"Act" is the manner in which some of the doctors have been abusing the privileges allowed them in prescribing alcohol. It is stated on good authority that some of the doctors with the largest practices do not use five gallons per year, while other doctors, who think more of the dollars which the prescription brings them than of the morals of the community, require puncheons, and openly boast that the law allows them to do as they please

Many remedies to cure this evil, which is growing in magnitude, are suggested. The most popular is the limitation of the amount of alcohol to be at the disposal of each doctor for 12 months. In arriving at the amount necessary for each doctor it would be fair to eliminate the half dozen doctors who have converted their surgeries into miniature saloons and be guided by the average quantity used by the other 115 doctors who are conducting a legitimate practice. The books of the Controller should supply this information.
