

# Notice to Flour Importers

All Importers of Flour into Newfoundland are required to obtain permits for same from the Newfoundland Food Control Board at their office in the Justice Department.

Written applications for permits must cover the following information:-

1. Quantity of Flour.

2. Quality of Flour, whether pre-war (white) or Canadian Government Standard.

3. Where purchased, and from whom. 4. Date of Shipment.

In cases where the tax of two dollars (\$2.00) imposed on January sixth by the Canadian Wheat Board has actually been paid, the Board is prepared to present any claims to the Canadian Wheat Board if any difficulty is met with in the refund of same.

Flour can now be purchased by Importers on terms of shipment within sixty days.



### The First Plebiscite.

Schleswig-Holstein, until the signature of the Peace Treaty, a Province of Prussia, lies between the North Sea and the Bakic. Schleswig was annexed to Denmark in the 11th century, and later became an independent state under Danish suzerainty. At the end of the 14th century it was attached to Holstein. In the years 1848-50 it unsuccessfully rebelled against from Denmark by Austria and Prussia in 1864. In 1866 Prussia defeated Austria, and the former absorbed the two duchies. Kiel, Germany's chief naval station on the Baltic Sea, is a town of the province. The inhabitants are more or less Danish in their manners and customs, and were uncomfortable and discontented under the rale of Germany.

Coaker, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, from Alicante, advising the Advisory Board to strongly urge the Trade to place what cargoes that are now at Oporto or Gibraltar in the hands of Messrs. Hawes & Co., Ltd., to do the best possible as to the disposal of some, owing to the unsatisfactory conditions of the Spanish and Portuguese markets, and strongly advises to cease sending further cargoes to these two markets during the next month or two.

The disposal of cargoes placed in the hands of Messrs. Hawes & Co., Ltd., to the Italian Consorzio, in Mr. Coaker's opinion, is by far the most profitable way of disposing of fish at the present time.

This information, coming from the reliable source of Mr. Coaker, who is now in the market, the Trade can appreciate, and the Advisory Board strongly urges that they co-operate in this matter.

It is further suggested that proposed shippers will have their Charter Parties so arranged that they will be in a position to have their vessels, if necessary, diverted to Italy.


