degree, and criminal negli-
gence against Wm. Costello, foreman
in charge of the construction.

Boy's Skull Crushed.
Kenora, Ont., Nov. 22.—A horrible
accident happened yesterday after-
noon. Little George Esselmont, the
ten-year-old son of Roadmaster Essel-
mont, was instantly killed. The un-
fortunate little boy was riding on the
runners of a heavy sleigh, when his
head was caught between a post and
the ponderous sleigh box, which
crushed the skull so that death was
instantaneous.

Ten Hurt In This Wreck.
Buffalo, Nov. 22.—A Buffalo, Ro-
chester & Pittsburgh train, eastbound,
was wrecked at Coelden, 30 miles west
of here last night. Ten of the pas-
sengers were injured. The train was
running at 30 miles an hour when
the baggage car and two day coaches
jumped the track and toppled over
in the ditch. The engine remained on
the rails.

27 Hurt In Collision.
Mobile, Ala., Nov. 22.—A head-on
collision between two passenger trains
on the Mobile and Ohio is reported
near Dwight, Ala. Twenty-seven are
reported injured, one fatally.

Accidentally Shot.
Lumsden, Sask., Nov. 22.—Yester-
day morning, while Robert Smart,
nephew of Charles Sheriff, was clean-
ing a rifle, the shell accidentally ex-
ploded, and the bullet entered his ab-
domen, death resulting at noon. He
was 20 years old.

Five Hotel Fire Victims.
Regina, Sask., Nov. 22.—Another
body has been recovered from the
Windsor Hotel ruins, making the
number of known dead up to five,
namely, the Muscotte brothers, Robert
Johnston, W. N. Robinson and the
unknown found Tuesday night.

OCEAN LINERS COLLIDE

Cherbourg, France, Nov. 22.—A de-
spatch received here reports that the
North German Lloyd steamer Kaiser
Wilhelm der Grosse, which left South-
ampton and Cherbourg for New York
yesterday, was in collision with the
royal mail steamer Orinoco.

Both vessels were severely damaged.
It is declared that four members of
the crew of the Kaiser Wilhelm were
killed, while 12 were injured.

Five members of the crew of the
Orinoco are missing and are supposed
to have been drowned.

The Orinoco left Southampton yester-
day for West Indian ports and New
York.

Parliament Is Opened ; Speech From The Throne

General Prosperity and Growth of Agricultural and
Industrial Wealth Dwelt Upon—Program
For The Session

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 22, 1906.
Hon. Gentlemen of the Senate:
Gentlemen of the House of Commons:
In opening the third session of the
tenth parliament of Canada, I avail
myself of the opportunity to offer
you my congratulations on the un-
paralleled prosperity prevailing in all
parts of the Dominion. The harvest
has been abundant, and the trade
with both British and foreign na-
tions continues to expand; to be an-
nually increasing in volume; with
every prospect of continued growth
for many years to come.

The number of immigrants seeking
homes in Canada continues yearly to
increase, and is very satisfactory.
The number coming from the British
Isles during the past season is larger
than that of any former year.

During the recess following the
last session I visited the western
provinces, and I was much gratified
to note the great advance that is
being made in the development of
the vast resources of these highly fa-
vored sections of the Dominion.

I found the people of the west re-
joicing in their prosperity, and full
of hope and confidence in the future
growth of its agricultural and indus-
trial wealth. The census recently
taken in the Provinces of Alberta
and Saskatchewan shows that these
provinces are now entitled to an in-
crease in their representation in the
House of Commons. A bill giving ef-
fect to that provision will be sub-
mitted for your approval.

In accordance with the announce-
ment made in a previous session, you
will be asked to consider a bill for
the revision of the customs tariff.
The sanction of parliament will be
required to give legal effect to the
treaty made with the Empire of
Japan, and a bill for that purpose
will be submitted for your approval.

The program of the session, as
outlined at the recent interna-
tional exhibition held in the city
of Milan proved a great attraction
and, as a result, it is confidently
believed our trade with Central and
Southern Europe can be materially
increased. The naval authorities hav-
ing relinquished the use of the dock

yard at Halifax, a proposal was made
to transfer it to the Government of
Canada. This offer has been accept-
ed, and the dock yard will now be
used by the Department of Marine
and Fisheries as a base for its
operations in connection with aids to
navigation. Many immigrants having
been induced to come to Canada by
false representations made in the
United Kingdom at the request of
the Minister of Labor, a clause has
been added to the Merchants' Bill
now before the Imperial Parliament
for the punishment of any person
who may be found guilty of that
offense.

