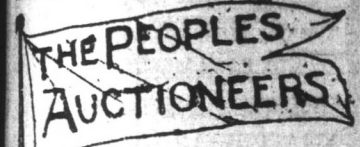

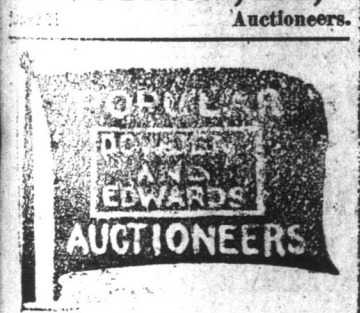

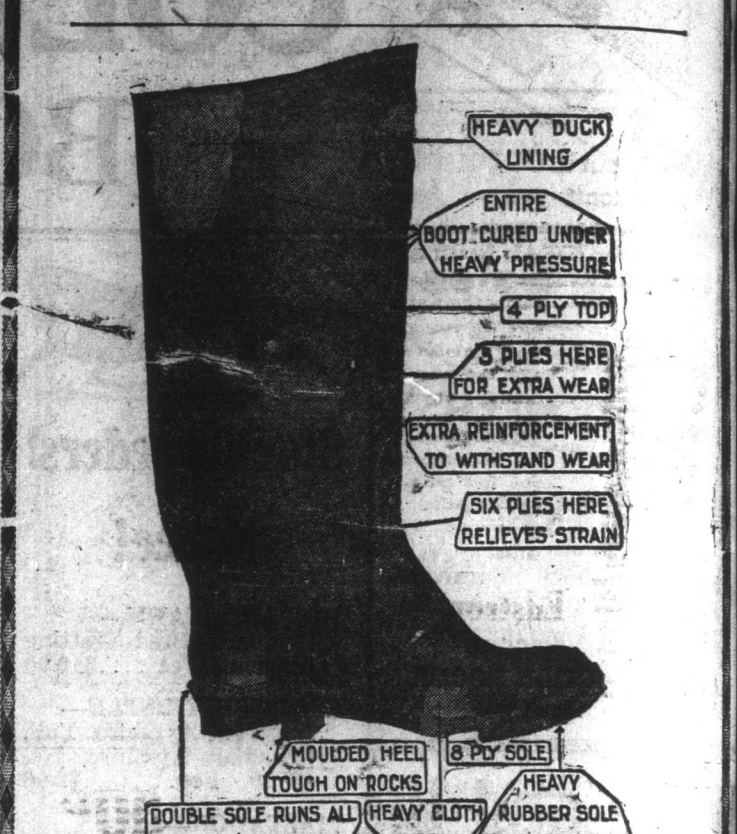

White and Blacks Wage War in Oklahoma.

Race Riots on Large Scale--Quebec Paper Mills Restart--Situation Serious in Mesopot--Bandsmen Blown up by Mines.

MEN AND BOYS MURDERED. DUBLIN, June 1. Military headquarters here issued statement last evening that rebels had exploded a sand mine under the hand of the Home Guard Regiment, as it was playing at the ranges near Youghall yesterday morning. Six persons were killed, including two boys and a thousand negroes were wounded, five seriously. Four of the wounded were band boys.

FATAL RACE RIOTING. TULSA, OKLA., June 1. Continuous gunfire broke out shortly after daylight near the negro quarter of Tulsa, the scene of all night disturbances, in which hundreds of white men and negroes took part, which resulted in the death and wounding of an unknown number of persons, and the calling out of Oklahoma national guard units to put down the disorder. Firing came from a spot where, throughout the early morning hours, five hundred white men and a thousand negroes lined each other across the railroad tracks. As dawn broke sixty or seventy motor cars filled with armed white men formed a circle around the negro section. A half dozen airplanes circled overhead. A party of white firemen was reported to be firing into the negroes who were being into houses.

SILICIA NOW. CONSTANTINOPLE, June 1. Guerrilla warfare between French and Turkish Nationalists has been reported in Silicia. The Turks are preparing to recapture the city of Antioch.

IN MESOPOTAMIA. WASHINGTON, June 1. The situation of the British forces in Mesopotamia was reported to-day as official circles to increasingly unstable. According to latest reports it was represented that the British were faced with the necessity either of withdrawing the country or of adding reserves to the forces already there.

