THE GRIT PRESS AND THE FISHERY COMMISSION.

The conduct of the Opposition press since the meeting in Washington, of the Commissioners appointed to take into consideration the questions in dispute between Canada and the United States, clearly shows that the opponents of the Canadian Government are much concerned lest an amicable adjustment of these important matters may be arrived at.

A recent dispatch of the 5th inst. says: "A terrible explosion occurred at St. John's just before daylight this morning. An engine with cars attached and was on the main track waiting for orders to proceed to Westville, and while the conductor and driver were in the station the boiler of the locomotive exploded, killing three men, A. Fraser, of Acadia Mines, Daniel Robertson, of Acadia Mines, and another man, and injuring several others.