The accounts of the past year will
be laid before you. I am glad to
say that the revenue has now a large
expansion and has now only provided
for ordinary expenditures, but has
also to a great extent provided for
the outlay on capital account. The
estimates for the coming year will
be laid before you at an early date.

Hon. Gentlemen of the Senate:
Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

A united application on having been
received by my Ministers from the
Government of the several provinces
asking for an increase in the provi-
ncial subsidies, a conference was
recently held when the reasons for
granting additional aid were fully
set forth and discussed. Resolutions
based on the conclusions reached by
my Government will be submitted
for your consideration. Bills will be
laid before you amending the Elec-
tion Acts; Post Office Act, the Dom-
inion Lands Act, a bill for the more
effective supervision and inspection
of Canadian canned food products,
sea and fish, a bill relating to the
sale and manufacture of patent
medicines, and also a bill to make
better provision for dealing with
juvenile delinquents.

It is hoped that the report of the
Commission appointed to inquire in-
to the work of insurance companies
will shortly be completed, when it
will be laid on the table.

The subjects I have mentioned
will, I hope, receive your best con-
sideration, and the measures to be
submitted for your approval will
tend to the well being and
good government of our fair Domi-
nion.

COMING EVENTS CAST SHADOWS

U. S. Is Urged To Protect
15,000 Miles Of Coast
Line

New York, Nov. 22.—A meeting of
the Naval League, maritime section,
was held yesterday afternoon to urge
an improvement in the condition of
the naval reserve, and a greater navy
for the United States.

Former Police Commissioner Mc-
Adoo and Gen. Horace E. Porter ad-
vised that the country was on the
firing line between Asia and the new
world, and that it was absolutely nec-
essary to have a large navy to pro-
tect the United States' Philippine in-
terests.

The speaker asserted that Japan,
the leading power of Asia, would,
sooner or later, reach the Philippines.
Under the Monroe Doctrine, the
United States, he said, had 15,000
miles of coast to protect, which could
not be done with half a navy.

THE GOVERNMENT'S POSITION.

The Laurier Government can hardly be expected to take action of any kind against wrong doers, so long as it includes the Minister of Public Works, who owes his seat to the series of crimes now under disclosures in London. It is a constant surprise here that Mr. Hyman continues to pose as a Member for London, when every day's enquiry brings out additional evidence of the organized rascality by which that seat was stolen. The inquiry has recently increased by three the list of deputy returning officers in Brockville who admit having received instruction by Pritchett in the art of switching ballots. It adds also to the number of operators and students in the fine art of ballot switching who took lessons from Pritchett in West Huron. It confirms the ghastly record which Pritchett himself revealed in his affidavit of six years ago and in his testimony last month. Only it now appears that Pritchett's disclosures were not complete, and his list of fellow conspirators was too brief. The Government supporter for whom the Brockville seat was stolen in 1899 soon disappeared from public life. West Huron purged itself of the same class of crimes by defeating in the last election the beneficiary of the ballot switching operations. But London still endures the shame of appearing in Parliament by a member who represents only a conspiracy to defraud the constituency out of its political rights. Mr. Hyman and his friends claim that he had no knowledge of and no part in these offenses. This plea would have more value if the Minister, when the facts became known, had renounced the fruits of the crime.

