Canada Should Forbid the Waste

On no account should the United States government, thru lack of title, be allowed to dismantle its munition buildings at Leaside that cost four millions of dollars. The Canadian government can, under the War Measures Act, forbid it. Better still, let the U.S. government offer to sell to the Canadian government the buildings at fair value for military or railway purposes; the new owner could then expropriate the land on which they are erected. Or Uncle Sam present our government with the buildings rather than commit the crime of tearing them down. If for nothing else these great big strong buildings would be spiendid storehouses for our military equip. ment, now scattered all over in a lot of inflammable ones.

The United States government will not be well advised by its special corps of military officers now here trying to salvage the investment if they do not suggest a conference with the Canadian government.
