

The Poultry Raiser's Opportunity
From present indications Great Britain will require all the eggs and poultry Canada can produce during 1916. The annually high prices prevailing for eggs at the present time are largely due to the anticipated export demand. Prices for poultry are also high, and will likely continue so. Last fall and winter all the surplus Canadian poultry was exported at highly profitable prices.
Now is the time, by hatching everything possible in the month of May to guard against the marking of a deranged poultry which annually becomes a drag on the market in the fall of the year.
Given their proportionate amount of attention the growing of poultry brings quick and profitable returns to the farmer. With the increasing cost of meats, milk, butter, etc., there is a constantly increasing demand for poultry and eggs. The labour problem is not critical, as the boys and girls on the farm can readily take care of the poultry. The cost of feed is nominal, prices for poultry and eggs are high—the highest, in fact, for many years. It is obvious, therefore, that Canadians have a patriotic as well as an economic duty to perform in making the year 1916 the banner year for poultry production in Canada.

Forests As Tax-Payers.
MUNICIPAL FORESTS ARE SWITZERLAND'S REVENUE PRODUCERS
The Nidwald, or city forest of Zurich, Switzerland adds to the town's revenues \$20 per acre a year reducing the amount needed to be raised through taxation by more than \$35,000.
In Canada, there are no municipal forests, though the forests on Crown lands are a source of large revenue, particularly to the provincial governments. Too frequently, however, forests have been regarded merely as a source of immediate revenue, with out sufficient provisions for making the revenue perpetual, adequate fire protection and the control of methods of cutting calculated to restore the forest after cutting.

A Wonderful City in Galicia
In Galicia there is one of the most remarkable underground cities in the world. It has a population of over 1,000 men, women and children, most of whom have never seen the light of day. It is known as the City of the Salt Mines, and is situated several hundred feet below the earth's surface. There is the greatest salt mine in the world, and though it has been mined for many generations, the supply seems inexhaustible. The city has its town hall, church, theatre, and assembly room, all made from the crystal and rock salt. It has long wide streets and big squares lighted with electricity. There are numerous instances of families in this underground city where not a single individual in three or four generations has seen the sun.
Daylight Saving for Britain
There now seem to be little doubt that Great Britain will follow the example of Holland and adopt the daylight saving system. Premier Asquith has promised to give a day for discussion of the question in the House of Commons, while Mr. Secretary Samuel has written a long letter for publication strongly recommending the idea on the ground that it would be an important saving in fuel and illuminants.

Editorial Brevities.

The dye problem in Japan, where the people are especially fond of bright colors, is even more acute than in this country.

No man finds tax paying a pleasant or easy task, but no man should seek to evade payment of a fair and reasonable proportion of his citizenship obligations.

A decided increase in back-yard gardening is noticeable in our community this spring. Nearly all the householders have been busy with the spade and hoe.

For the past eight months Nova Scotia has contributed 12,141 volunteers for military service. They are divided as follows: Cape Breton, 2,141; Halifax, 2,012; Pictou, 1,766; Cumberland, 1,220; Lunenburg, 699; Colchester, 656; Yarmouth, 499; Kings, 489; Annapolis, 414; Hants, 398; Digby, 394; Antigonish, 311; Queens, 227; Inverness, 249; Shelburne, 215; Guysboro, 130; Victoria, 84; Richmond, 51.

There has been a great improvement made in the appearance of private premises in all directions during the past few weeks, which is very commendable. The public clean-up which the town authorities promised has not yet materialized.

If there is anyone in Canada who is not bearing some share of the burden of the wide world war, in which the very life and fabric of our empire and dominion are at stake, he is not worthy of the name he bears or of the country of which he is a citizen.

With the Allies.

A Chicago paper says:—Six thousand men from the United States are now fighting with the Allies, and new recruits are reaching Canadian enlistment centres from this side of the border every day.

Peace Talk.

The answer Great Britain will give to any peace proposals put forward on Germany's behalf was clearly indicated in the speech of the Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, Lord Robert Cecil: 'We drew the sword unwillingly, we shall sheathe it gladly. But we should be untrue to our trust, if we should be betraying civilization, if we abandoned our task until we have re-established in Europe the supremacy of law, the sanctity of treaties and the right of all nations, great and small, to live their lives, to fulfil their destinies, free from the intolerable menace of Prussian militarism.'