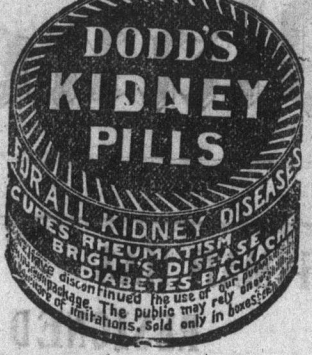
THE GOVERNMENT RESPONSIBLE

The Deputy Minister of Labor has just returned from England whither he went to procure Imperial legislation against frauds and immigrants, such as have been committed in the past. Mr. Monk, Mr. Macdonell, of Toronto, and other Opposition members have persistently demanded such action, at the same time protesting against the conduct of our departmental chief in England, under whose encouragement and with whose assistance the alleged Canadian Labor Bureau carried on its operations. It was shown last session that a circular was issued from Mr. Preston's office to mechanics and artisans recommending them to apply to Louis Leopold for information and assistance in procuring employment in Canada. Leopold went to London from Germany having an understanding with Preston. He engaged Preston's son-in-law as his solicitor. He opened an office beside the Government agency. When the Canadian office was moved to Charing Cross, Leopold went there also, by special invitation, and took up his quarters in the same building with telephone connection between them. Artisans who called at the Canadian office were told that the Canadian Government did not encourage the immigration of skilled laborers, but that Leopold would attend to their case. The notorious Ennis letters, written by the Canadian Commissioner to the Allan Line manager urged the Allans to make Leopold their agent and deceptively set forth that Leopold's alleged bureau was connected with an association of Canadian manufacturers. It would appear that the Canadian Government is therefore more responsible than anyone else for the false pretenses under which unfortunate artisans have been deceived to this country and robbed of their hard earnings. Obviously the Government cannot escape by throwing the blame upon Mr. Preston, for he was kept in the department long after these facts were known, the Government caused every motion concerning his course to be voted down, and finally Mr. Preston was promoted to a higher and more responsible position with a larger salary.

Sir Wilfrid does not seem to be any more successful than the press in forcing the resignation of Mr. Hyman.

There is a petition in circulation in Raleigh to have the local option by-law repealed. Why the change when under the present conditions liquor is "barred."

A deputation of Berlin aldermen and citizens, wishing to view some up-to-date pavements, are going to make visits of inspection to Toronto, St. Catharines, London and Chatham. We can see no excuse for them incurring the extra and unnecessary expense of going to Toronto, St. Catharines and London.

Hon. C. S. Hyman has been ordered to take a complete rest, by his doctor, and will go south for his health. Possibly the unpleasant political odor of the atmosphere around London did not agree with him.

Several times of late attention has been brought to the dangerous condition of the creek bridge. They are in a very bad state, and should be repaired at once. It should not need a notice of a writ for damages to arouse the Board of Works to action in this matter.

I am profoundly ashamed of the state of politics in Manitoba and in the whole of Canada. When distinguished visitors from over the water come to me with letters of introduction, this great shame I feel with regard to our public life. One visitor the other day laid his finger upon the sore. He said: "I am shocked to find that Canada is so far behind all other countries, and that political misconduct is defended in the press and in Parliament." If a few of the public men were sent to the penitentiary there would be a great lull in election scandals. — Rev. Dr. Patrick, Principal of Manitoba College.

CRIMINAL APPEALS.

British Lord Chancellor Talks About Reforms in the Law.

The Lord Chancellor, in a discussion in the British Parliament on the Criminal Appeal Bill, said that he agreed that the power given to prisoners to give evidence on their own behalf had been beneficial. Yet it was said that power would be destructive of justice, and, in fact, it seemed often as if there was an ingrained prepossession on the part of lawyers to resist reforms in the law. Dismal prophecies as to alterations in the law had been many, but they had rarely been true. The Bill gave an appeal on law, which did not seem to be opposed. As to the severity of sentences, his proposal was substantially that of the Statutory Council of Judges four years ago. The great point of the attack of the Lord Chief Justice was the appeal on fact. What was that appeal? If the man was originally acquitted there was no appeal. If he was found guilty he could have an appeal, and the sentence could not be increased, but he who had been found guilty might now, after the practical and superior intelligence of judges had considered the evidence, be found innocent. He did not see how this could be called a Bill for the rich and not for the poor, for any man who was convicted could appeal. The Bill was necessary on account of the fallibility of all tribunals. Human nature was fallible, however carefully the law was administered, and we should try and remedy any occasional slip. In civil causes, wearing his black robes, a judge was considered fallible, and there was an appeal; was the same judge to be considered infallible when he put on the scarlet and ermine, and sat in a criminal court? As to the jury losing its sense of responsibility if an appeal was granted, there was an appeal in certain cases now, and were juries less anxious to return true verdicts in those cases? He did not believe that juries would be less anxious when trying a man for his life, because they knew there was a chance for the man they found guilty to appeal. He would have as free a right to appeal in criminal as in civil cases. He did not think that would involve serious expense, for even if a new court of three judges had to be appointed the expense would be small. He was willing to accept what Viscount Cross desired, and had placed on the paper, the effect of which would be that appeal should be allowed where the judge at the trial thought there should be one or where the Court of Criminal Appeal itself thought there should be an appeal. He did so with a view, as far as he could, of making the criticisms made against the Bill.