G.T.R. NOW GOVERNMENT OWNED. OTTAWA, June 1. Sir Henry Drayton, Finance Minister, announced last steps for the transfer of control of the Grand Trunk Railway Company to the Dominion of Canada, and interest due on the Grand Trunk Pacific Bonds, amounting to one-half million, due April 1, will now be paid.

BREAK IN PAPER STRIKE. QUEBEC, June 1. The strike at the Jonquiere and Kesogami plants of Price Brothers, pulp and paper manufacturers, has been ended by the employees, who accepted the firm's offer of twenty per cent. cut in wages and other terms. The two mills employ about twelve hundred men.

COAL NEGOTIATIONS. LONDON, June 1. Indications point to general rejection of the Government's new proposals in connection with coal settlement. In a statement, however, Frank Hodges, Secretary of the Miners' Union, virtually offers to drop the pool idea, which, heretofore, has prevented a settlement, provided the owners are willing to offer a higher wage standard. He suggests eighty per cent. above the 1919 scale, to which the owners are not likely to agree.

RAILWAY WAGES CUT. CHICAGO, June 1. It is estimated that four hundred

million dollars will be slashed from the railway wage bill of the United States, when the order for cutting wages, on an average of twelve per cent., to be handed down to-morrow by the United States Railway Labor Board, becomes effective. The order affects members of thirty-one labor organizations employed by one hundred and four railways.

COAL STRIKE WEAKENING. LONDON, June 1. (By Canadian Associated Press.)—Premier Lloyd George's emphatic denial that compulsion had been hinted in connection with the miners' strike, was accepted to-day by Frank Hodges, leader of the Miners, who, however, declared that such was the impression gained. If the impression was wrong, he said, he was glad to be corrected. Good temper in the miners' ranks, says the Chancellor, but the Miners' District Councils continue to record decisions against the Government's plans. Nevertheless in dictations are increasing a possible approach between the miners and mine owners. Sir Robert Horne, Chancellor of the Exchequer, has made an important statement, drawing attention to the fact that wages are so high that, even with the proposed cuts, they would be quite equal to the present cost of living. Increased output, says the Chancellor, is the crux of the whole situation. Especially important is the withdrawal by the Railway and Transport Workers of the ban on imported coal. The embargo has never been really effective and was still less popular with those expected to work it, and yesterday's withdrawal of a similar prohibition by locomotive workers, has cut the feet from under the Unions. Lord Gainsford, a prominent mine owner, declares that the owners are always ready to meet the men and discuss wages. They would also meet them to discuss general principles of national character, but, as to the application of such principles they would prefer to meet by districts.

THE TULSA HORROR. TULSA, Okla., June 1. Race riots here to-day resulted in the death of eighty or more persons, including nine white and the injury of scores of others, according to estimates by the police, and in the destruction of ten blocks of homes in the negro quarter. Despite pleading of the Tulsa Municipal Law, desultory firing continued during the afternoon. But the city, this evening, was comparatively quiet. Four companies of National Guards, under Adjutant-General Barrest, are on duty. The reported death list grew all day. At noon the chief of police notified Governor Robertson at Oklahoma city that the total was seventy-five. In one settlement Major Charles W. Daley of the Police Department put the figure at 175, saying he believed many negroes had been burned to death in their homes. Nine white men are known to have been killed. The trouble is declared to have started, last night, from the arrest of a negro charged with attacking an orphan white girl and subsequent attempts of negroes to rescue the arrested man.

THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS. LONDON, June 1. The Committee on Amendments to the covenant of the League of Nations, which held its first meeting in Geneva on April 6, resumed its session in London to-day. Its program includes proposed alterations of ten articles of the covenant submitted by eleven nations, members of League. The League, under the Presidency of Mr. A. J. Balfour, are expected to continue a week.

SHIPPING NOTES. Schooner Cecil Jr., 20 days from Gibraltar arrived yesterday with salt to a Kean. Schooner May sailed for Sydney yesterday to load coal for this port. Schooner M. M. Gardner sailed for Sydney in ballast yesterday. S.S. William Palmer finished discharging her coal cargo yesterday and sailed for Gaspe at 6 p.m. The U.S. destroyer Breckinridge berthed at Messrs. Job Bros'. South side premises yesterday where she takes on board a supply of fuel oil. The ship will probably sail to-night.

