A Prisoner's Testimony Before the C. P. Commission—The Evidence Concluded
—Argument to be Heard Thursday.

After sitting day after day for upward, of a month the Central prison commission has at last heard all the evidence on both sides of the case. This was accomplished yesterday by holding session for twelve hours, from 11 a.m. till 10 o'clock last

Guard Guinness testified as to the extreme bad character of the prisoners who had so blackened his own record. He gave his version of his struggle with Fay. He merely laid hold of the boy, who immediately cursed him and dashed tea in his face. With regard to poking the lunatic Goggins with a stick thrust through his cell door, he explained that he only drew out the man's dishes with the pole, Goggins was such a dangerous character. He denied the truth of several other charges of cruelty against him-

In the afterneon Barnard Lowen, employed in the brick yard, remembered Guard Hart holding a half-hour's confidential conversation with the prisoner Fay.
Guard Irving said that Guard Hart had often told him to refuse the priest admission, although he had no authority to say such a thing. 