Largest Cargo of Wheat.

The steamer B. F. Jones passed down through the Canadian locks at Sault Ste. Marie a few days ago with a larger amount of wheat than was ever before placed in a vessel.

The cargo amounted to 370,273 bushels. The simple statement of the amount gives the ordinary person only a vague idea of its real significance. Here are some further facts regarding the magnitude:

It represents the crop of 15,000 acres. It would load 740 ordinary freight cars.

Twenty-five large freight trains would be required to haul it.

At 75 cents per bushel the value of the cargo would be \$277,754.05.

The transportation company receives \$10,000 for carrying it from the head to the foot of the lakes. The rate is 2.34 cents per bushel.

The wheat would make 92,000 barrels of flour.

The flour would make about 27,600,000 loaves of bread.

It would furnish a city of 200,000 population with bread for a year.

The boat and cargo would represent a value of about three-quarters of a million dollars.

The steamer Jones, which carried this cargo, is 552 feet in length. Her draft on the trip was 19 feet 6 inches.

There are several boats on the lakes engaged in the iron ore trade that exceed 600 feet in length, so that they could easily carry cargoes of much greater value than that taken by the Jones. The boat was enroute from Duluth to Buffalo, and the wheat was for export.

Zinc Mines of the Slocan.

A blue book has just been issued at Ottawa containing the report of the commission appointed by the Government last year to enquire into the zinc industry of the Slocan District of British Columbia. The commissioners estimate that the mines of the Slocan District are capable of producing 12,000 tons of zinc per year, or four times the annual consumption of the Dominion. Owing to the heavy American duty it will be necessary to find in Europe a market for the surplus product of the Canadian mines and smelters. The report makes practical recommendations for improvement in the present imperfect method of smelting, owing to which, it is alleged, the British Columbia zinc industry is languishing.

Circumstances Alter Cases.

Treatment For Mange in Hogs.

Mange in hogs is not difficult to cure, and seldom causes death. It is caused by a parasite under the surface of the skin, which produces irritation and later a scab. This is contagious. The best treatment is to wash the pigs in soft water and soap, then rub in dry sulphur. Repeat in a week. A third treatment is seldom necessary.—American Agriculturist.

THE ONTARIO CROP REPORTS

Figures Of Total Yield are Slightly Below August Forecast

BET SUGAR INDUSTRY

Toronto, Nov. 21.—A statement containing crop conditions on Nov. 1, based on the reports of 2,000 correspondents, has been prepared by the Ontario Department of Agriculture.
All over the province threshing was well advanced, as correspondents reported. Wheat has not been so largely marketed as usual, prices not being considered as attractive by those who could afford to hold, while others are keeping it over to feed stock unless prices rise. Barley is now mainly fed to hogs and other live stock, and while considerable oats have been marketed, much more will be used on the farm. Several correspondents claim that farmers are too busy with fall work to go to market, preferring to wait for the sleighing season.

Scarcity of Farm Help.
Only in a few localities was the supply of farm labor equal to the demand. The continued exodus from this province to the Northwest and New Ontario, is given the chief cause of the scarcity of able men to help on the farm. While some correspondents believe the English immigrants as farm laborers, others aver that there has been a great improvement in quality during the last year or two. The general opinion is that wages will remain about at the present rate, as farmers cannot afford to pay more. The situation is being somewhat relieved by the use of improved farm machinery, and by turning more land into pasture. It is almost impossible to secure domestic servants on the farm, as girls seem to prefer town life.

Wire Fencing Brisk.
More or less activity in farm improvements is reported all over the province. An immense amount of fencing has been done, some of wire being substituted for the old rail or "worm" fence. A considerable number of new dwelling houses and barns have been erected, but much more has been done in the way of building stone or concrete foundations, remodeling houses and barns, in the latter case affording more comfortable and convenient stabling for live stock. More work would have been done in all these lines but for the scarcity of labor.

