1913 Traffic Census of Concrete Roads in Wayne County, Michigan

This census was taken on the six main thoroughfares, which are built of concrete, leading into Detroit, for seven consecutive days of 24 hours each, in August and September, 1913.

The table shows, for all kinds of vehicles, a gross total of 97,000, of which 33,835, or 35 per cent., were horse drawn, and 63,165, or 65 per cent., were power driven.

These figures indicate that the concrete road has the ability to stand up, without serious disintegration, under the terrific strain of a great amount of traffic on the Country Road, which equals, if not exceeds, the amount of traffic per foot of width, on many city streets.
