was it arrived at? Governor Ken
nedy, after their opening, took n

had no sympathy with the people

more than those who for seven years ob-
structed the establishment here of free
structed the establishment here of fre
schools, which a large majority of th

commanity earnestly called for, be

mit that the legal duties of parents

is the duty of parents to obtain for
or to give their children an education
suitable to their station in life; a daty
pointed out by reason, and of th
greatest importance. For, as a learn-
ed writer, Peffendorf, observes, it is
not easy to imagine or allow that a
arent bas conferred any considerable
benefit upon his child by bringing hi
into the world, if he entirely neglect
his culture and education and suffer
im to grow up like a mere beast, $t$
lead a life useless to others and shameo
ful to himself. The laws of most
ountries seem to be defective in th
point, by not "constraining"
point, by not "constraining" ib
apon his children. The rich may be
eft to their own option, whether thes
will bring up their children to be
ornaments or disgraces to their famil
es. It is a daty incumbent upon
ies. It is a daty incumbent upon
wellhorganized community to see tha
"the child that makes the man" should
not be allowed to grow up without
such an education as may render
of the abilities, in their several station
conwealth. Whantage to the com
free schools for this Island contended
for was, that gratuitous educetion
"at the publie expense," should be
propided for all who chose to avai
themselves of the benefits,
the payment of any sum, howeve
excuse to those who were to to poor
pay, or to those-and, alas! they a

but too many-who neglect the cul
lare and education of their familie
leaving them to labor under thos
griefs and inconveniences whic

families, so uninstructed, will be su
to bring upon them. We thought the