Annual Meeting W.M.S. HELD AT CARBONEAR. The sixth annual meeting of the Nfld. Branch of the Women's Missionary Society opened in the Carbonear Methodist Church on Tuesday, May 31st, at 5 p.m. Mrs. (Rev.) Storey presiding. After the devotional exercises the roll was called and responded to by 53 officers and delegates, the largest on record. Mrs. (Rev.) Robb, on behalf of the Carbonear Auxiliary, extended a very hearty welcome to all delegates and friends, which was replied to by Mrs. (Rev.) Bennett. Greetings were received from the Nova Scotia Branch now in session, from Mrs. (Rev.) Payne, now residing in Ottawa, and Miss Irene Winsor, our missionary candidate at college. Our missionary, Miss Wagg, from West Canada, was introduced to the branch; also Mrs. (Rev.) L. Davies, President of the Canno, N.S., Auxiliary, formerly one of our Carbonear members. Both replied very fittingly. A solo was very sweetly rendered by Miss Mary Duff, after which a paper was read by Mrs. (Rev.) Blount, entitled, "The Delegates—What she brings, receives and gives." This was a very excellent paper and delighted the hearers. 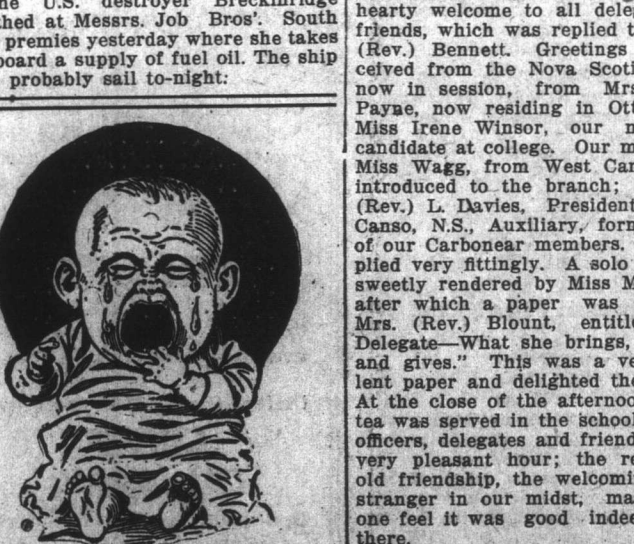

DO YOU BICYCLE? In a sample copy of an accident insurance policy which an insidious insurance agent has insinuated into our home, there is this question: "Do you ever engage in motor-cycling or aerob-nautics?" The combination of those two sports, is interesting and suggestive, isn't it?

And don't you think it would be a good idea if the Insurance Company added "or do you habitually bicycle on auto roads where there is a great deal of auto traffic?"

I Love Cyclists, Except— I think this revival of bicycling is a splendid thing. It is a healthful sport; without the expenditure of more money than can be afforded it makes it possible to get out into the woods and fields; it bridges distances between friends that could not easily be walked. I am happy to note that young and old are adopting this means of getting about. I love to see them bowling along the road, except when I am in a machine and a new rider takes to wobbling about uncertainly in front of me. I have heard half a dozen drivers

of automobiles already speak of their fear of the cyclist both for his sake and theirs. Other Lives Than His Own Risked. For the cyclist who wobbles about uncertainly in front of an automobile, or shoots incautiously out from some driveway into an auto road, risks not only his life but the life of the people in the machine. The nearest I ever came to being killed was when a young boy shot out on a bicycle from an invisible wood path and we took the ditch to save him. We all but turned turtle and there were four people in the car. Unless there is something done to make the cyclists realize the risks they run and cause, I am afraid there are going to be a good many accidents this summer. This is a chance for a safety first—and always—campaign.

Cautions the Careful Mother Will Take. The wise mother will make sure that her children can ride without falling off before she lets them go out on main highways. She will also try to prevent them from going on the roads where there are steady streams of automobiles. And she will caution them against the danger of shooting out of an invisible path at any time. And the wise grown up will enforce the same rules on himself.

OVERTAXING CIVIL SERVANTS.