Best Sugar Industry.
The Ontario Sugar Co., whose factory is at Berlin, are now receiving sugar making from 5,113 bushels. The area in 1905 was 4,477 acres, and the yield was 48,085 tons, an average of 10.7 tons. The company estimated an increase in the yield per acre for 1906. The Wallaceburg Sugar Co. are handling the product of 6,700 acres and estimate between 55,000 and 60,000 tons. The latter company report the sugar yield this year as a little below the average.

Yield Below the Forecast.
The following are the final estimates of the product of the 1906 crop, as compared with returns of actual yield made by threshers, and our staff of correspondents. The figures are slightly below the forecast for August:

Fall Wheat—787,287 acres, yielding 15,841,774 bushels, or 20.0 bushels per acre, as compared with 17,936,961 and 22.5 in 1905.
Spring Wheat—171,745 acres, yielding 3,267,000 bushels, or 19.0 bushels per acre, as compared with 3,582,627 and 18.5 in 1905.
Barley—756,183 acres, yielding 25,011 bushels, or 33.4 bushels per acre, as compared with 24,256,394 and 31.4 in 1905.
Oats—2,716,711 acres, yielding 106,341,456 bushels, or 39.0 bushels per acre, as compared with 105,563,572 and 39.6 in 1905.

A Decrease in Peas.
Peas—410,356 acres, yielding 7,389,987 bushels, or 18.0 bushels per acre, as compared with 7,100,021 and 19.0 in 1905.
Beans—51,273 acres, yielding 950,312 bushels, or 18.5 bushels per acre, as compared with 946,443 and 18.7 in 1905.
Rye—79,870 acres, yielding 1,227,523 bushels, or 16.6 bushels per acre, as compared with 1,715,851 and 16.9 in 1905.
Buckwheat—106,444 acres, yielding 1,792,903 bushels, or 16.8 bushels per acre, as compared with 2,199,662 and 21.7 in 1905.
Potatoes—136,064 acres, yielding 15,020,289 bushels, or 110 bushels per acre, as compared with 14,366,049 and 108 in 1905.

Root Crops.
Carrots—4,980 acres, yielding 1,698,608 bushels, or 321 bushels per acre, as compared with 1,846,659 and 335 in 1905.
Mangel-Wurzels—49,352 acres, yielding 39,863,192 bushels, or 474 bushels per acre, as compared with 33,216,900 and 481 in 1905.
Turnips—132,512 acres, yielding 57,060,151 bushels, or 431 bushels per acre, as compared with 57,654,086 and 426 in 1905.
Corn for Husking (in the ear)—289,456 acres, yielding 33,980,682 bushels, or 82.9 bushels per acre, as against 20,922,919 and 70.9 in 1905.
Corn and Silo and Fodder (green)—180,796 acres, yielding 2,149,413 tons, or 11.89 tons per acre, as against 2,284,812 and 12.36 in 1905.
Hay and Clover—3,069,917 acres, yielding 4,862,830 tons, or 1.58 tons per acre, as against 5,847,494 and 1.94 in 1905.

VOTE ON JAN. 1, 1907.

Municipalities Will Then Determine Whether They Want Government Power or Not.

Toronto, Nov. 21.—Yesterday morning Mayor Coatsworth, representing Toronto, J. J. Fryer, Mayor of Clarendon, Preston, D. W. Detweiler, Berlin, and Ald. Woods, Brantford, of the Western Ontario Municipalities' Niagara Power Union, met Hon. Adam Beck and A. F. Lobb, representing the Hydro-Electric Commission at the City Hall and agreed upon the preliminaries for submitting to popular vote on Jan. 1 a bylaw authorizing the various municipalities to contract with the commission.

Cut Power Wanted in Two.
The estimated quantity of power for each municipality was cut in half, in order to arrive at the minimum quantity which each must accept and pay for under the contract. Thus, while Toronto called for 30,000 horse-power, the bylaw to be submitted will authorize a contract for 15,000 horse-power or more at a rate to be mentioned. The exact figures are not yet obtainable, but Toronto will pay, not to exceed \$17.75 per horse-power for a year, at 24 hours a day.

