

The effect of this has been serious, for not only has the car accommodation been unequal to the task of bringing down supplies from the mills but have been unable to get even

To remove this anomaly representations, in the shape of deputations and correspondence, have been repeatedly made to the rail-way authorities, but without apparent result. The presence in the city yesterday of Sir Joseph Hickson, general manager of the Grand Trunk Railway, afforded the lumbermen another opportunity of airing their grievances, and a conference with that gentleman was held at noon in the office of Accal Manager Wragge. These gentlemen were present: John I. Davidson, President Toronto Board of Trade; John Donagh, Robert Laiglaw, H. N. Baird, H. T. Willmott, representing the lumber section of the Board of Trade; John Waldie, M.P., of the Victoria Harbor Lumber Company; James Scott of the Georgian Bay Lumber Company, Robert Thompson and M. Brennan, Hamilton; Mr. McPherson, London, and E. A. Wills, Secretary of the Board of Trade.

Besides Sir Joseph there were present for the railway Mr. Wragge, Suparintendent Stephenson, John Earls, A. White, J. W. Ridell, Rotert Quinn, James Webster.

When the reporters filed into the room Sir, Joseph calmly but firmly backed them out, remarking as he did so: "We cannot allow you in, gentlemen, because subjects may be discussed which it would be desirable to keep To remove this anomaly representations

It was learned at the close of the meeting that Sir Joseph, in replying to the representations of the deputations, acknowledged the corn, but pleaded that the company had done something towards alleviating the congestion. He had, however, to admit that a number of the new cars were being used in the construction of the double track, but promised to withdraw them forthwith.
