(Saturday, Dec. 19.) Dr. Alex. Campbell, sworn, examned by Dr. Lloyd, is a medical practitioner and Port Physician. Witness

pital, while those who were in suitable condition were placed in quarters specially fitted in the Seamen's Institute, and all were attended to by

physicians and nurses. Lists were prepared and identification of bodies carried out. Witness found that generally, the big, robust men were

amongst the dead, whilst the weakerlooking were with the survivors. It was found that some men, whose habits were known to be irregular, and who might be expected to suc-

cumb to exposure, were amongst the

most vigorous of the survivors. Wit-

ness had considered various circum-

stances from data supplied by sur-

vivors, and formed the opinion that

the men who kept together in shel-

ters, taking moderate exercise, fared

best. This was exemplified by the

experience of Arthur Mouland's

watch. Mouland built an ice shelter, behind which he kept his men, being

careful that they did not separate.

Of 40 men, who comprised this watch,

only 6 or 7 perished. Most of the men

in the opinion of the witness, died of

sheer exhaustion. Having kept mov-

ing vigorously, they became tired out,

and when they lay down, soon died.

The case was cited of two men among

the most vigorous, physically, who

were in good form, and wrestled for

the exercise only three hours before

they died. In the opinion of witness

many of the men who died were not

frozen to death, but succumbed to ex-

haustion or shock. Witness further

thought that the clothing worn was

unsuitable, and that some regulation

was desirable in this respect. He did

not consider hard bread and butter

suitable food for men engaged in such

strenuous work. Some thought was

necessary to determine a proper food

regulation. Men should be required

to have their properly prepared meals

each day. Bread and tea is poor food

unsuited to men engaged in the seal-

Witness detailed the story of work

performed amongst survivors, by him

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
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
