It opens up a new phase of this wretched history which we fear—if all was known—would be as fittle creditable to Dr. Sangster as that which we already know about his family troubles.

In bringing his case before the public Dr. Sangster thought to justify his conduct by parading Mr. Cameron's opinion, which that gentleman now disowns. His case was bad before, but now he is utterly left without nee, and moreover stands here to be under the public confidence by fraud and lalse hood. What will his defenders and apologists now say? What will the teachers who have been fooled and hoodwinked by him now say in his favour? If any of them are yet foolish enough and improved the public of the publi them are yet foolish enough and impudent enough to support him, they will assuredly lose the respect of their constituents, and all who value truth, honor and morality. In this connection we think the Gibbe, in persistently opposing the conduct of Dr. Sangster, in the interests of public morality, has done the country a service which deserves every acknowledgment and commendation.
