We congratulate Mr. Macdonald on the success he has achieved in educating his Tory friends up to the proper standard. It is unnocessary for us to give in detail the various reforms suggested in the Speech. If they are not so comprehensive or go so far as were thinted at a few days ago in the Government organs, they are still a great step in the right direction. The election law if amended properly, will contain all the improvements so long advocated and sought for by Reformers. In recommending amendments to the Mining and Free Grant Bills, passed last Session, the Ministry have made an honest confession that they came far short of the grequirements of the country, and that the promise in the Speech will be an earnest of the intention of the Government to deal with these questions in a liberal spirit.

The Speech also contains promises to reduce the expenses connected with the administration of justice without decreasing its efficiency. Such reforms are very necessary, but until we have these changes laid before us in detail, we cannot form an opinion in regard to their merits. On the whole we ought to be thankful for what is promised, even though the recommendations are stolen body and bones from the Reformers.

As will be seen by the returns in another column, Grant and Colfax's election in the States has been secured by a very large majority. That this would be the result was a foregone conclusion some weeks ago. The returns are nothing like complete yet, but they are sufficient to rhow that the Republicans have made immense gains in some States. It is pretty certain that the Democrats have carried York State and New Jersey, though the vote in the latter is still very undecided. With these two exceptions all the other northern States, the central and most of the western States, have gone strength Republicans. have gone strongly Republican.

GUELPH MARKET.

The markets ewerywhere still continue dull, for every kind of produce. Running over the quotations of the New York market there is not a single article that is not reported quiet, and many of them declining. In Oswego we find the same state of things; wheat is inactive, and barley, of which there was so much sent from this country to that market, is said to be quiet with small sales. In Montreal the highest price for flour is \$6.50, but the market is firm. Wheat also has not changed much for the last two or three days. In Toronto the wheat receipts are fair, but business is by no means lively, and fall wheat is sold there for even less than in our own market. In short the characteristic of the city markets is now, leven in a greater degree than during the past three weeks, dullness. Either there is very little foreign demand, or the supply is far in advance of that demand, for at every port the receipts are much in excess of the shipments. One thing is certain that at the present rates for grain in the States no Canadian produce dealer would be justified in exporting. Our own market partakes of the general quietness. Receipts are falling off, for the majority of the farmers being well to do, and not forced to sell their wheat, nor willing to dispose of it at the prices now offered, are not bringing it out. They are wanting in hopes of the figures going upwards, which it is probable they will, as soon as the wheat season fairly sets in. There is very little difference in our quotations of spring and fall wheat since last week, indeed the former has been maltered, or nearly so, for a considerable time past.