This British statement, clearly intended to be read as the official reply to the peace hints in Germany's note to America, may be regarded as expressing not alone the attitude of Great Britain, but the attitude of all Great Britain's allies as well. The Entente Powers are ready for peace at any time, but the demand for peace must come from Germany and must be expressed in terms which will leave no doubt about the issues of the war.

Agricultural Aid From Ottawa.

A striking fact brought out by the Conservatives in the Assembly during the discussion of the agricultural estimates was the magnitude of the Borden Government's aid to agriculture in Nova Scotia. The Dominion Department of Agriculture is doing vastly more for the development of farming in Nova Scotia than has ever been attempted by the best government.

Under the Borden agricultural aid bill of 1912, the Borden government is assisting agriculture in every province by generous money grants entrusted to the local governments to be spent in scientific instruction and the development of modern methods of farming.

In the last two years the 'Dominion Aid' to agriculture is included. Last year the total spent out of provincial revenue for agriculture was \$92,513, being slightly less than half the amount spent in this province on the same service by the Dominion Government.

From a perusal of these figures will be seen the enormous development of agricultural aid work in Nova Scotia since the advent of the Borden government to office in 1911. The expenditure on agriculture the last year the liberals held office at Ottawa was less than \$40,000. In 1914 after three years of the vigorous forward policy of Sir Robert Borden, it had risen to more than four times that amount, and it continues to increase from year to year.

Production to Capacity.

Is the farmer justified in believing that the firm tone of the horse market and the present high prices for live stock rest upon a secure foundation? May he look forward with any confidence to the next season's or next year's market? Should he prepare, as against an advertised shortage and high prices for all classes of farm animals, by breeding a larger number of mares or of cows, sheep, hogs and poultry? We are confident that the farmer has never been in a more secure position than the present, as regards the extension of his breeding operations, but to enable him to form more easily his own conclusions, the following facts are submitted:

HORSES

Since the outbreak of the war, the British Remount Commission has purchased in Canada 15,000 horses. 8,000 have been bought by French contractors and 25,000 by the Canadian Department of Militia. The Department of Militia is now engaged in buying an additional thousand head. The British Remount Commission has purchased over 700 since March and is buying daily. The Montreal French contractors are anxious to obtain supplies and are arranging to buy all that are available both in the East and in the West. It is understood that, as a result of the purchases already made, army buyers are finding it increasingly difficult, both in United States and in Canada, to readily secure the number of horses which they require, particularly of the type suitable for heavy cavalry or heavy artillery.

In addition to the purchases for army account, commercial activity from two distinct quarters has exerted a very evident influence upon the Canadian horse market during the past three or four months. Since the beginning of the year, 6,000 horses reached the Winnipeg Stock Yards from Eastern Canada and 5,917 were shipped from the same yard westward, mostly to Saskatchewan. During the months of January, February and March, 18.5 horses were exported to the United States. A few hundred more went forward to the same market in April. The horses exported were good farm chunks weighing from 1,300 to 1,500 lbs. As high as \$300.00 a pair was paid for animal-possessing extra quality and conformation. This new movement in the horse market is having its effect upon prices all over Canada.

Buyers report that the better classes of drafters and farm chunks are getting scarce and hard to buy. The same holds true of good roadsters and saddlers. The noticeable scarcity of good horses of these descriptions illustrates the fact that demand has already overtaken supply and makes it very evident that all the really good sound mares in the country should breed this year. It is not too strongly emphasized, however, that they should be mated only with strictly high class sires. The number of horses rejected by army buyers clearly indicates that there is no place for the unsound horse or for the milfit. Such animals have been, and now and always will be a drag on the market. Breed to the best if you would have the best. Unsound or malformed mares are just as bad as unsound stallions. It is easier to raise a good animal than a poor one. Manage the work this spring in order that the best mare on the farm may be regularly returned to the horse. Next year a good crop of sound, healthy colts will be as good as a bank account. Canada is likely to enter shortly the commercial export market and that market will require all you can produce.

Federated Boards of Trade.

On May 15th a meeting was held in Harris' Hall, Kentville, for the purpose of organizing a "Federated Board of Trade" for the western counties of Nova Scotia. The various local Boards of Trade were represented by their respective delegates. Those present seemed to think the scheme a good one and likely to be useful to the best interests of the country. A set of rules and by-laws was drawn up to be submitted for approval to the various local boards after which it would be possible to get the organization in a working condition. The secretary of the meeting was instructed to send particulars of the proceedings of the meeting to all the boards not represented there by delegate.