Resolutions affecting the reduction of salaries of Civil Service officials were introduced in the House of Assembly on Tuesday, and their contents published in the daily press yesterday. The more these resolutions are examined the more harshly are they found to bear on all civil service men receiving salaries from nineteen dollars and fifty cents per annum, up to twelve hundred dollars per annum. It might be suggested that there are no officials on the Civil list in receipt of such an infinitesimal sum as nineteen dollars and fifty cents yearly, but it will probably surprise a good many people to know that this munificent stipend is paid eighteen outposts Newfoundland and Labrador Postmasters, while eight are in receipt of the lavish annual allowance of twenty dollars. There may be more, but pity forbids us to mention the names and offices of these twenty-six martyrs of the Public Service. Other small salaried men in the Postal Department are in receipt of annual sums of from twenty-four dollars and thirty-eight cents to thirty-six dollars and forty cents, and so on, ranging up in the lower hundreds. And these men are going to be subjected to a straight cut of one-tenth of their miserable pittance on a ministerial plea of economy.

The resolutions give notice that from the first day of July, 1921 there shall be deducted from the salaries of all persons in the public service of the Colony (this does not include school teachers):

- (a) 10 per centum of all salaries up to and including \$500; and in addition thereto.
(b) 15 per centum of the amount by which a salary exceeds \$500 and up to \$1,000;
(c) 20 per centum by which a salary exceeds \$1,000.

In other words an official receiving \$500 gets a 10 per cent, straight cut, the sum of which is \$50, reducing his salary to \$450. Those in receipt of \$1,000 are mulcted ten per cent, on the first \$500 and fifteen per cent, on the second half thousand, a reduction of \$125, equal to twelve and one half per cent. A \$1,500 official is reduced by 10 per cent, on the first \$500; 15 per cent, on the second, and twenty per cent, on the third, a total cut of \$225 or equivalent to 15 per cent, straight. The \$2,000 salary is reduced by \$325 or 15 1/4 per cent, and the \$3,000 stipend gets a slash of \$525 or 17 1/2 per cent. Thus the \$1,000 official is cut down to \$875; the \$1,500 to \$1,275; the \$2,000 to \$1,675, and the \$3,000 to \$2,475. But it is not with the higher standard of salary that we have to deal. The well paid official can stand his cut without the distress that reduction will bring to the men receiving from \$1,200 down to \$19.50.

Can it be imagined to be in the best interests of economy

that the sum of \$1.95 will be topped off the \$19.50 outport Postmaster; \$2.00 off the \$20.00 stamper of letters, and so on up to the five hundred dollar rate, fifteen per cent. above that up to the thousand, and twenty per cent. over that figure. Is it true and real economy to accomplish such a ridiculous saving as this will make, and at the same time create and engender dissatisfaction which will not redound to the successful carrying out of the public services, especially in the outports, where so many officials are in receipt of microscopic wages? Such a cheese-paring policy in one direction, compared to the extravagance running riot in other branches of the public service cannot but militate against the due performance of the official duties of men and women who deem themselves unjustly treated by the proposed cut in their now all too meagre stipends. Economy does not consist in making, the smaller official suffer in order to benefit the greater paid. If the Government really meant to economize rightly and properly and in the best interests of the country, they should begin at the root of the tree and not at its smaller branches. For instance there is that useless and altogether unnecessary department of Education, the staff and expenses of which eat up, not including the \$4,000 salary of the Minister, the handsome sum of \$25,140, which could be saved by the abolition of the department and its head entirely. The total grant for education amounts to \$808,388.78, out of which provision is made for a host of inspectors and sub-inspectors, and teaching trainers, and psychologists in education and what not, the whole of whom should be called home and sent back to the schools from which they were taken by the faddist who now controls the newest department, and sent abroad at the expense of the Colony to return home when their higher training is completed to teach civil servants' children, as an honorable member put it aptly in the House the other day, "to die in poverty." We protest against the outrageous and altogether uncalled for expenditure under the head of education, while Newfoundland is in such a condition of distress, and we further protest the action of the Government in proposing to make the already underpaid officials of the public service scapegoats for the sins committed by an administration whose extravagance and misapplication of public monies has never before been equalled.

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Governor's Daughter Married. His Excellency the Governor received a message this morning which stated that his daughter, Miss Armored Sachem, who left here on the last train, had been married from a flat in Westminster, London, S.W., on Monday, May 31, 1921, by Lieut. Colonel Adolph Ernest Bernard, M.C. of G., of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment and latterly Newfoundland Trade Commissioner to Italy.

