





Our Montreal Letter

(From Our Own Correspondent.) THE WORST ELECTRICAL STORM IN YEARS.

The closing hours of Sunday, Augand 31st, 1924, will ever be remem bared by over a million people dwelling in Montreal and the suburbs, the Eastern Townships, and places in the Laurentian Mountains, on account of a terrific electrical storm which swept all those places for three or four hours and did considerable dam age. In fact, farmers in the vicinity of Ormstown say that nothing like it in severity and the extent of the damage done by it, has happened within the last forty years. The wind blew with hurricane force, uprooting trees. throwing them into the lake and also blocking some of the main roads for motorists many of them being caught in the storm as they were returning home. The thunder rolled in heavy and continuous peals. The lightning was the most vivid ever seen, lighting up the scene for miles around, and setting fire to barns, dwellings, and outhouses, besides putting telegraph wires and telephone communication out of commission in all the important centres in the Laurentian Mountains and in the Lake of Two Mountains. Several farmers in the Laurentians lost their stock and farming implements. The storm destroyed 14 barns in the vicinity of Three Rivers. Several motor cars had narrow escapes from being ditched trying to avoid the falling trees. Five barns were destroyed in the neighborhood of St. Johns, Que. The rain descended in torrents and in some places was accompanied by very large hailstones and left holes of large dimensions in plants, especially in the tobacco plant. Many pleasure-seekers on the water in small boats had narrow escapes from drowning, as the wind turned the placid lakes and rivers into a mass of seething foam. Two men out of a party of six lost their lives at Lake Connelly in the Laurentians, as the boat was upset just as the storm broke. The week-enders in the different resorts spent a night of dread, fear and anxiety.







The Chinese Civil War

It is greatly to be hoped that there s nothing more serious in the highly sensational news sent out from China than a factional fight. True, the Chinese Generals who are struggling for victory claim that they are leading movements for the unification of China, but that has been a slogan of every war lord who has led a body of troops into a miniature battle ever since the Emperor of China was deposed. What has brought British and United States warships on the scene, and what is likely to give the British authorities at Shanghai cause for apprehension, is that the rival factions are fighting for the control of the all important Yangtse waterway, and that one of the Generals had declared the Chinese control of the Shanghai district at the Victoria Observatory are 139 is essential to the successful pursuit of his unification plans.

Shanghai is under international control, with British influence overwhelmingly predominant. It commands the Yangtse delta, and thus holds the key to that great inland waterway which leads into the districts where the greatest British vested interests in China lie. Order must be maintained, and there is every reason to feel confident that the British forces on the spot, with whom the U.S. troops will of course act in common accord, will be fully equal to the task of keeping either General, or both if need be, from making any trouble for missionaries and other white people in Shanghai.
