



The disintegration of Russia and the depredations of the central powers in Rumania cut off European sources of wheat, so that in 1918 this country shipped Italy 16,000,000 bushels and 3,000,000 barrels of flour. This cereal ration was supplemented by 2,000,000 bushels of

Italy also has looked to the United States for meat, taking 46,000,000 pounds of canned beef, 9,000,000 pounds of fresh beef, 98,000,000 pounds of bacon and 1,000,000 pounds of lard last year. Other purchases from this country included 20,000,000 pounds of salmon and 30,000,000 pounds of sugar.