The Supply Problem. The fishermen from St. Mary's and Trepassay who are here looking for supplies kept the Assessor's staff busy this morning registering their names and the supplies needed. Up to noon the Assessor, so the fishermen said, had not issued the necessary guarantees to the merchants as the cheque covering the amount had not been forthcoming. Only supplies absolutely essential to fishermen are allowed. Tobacco, whisky and clothing are struck off the list.

More Discussion Probable. There is likely to be more discussion in connection with the wage schedule of the men on Municipal relief than the Municipal Council notified the Committee that from last Thursday the rate of pay for this work would be \$2.50 per day of ten hours. The men have been working since under protest, so they say, and have put in their time for the week at 33 cents per hour. It is understood that the Municipal Commission will stand by their decision of a reduced wage scale.



TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

POPULAR AUTHOR, MODERATOR.
TORONTO, June 1. Dr. C. W. Gordon of Winnipeg, "Ralph Connor" has been elected Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

JOB PRINTERS STRIKE.
TORONTO, June 1. From two thousand to three thousand employees of Job Printing Houses responded to a strike call to-day as a result of the refusal of employers to grant forty-four hour week.

OTTAWA ALSO HAS ONE.
OTTAWA, June 1. Approximately 440 pressmen, compositors, bookbinders and draftsmen went on strike here to-day as a result of the refusal of master printers to grant a forty four hour week and forty four dollars per week.

AUSTRALIA IN FAVOR.
MELBOURNE, Australia, June 1. The Federal Government has authorized Premier William Morris Hughes, who will attend the Imperial Conference, to sign a protocol for the establishment of an International Court Justice.

CLOTHES MAKERS GO BACK.
NEW YORK, June 1. The clothing strike in New York, which has involved approximately sixty five thousand men and women workers, since December, was settled to-night on a basis of fifteen per cent wage reduction, and an agreement as to policy and an impartial board of arbitration.

FROM WASHINGTON.
WASHINGTON, June 1. While "a definite turn for the better" has been taken in some branches of industry, and the business outlook continues more favorable, there is little prospect of an immediate sharp improvement of conditions. United States Federal Reserve Board declared to-night in a review of the financial and economic situation.

BOMBING SOLDIERS.
DUBLIN, June 1. Bombs thrown into a lorry killed one soldier and wounded three this morning. The soldiers opened fire and one assailant was seen to fall, according to an official account of the affair.

AUSTRIAN CABINET RESIGNED.
VIENNA, June 1. The Cabinet of Dr. Michael Mayer, Chancellor and Foreign Minister, resigned to-day because of the plebiscite in Styria, on the question of fusion with Germany.

IRISH NEWSPAPERS EXCLUDED.
DUBLIN, June 1. By order of Major-General Strickland, commanding British troops in Munster, the Freeman's Journal and Dublin Evening Telegraph have been excluded for a week from circulating in the Martial Law area.

COWARDLY ASSASSINS.
Two armed men to-day entered the garage of Col. W. J. Peacock of Inishannon, near Bannock, Cork, and shot him in the stomach, when he tried to protect his property.

THE POWDER MAGAZINE.
OPPEL, June 1. A grave situation is reported at Reuthen, where Germans attacked the French garrison. Sharp fighting followed, and the Germans were repulsed, a number being killed. Poles made an effort to aid French, who, however, refused aid and themselves fought with the Poles who were also fighting Germans. In heavy fighting this afternoon in Ponowitz Woods, near Gross Strehlitz, Poles were compelled to fall back before onslaught of Germans. Latter report twelve

dead and thirty-one wounded. The Poles left one hundred and thirty dead on the field. Polish forces were entrenched deep in the woods and Germans were in the open. Eventually the Germans entered forest and desperate fighting ensued at close range, with machine guns, rifles and revolvers. To-night Poles had fallen still further back.

GERMANY'S POLICY.
BERLIN, June 1. Chancellor Wirth told the Reichstag, this afternoon in outline, the Government's program that restoration and reconstruction would be the keynote of its policy. He added that the Cabinet was determined that disarmament should be carried out loyally, and that disarmament would not be the occasion of the imposition of further penalties by the Allies.

CARRYING OUT AGREEMENT.
PARIS, June 1. Following the latest payment by Germany on reparation account, the Reparation Commission formally announced to-day that Germany had fulfilled Article 5 of the Reparation agreement for delivery, equivalent to one billion Reichmarks. In its communication to Germany, the Commission expresses satisfaction in seeing Germany already preparing to redeem drafts for the other securities, making up payment upon their maturity.