Deputations See Mr. Cochrane.
Rival power deputations from Gravenhurst and Bracebridge waited on Hon. Mr. Cochrane yesterday. The Gravenhurst deputation were after permission to develop the water power at South Falls, 8 miles away from the town. They have already an electric plant of 750 horse-power, but need more. T. E. Godson, town solicitor, and S. S. Sior, the engineer, headed the deputation. On the other hand Bracebridge had given the contract for the development of 750 horse-power at South Falls and the town voted \$45,000 to build the plant and line. This was subjected to the approval of the Government. Bracebridge is 21-2 miles from South Falls. The answer will be given later.

Want 15,000 Horsepower.
Hamilton, Nov. 21.—Hamilton will make application to the Hydro-Electric Power Commission for 15,000 horse-power, so the board of works decided last evening.

McGILL WAS NOT TIMID

He Played for Big Stakes in Ontario Bank's Last Days

DEALS WERE VERY BIG

Toronto, Nov. 21.—If the Ontario Bank has now come to the end of its independent existence through the process of absorption, it cannot be said that its decline and fall was due to any timidity on the part of Manager McGill in the latter days. So much was made clear and apparent as the close of the proceedings yesterday in the evidence for and against Mr. McGill, before Magistrate Denison.

Mr. McGill has probably never been suspected of being a mere dabbler in stocks, one who took an occasional "flier" in Wall street, for the mere sport of sport. But, on the other hand, it is safe to say that few outside of his firm of brokers, had any proper conception of the magnitude of the stock market coups that were essayed by the general manager.

Played For Huge Stakes.
Up till the end, or within a few weeks of it, McGill continued to play for huge stakes, as shown by the August and September statements of Charles Head & Co., submitted as evidence in court by Hon. A. B. Morine, acting for the Bankers' Association. It may have been desperation, or it may have been cold calculation and cool nerve, but at any rate, the results were fairly staggering.

On Aug. 2 last, through Head & Co., securities to the par value of \$1,105,553.14 were bought by McGill's orders. The amount of margin advanced or applied from other stocks or bonds held by the firm was not shown, but must needs have been a substantial sum.

Figures Tell Own Tales.
The statements told their own tale. Besides the huge sum above mentioned, here are other typical entries of purchases:
Aug. 6, \$873,393.75, Aug. 23, \$221,643, Aug. 24, \$183,900, Aug. 27, \$92,450, Aug. 28, \$444,250, Aug. 29, \$214,383.75, Aug. 29, \$203,150, Aug. 30, \$490,800, Aug. 30, \$111,925.

Following are some of the sales of blocks of stock, as recorded: Aug. 2, \$361,197, Aug. 3, \$326,898, Aug. 6, \$731,884, Aug. 20, \$299,740, Aug. 23, \$465,383, Sept. 4, \$392,510, Sept. 11, \$124,000, Sept. 13, \$142,555, Sept. 14, \$189,270, \$1,391,810.16 in Securities.

The August statement showed securities carried to the amount of \$1,391,810.16, comprising no less than 20 different kinds of stocks. By the end of September, through a process of unloading, the holdings were reduced to \$689,042.70.

As a matter of fact, there is an asset of from \$70,000 to \$80,000 in securities carried by Head & Co. for the bank, or rather for McGill, in whose name the account appeared. This information, which should prove interesting to shareholders, was obtained from A. D. Braithwaite of the Bank of Montreal, who has charge of Ontario Bank affairs. His visit to New York in search of assets resulted in the discovery that there would probably be a surplus of that amount from the account after realizing on the securities held by that firm, and that the surplus from Cuyler, Morgan & Co. would probably be about \$15,000.

A \$100,000 Asset.
Thus, there is an asset of from \$90,000 to \$100,000. The other accounts, those of Marshall, Spader & Co., Randolph & Co., and Thomas Denny & Co., have, apparently, been wiped out.

WHERE MONEY CAME FROM.
Man Arrested in New York Took It From Employer.
Brampton, Nov. 21.—On Friday of last week Charles Douglas, employed by Joseph Akitt of Inglewood, de-camped with \$400 of his employer's money. Douglas left the house ostensibly to attend a threshing. Nothing was thought of his non-appearance at night until Mr. Akitt missed the money on Saturday morning.

