In the instance alluded to the mistake was not observed until too late; and when the Government members subsequently learned-as they must have done-that the intention of the hon. member for Cariboo was to modify the resolution by the erasure of the scale of salaries, or possibly to withdraw it, it must have been a cause of considerable chagrin to them to discover that they had so completely outwitted themselves.

The outbreak of the Fenians appears to have assumed a serious aspect, and has thrown the whole of Ireland into a state of uproar and alarm. The insurgents seem to be divided into small bands that roam through the country pillaging or burning the property of persons known to be triendly to the Government. The system of warfare adopted by the insurgents is similar to that employed by the Italian brigands.