M.P.'S SALARIES.
LONDON, June 1. The House of Commons to-day rejected proposals to exempt salaries of members from income taxes, and allow travelling expenses. The hard-ware reduction, and an agreement as to policy and an impartial board of arbitration.

SERBIA RENOUNCES PROJECT.
BELGRADE, June 2. The Bulgarian Government has been informed that Serbia has renounced its projected occupation of Bulgarian territory and the relaxation of the tension is said to be due to the intervention of the Great Powers.

REVOLT AGAINST BOLSHIEVKS.
MOSCOW, June 2. The anti-Bolshevik revolt in Eastern Siberia, which began with the capture of Vladivostok and a nearby town, has spread to Biurovsk, capital of Amur Province. It is said in reports reaching here that the new Socialist Government established at Vladivostok continues to function.

DESPERATE FIGHTING.
OPPEL, June 2. French soldiers forming a garrison of Beuthen, a city in South Eastern Silesia, near the old Polish frontier, have been attacked by forces organized by the German inhabitants of the town. Reports state Germans in the fighting numbered 3,000. The French used tanks in charging on the German position to have gained the upper hand. The attack by Germans on the French is said to have been well planned. Telegraph and telephone wires were cut, sentries were driven back and a headquarters detachment were surrounded. Tanks were rushed to the scene and the Germans, armed with pistols, attempted to capture the machines, but were repulsed and driven to adjacent buildings. The tanks charged on the buildings, firing through doors and windows. Members of the Black Watch, constituting part of the British forces sent into Silesia, have reached Studendorf, six miles northwest of Gross Strehlitz, and Polish sentries are on duty only a short distance away. It is said in German circles here that reports have been received to the effect that orders have been issued by Poles to destroy everything as they retreat, should the British advance.

Agitation Over Breakwater.

The residents of Twillingate are greatly agitated over the building of a new breakwater. 

I did not even ask him if I might present the Resolution, because I knew my rights as a British subject and I stood upon them, and no Government nor anyone else shall dare deprive me of these rights. Permission to speak at the Bar is another thing, and was graciously accorded me by His Honor the Speaker. Permit me to correct an error in your report in another column. The name S. Motorists Protest.

SUGGEST NEW TAXATION RATE. About 100 motorists attended the meeting called by the Nfld. Motor Association in the Board of Trade Rooms yesterday to discuss means of obtaining a reduction in the present rate of motor taxation. Mr. H. B. Cowan presided. The opinion of the meeting was that the tax should be based on a horse-power rating and that in the case of private vehicles it should be \$1.50 per horse-power, whilst on vehicles for hire, it should be \$1.00 per horse-power. It was decided to have a petition presented to the House of Assembly with reference to this matter. The question of the blind corner of Gower and Prescott Streets, was referred to, and the meeting decided that a recommendation be made to the Inspector General to place a policeman on duty at this point.

Garden Competition, '21.

Dear Boys and Girls,—In previous competitions we suggested that certain vegetables and flowers should be grown selecting those which seemed most likely to be successful under the cultivation of young and inexperienced gardeners. Lives Among the Lepers.

THE WORLD'S LONELIEST WHITE WOMAN. "Mary Reed, the missionary in Chandag, India, is one of the loneliest, yet one of the most noble white women in the world," and Mr. Oldrieve, organizing secretary to the Mission of Lepers in India, who arrived in London recently. Mrs. Oldrieve has just finished a three-year tour, during which he travelled 76,000 miles, visiting all the leper stations in India. "I visited Chandag, India, in October last," he told one of our representatives in an interview, "and I am pleased to say that she is still able to carry on her spiritual work among the afflicted, a wonderful life of devotion in a remote spot in the Himalayas, which she has now carried on for thirty years. Alone among the lepers, Mary Reed seldom sees white people. She has her little church in mountainous country, nearly 5,000 feet above sea level." Her Home a Ruin. Chandag leper community is about 80 miles from the nearest railroad, and a halt had to be made at the rest bungalow in the mountains built by the Government for their officials

The Drug Traffic.

