On the Stikine the passenger traffic was particularly heavy, and on one voyage alone the steamer was crowded with tourists from Wrangel and Juneau. This business has developed wonderfully during the past year, and they look forward to an extremely busy season next year. Since there has been some favorable prospect of a rallway being constructed to the coast in the northern part of the province, they state that the number of people traveling in search of timber lands, of mineral property and on various other missions have been surprising.

Y.; and John Chetwood. They were directed by Capt. James Brown, of the schooner Herman, who claimed to know the whereabouts of the treasure. Capt. Brown came from Providence, R. I., and said he knew the location of the more or less mythical treasure, said to have come from Peru in 1890.

The Herman started from San Francisco fourteen months ago. Stops were made at Honolulu, Apla, Pago Pago, and the little vessel went even as far as Sydney before the real search for the hidden wealth was bedyn.

At Apia the vessel was held for awhile on complaint of Messrs. Hofman and Showalt, who had become involved in trouble with Brown, whom they charged with unfairness and cruel treatment of his men. At Sydney documents were received from the collector of customs and several persons at San Francisco, who were interessed in the enterprise which enabled the incorporators of the treasure-seeking company to dictate terms. Consul Baker removed Brown from command of the Herman, and appointed Sutton in his stead, the former master signing the articles as supercargo. Brown, it is stated, again agreed to reveal the place of the hidden treasure, and on May 24th, the Herman sailed from Sydney on the final stretch of its luckless voyage.