A warrant was issued for Douglas' arrest, and on Monday he was arrested in New York on a charge of assaulting a policeman. His description tallied with that of the missing man, and a large sum of money was found on him. He will be brought back to Ontario.


G.T.P. DOCK COLLAPSES.

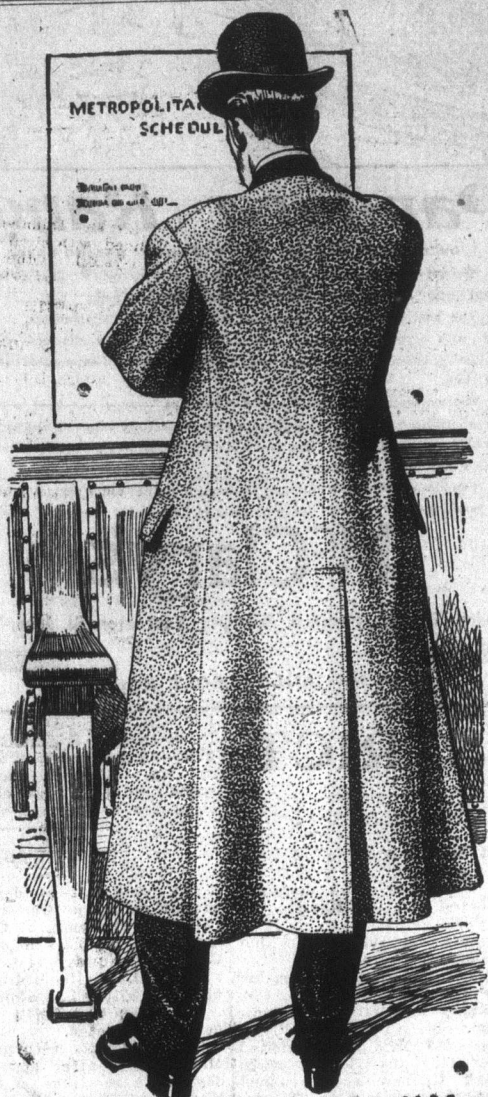

TOWNSHIP COUNCIL

RALEIGH COUNCIL.

The above council met pursuant to the call of the Reeve on the 12th day of November with all members present.

Reeve Purser, of Dover, addressed the council in reference to the flooding of the low lands of Raleigh, T. L. and Dover by the river and asked that the various municipalities interested appoint a deputations to procure assistance from the Ontario Government to either embank the river or to make a cut-off above Chatham to divert the waters to the lake. The Reeve was appointed to look after the interests of Raleigh.

T. Montgomery wanted the Chinnick ditch under the D. & W. C. repaired or diverted and the council to do the township's portion.

A notice was received from Chas. Doyle for the council to repair the

township's part of the Lowney ditch.

An application was received from Ward Stanworth, solicitor for the Symmes & Coste Gas Co. to lay pipe lines along the highways in Raleigh.

A petition was received from John Sewell and others for the council to take action to compel the railway companies to repair the approaches to their railway crossings the highway in this township.

James Blythe applied for a permit to erect and keep a slaughter house on lot 22, concession 2, E. B. Grant.

E. W. Seal presented a petition from Andrew J. Crow and others for the council to repeal the local option by-law.

Moved by Wellwood and Sykes, that a by-law now in force be submitted to the electors at the next municipal elections and the Reeve and Clerk are hereby instructed to take the necessary proceedings to submit the same.

On motion of Mr. Sykes, the by-law was given its first and second

readings and provisionally adopted.

The report of A. McDonnell, C. E., for proposed construction of the Lumbe drain was read and considered.

Thos. Brown, Mrs. Wm. Shaw and Mrs. J. H. Fields withdrew their names from the petition, which left it in a minority, and the proposed work was abandoned.

The report of A. Baird, C. E., for the improvement of the R. & T. town line north of Jeannette's Creek and the Pike and Dauphin drainage schemes was received and read.

After the matter was considered by those present the report was adopted on motion of Sykes and Wellwood.

Engineer's account re the same of \$218 and \$17 for assistance in survey was ordered paid.

Moved by Wellwood and Sykes, that the commissioner of No. 1 drainage be instructed to repair the drains and report.

