New York, Feb. 15, p. m. A conductor of a Horse Car in this city while drunk this morning, stabbed three of his passengers.

The Post says a despatch was received from Washington to-day, revoking the Executive of Esteban Rogers as Consul to Chili.

The trial of Senor MacKenna on a charge of sending torpedoes to Chili, commenced to-day. Gold 137 5-8.

New York, Feb. 15, p. m. Steamship Bremen with dates to the 31st has arrived.

The Sunday Gazette says the first reading of the Reform Bill will not be moved before Easter, and more probably not before the re-assembly of the House after the holidays.

Government has issued another proclamation, offering \$300 pounds for Stephen's capture.

An additional seizure of 50 rifles and bayonets had been made at Dundalk.

Intelligence that Chandler's motion was negatived in the United States Senate, in reference to the Alabama claims, and the recall of the American Minister, had no effect or change.

The French official Yellow Book, containing despatches to the Washington Cabinet on the Mexican question is published.

The Emperor and Empress of Austria are visiting Pesth. They were enthusiastically received.

The Spanish Ministry have assented to the introduction of a bill in the Senate, in favor of the Pope's temporal power.

The Spanish Minister and Consul to Peru have returned to St. Nazaire.

Intelligence from Lima announces that diplomatic relations are interrupted between Spain and Peru.

Several vessels bearing Chilean colors had appeared off Valparaiso, pursuing Spanish shipping. They are supposed to be pirates under cover of the Chilean flag.

The Norway Chamber has rejected, by a majority of two, an amendment to the Constitution proposing annual Parliament.

Breadstuffs dull and lower. Provisions steady. Consols 86 1-8 a 87. U. S. 5 20's 66 1-4.

New York, Feb. 17, p. m. City of London, dates 1st inst., has arrived. The Fenian commission was still progressing, it was learned that Parliament would be asked to suspend the Habeas Corpus so that the Government power could deal with foreign conspirators.

Additional rewards have been offered for information leading to the capture of Stephens.

Another regiment had embarked at Liverpool for Dublin.

It was officially announced from Vienna that the negotiations for the formation of a new corps of Austrian Volunteers for Mexico would shortly be brought to a conclusion.

The reported appearance of Chilean Privateers off the Spanish coast excites attention. No ravages are reported.

The steam ram detained in the Thames river, was found to have been built for the Peruvian Government, and was allowed to depart on the 27th.

Another steam ram built by the Lairds for Peru, recently left Liverpool, and was at Brest, where the Patrie says she will be detained until the Spanish difficulties with Peru are adjusted.

Rumor connects these two vessels with designs against Spain. It is reported that Spain has down vessels building in England, and is hurrying their completion.

RAILROAD PETITION. A Petition for the Railroad is being signed in Prince County—it goes on to say:—

"That Prince Edward Island, from its position, its rich and easily cultivated soil, its inexhaustible fisheries, and the enterprise and intelligence of its people, must keep pace with her sister Provinces in all the great improvements of the day."

"That the neighboring provinces having, some years ago entered into the construction of Railroads, are now engaged in lengthening and extending them in many directions, inviting as it were the co-operation of this Island."

"That the opening up of Railroads, wherever effected, has ever been found to tend to progress, advancement and prosperity,—that such benefits and enjoyments, your petitioners believe, are in store for this Island, were a Railroad constructed through its length, enabling it to spring into new life, opening up her agriculture to an extent never imagined, and making her one with the great and magnificent continent of America."

In view of these things, your petitioners approach your Excellency, in Council, respectfully asking your Excellency and Council to bestow on this momentous project a serious and favorable consideration."

On the first of January the following important modifications of the Imperial Post office regulations took effect.—Letters from the United Kingdom to the Colonies, including Canada, will be charged one rate for each half ounce, one ounce and not exceeding one and a half, three rates; if exceeding two ounces and a half, five rates; and so on. Patterns of intrinsic value may now be sent to the United Kingdom by parcel post; this regulation includes numerous articles hitherto prohibited, if securely packed. This is a great boon, as numerous articles not dutiable may now be sent cheaply and expeditiously from here. Ladies may send presents of fancy work to their friends in Great Britain.

In May last the corner stone of a new Roman Catholic Cathedral was laid in Pekin. It is to be of magnificent dimensions—three hundred feet long and one hundred and fifty feet in breadth, to the front of the transept. Its spire will overtop the loftiest of the palaces of the Imperial city.