The drug traffic in Canada and United States thrives perceptibly on the enforcement of prohibition of liquor traffic. Because the farm which is rapidly becoming such a national evil in Canada, is an unworldly business, its immensity of ramifications are sometimes forgotten. Only the other day a man was held Ogdensburg, N. Y., with morphine, cocaine and opium valued at \$25,000 to \$50,000. Such seizures frequent, and with the huge financial turnover involved in the abominable business, payment of the customs fines imposed cannot be an important item from the standpoint of the traffickers. And the same is true of illicit liquor traffic. Says the Telegraph: "Bootlegging is a business of fabulous profits, and such gains are ordinarily imposed, can be made care of without worry. Greatly benefited by the prohibition of liquor, the Government should be the rule in these cases with imprisonment as well for offences."—Acadian Recorder, May 26.

**Woman Suffrage
Victory in India.**

WOMEN ENFRANCHISED.

We will be glad to know that South Africa has taken a great step towards woman suffrage. Last Friday, April 1, the Legislative Council passed a resolution giving equal suffrage to women in the Madras Presidency. The deal of work had been done previously in this, the women of the resolution was passed in February by the mover, Mr. Bahadur M. Krishnam. The resolution was as follows:—
"The Council recommends that the sex disqualification prescribed in sub-clause (b) of section 1 of the Madras Act (1) in regard to registration of voters should be removed in respect of women and that the qualifications which entitle men to vote be applicable to women."
From this time a great educational campaign was begun in Madras, led by the Women's Indian Association, the meetings in the Georgetown district were specially enthusiastic, the women there not considering the suffrage but wanting to be allowed to stand for the Legislative Council. A woman even suggested that if the resolution did not pass through the Council the women of Madras should immediately start militant methods in the provincial districts, also several meetings were held and resolutions passed asking that the sex disqualification should be removed and the resolution passed by the Hon. Mr. Krishnaiah was to the Hon. Mr. T. Krishnaiah, Minister for Law, Mr. A. R. Venkatesh, Minister for Revenue, Mr. Reddi Naidu, Minister for Education, and later the other two members also received a deputation. It was interesting to notice the difference in the reception of our deputations from the way the Suffragettes were received in England. The women of India were arrested and taken to prison. Here, in Madras, everything was done to make the members of the Council receive us with the utmost courtesy and earnestness. The members of the Council were invited to the Chamber of Commerce, where they were met by the women of Madras, who were also interviewed and asked to support the resolution. 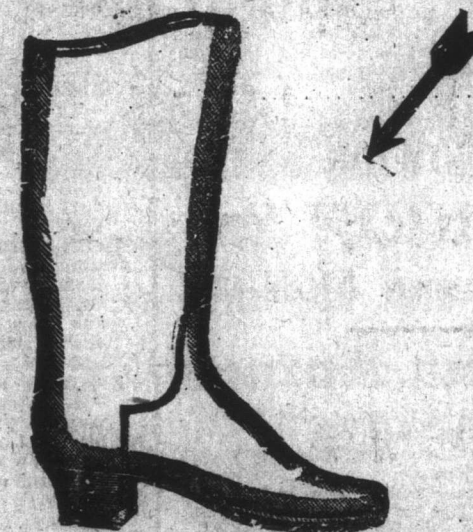

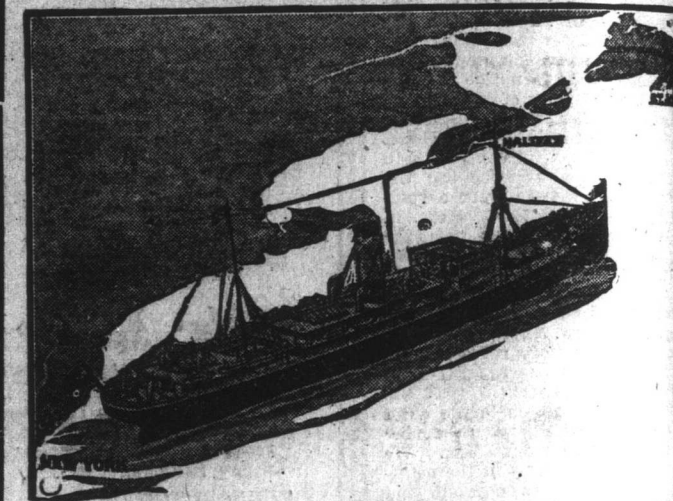