Moved by Sykes and Shreeve, that the Clerk notify Messrs. Symmes & Coste that the council will not accept

clause six of the agreement as drafted by their solicitor.

Moved by Sykes and Shreeve, that the Reeve be authorized to take the necessary legal steps to compel the railway companies to repair their crossings at highways.

A by-law appointing deputy returning officers was passed.

A number of accounts were ordered passed.

CHURCH BURNS MORTGAGE

Ridgetown, Nov. 20.—An important event in the history of the Regular Baptist church took place last night, when the "burning of the mortgage" was celebrated. Mrs. D. Watterworth, the only member of the church now living in town, who was here when the congregation was formed, applied the torch to the parchment, which had held the church in bondage.

The Regular Baptist church was organized in December, 1873. A chapel, presenting quite an imposing appearance, was built and dedicated in 1875. The membership of the church increased in the first six years from 17 to 87, and the present membership is 143.

Some five years ago the church was rebuilt, and the denomination now have one of the most modern and convenient places of worship in these parts, and the burning of the mortgage stamps the congregation as being progressive and earnest workers.

EVIDENCE ALL IN

Magistrate Says Enough to Send London Men Accused of Conspiracy to Bribe For Trial.

Toronto, Nov. 22.—All the evidence in the London election conspiracy case in the Police Court was concluded yesterday morning, after several witnesses had been called, and a further adjournment was made till Monday for argument.

Magistrate Denison said that, in his opinion, there was sufficient evidence to send the accused quartette, O'Gorman, Mulloy, Wiley and Reid, to trial.

Saw Nothing Illegal.
M. C. Franklin was a deputy returning officer in the Comstock-White election in Brockville, but there had been nothing illegal in his poll, nor had anyone posted him. F. E. Fairbairn, a Liberal scrutineer from Brockville, gave almost similar evidence. H. B. White, a poll clerk, had seen nothing happen out of the ordinary.

Walter Leonard of London was a voter in the Hyman-Gray general election. He had been approached by a stranger in Lewis' hotel who had offered him five dollars for his vote, but he did not take it.

All Were Strangers.
Edgar J. Saunders, a London Liberal, thought that William Alister was Chapman in Ward Four. He had not met two Ottawa workers, Le Blanc and Forbes.

"Did you hold an envelope?"
"Not to my knowledge."

Then the witness said that a big envelope had been left at his house. He had opened this envelope and found it contained three others.

"Did anyone call for these?"
"Yes, three strangers."

"Did you know their names?"
"No; they were strangers to me."

Saunders did not know what the smaller envelopes had contained. This finished the evidence.

Enough Evidence For Trial.
Incidentally the Magistrate remarked afterwards: "Having heard this evidence, I think there has been sufficient to send the defendants to trial."

Mr. Curry said that, in respect to Mr. Reid, it seemed there was no evidence to convict him with any conspiracy.

"I won't say there's enough to convict, but enough to send up for trial," remarked his Worship.

"Collins and Pritchett are practically the only witnesses who have implicated Reid directly," continued Mr. Curry.

It was agreed that argument should be heard next Monday.

CARUSO IN POLICE COURT

New York, N. Y., Nov. 21.—Enrico Caruso, the great Italian tenor, faced an audience of 601 persons in the Yorkville Police Court to-day and tried to get away with it. He had not made good advances to a woman in the money house in Central Park last Friday. He declared that his arrest was due to pique upon the part of a woman who described herself as "Graham," and because he failed to respond to advances which she made to him.

Mrs. Graham was not present to press the charge which she lodged against the singer and the police officers.

GOOD PAVING CROPS

Blenheim, Nov. 20.—Tobacco buyers have been here this week getting a line on the size and quality of the crop, and incidentally buying a few lots. The price will not be quite so high as last year, the average being between seven and eight cents per pound. It is a good paying crop at that price, however, and often yields \$1,000 per acre.

RICH STRIKE AT TILBURY

Tilbury, Nov. 21.—The well on the Lesperance farm, one mile south of here, is likely to prove a rich find. Operators are working night and day. The well on the James Rose farm, however, has proven a failure, and the operators are removing their machinery. This makes the fourth failure in the Tilbury field.
